

HARRY: My comment is that come out. But other than the human rights issue, what for? A lot of us just-- we see what goes on in Montrose because it's visible down there. Everybody down there-- a lot of people down there are out.

But I mean, why it seems like a lot of people play right into the stereotype that straight people have for us that everybody should talk with a lisp, and he should call her-- him, she. And the fact is I'm not interested in another guy who calls him, she.

SPEAKER 2: Well, you shouldn't discount that part of our community. I don't think it's fair for us to discount a person because they-- and I think the straight community has taken that stereotype because so many people do it. I call, Hey, girl, hey, she, whatever.

I don't think that they should discount me because I say she or girl for any more than they should discount somebody because they do drug, anymore they could discount you because you live in the suburbs, or people who won't-- people because they're outside the loop. There are million reasons why they exclude people. And that's just part of it.

HARRY: Right. And that's part of the problem is when you're a gay person, you're obviously a minority person. But I've never seen a minority group that practices exclusion of each other the way the gay community does.

SPEAKER 2: Oh, absolutely.

HARRY: That's my message. That's why I'm calling. I'm not out for a date. I'm calling to make a comment that I think that things would be a lot better for us if we could come together just a little bit better. And like this business, everybody would like to date a bodybuilder. But let's be realistic--

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

SPEAKER 2: Well, but Harry, realize that--

HARRY: --would start to accept people.

SPEAKER 2: Harry, realize that was a 16-year-old kid. Realize what you were like and what everyone is like--

HARRY: No, I don't--

SPEAKER 2: --at 16.

HARRY: I know that. Because I'm dealing with this guy who is 34. He's a couple of years younger than me. And when I told him that I didn't have a bodybuilder physique, he just totally lost interest in my--

SPEAKER 2: Really? I know the feeling, Harry.

STEVE That's the problem with the whole society. That's not just--

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: But I think it's more--

HARRY: It's emphasized here.

SPEAKER 2: It's more prevalent in the gay community.

HARRY: Thank you. Thank you.

SPEAKER 2: And Harry, I understand it because I'm a big-- I'm a big-- excuse me, I'm going to play into the stereotype, I'm a big girl. I could moon Europe with this behind. But you just have to overcome it and go on. And we appreciate your call. And I take-- I--

HARRY: Well, it's not necessarily for-- not necessary important for me to overcome it. It seems to me that it's necessary for more of us to overcome it, because everybody's never going to-- everybody's not going to come out if they don't have the desire to do so.

And the thing is it's like-- I'm almost at a loss for words. Let me say real quick because I know you have had a call. So let's say it like this. Being gay should be fun. And you go down to the bars, and people have attitudes. The reaction is if this is what being gay is about, it doesn't seem like it's any fun. So why should I want to join in?

SPEAKER 2: Right.

STEVE
UNDERWOOD: You can't take your self-esteem from the way other people treat you. Homosexual, heterosexual, anything. If you look to others for approval, to feel good about yourself, you're going to fail. We're going to have to go on to the next--

HARRY: That wasn't--

SPEAKER 2: Thanks for calling, Harry.

HARRY: OK. But that wasn't the point of my comment, though.

SPEAKER 2: Thanks for calling, Harry. We appreciate it. The calls are just zooming in. We have 16 minutes left. We're going to take-- let's take line seven. Well, I don't know where it came from. Caller, are you there?

CHUCK: Yeah. I'm here.

SPEAKER 2: And what's your name?

CHUCK: My name is Chuck.

SPEAKER 2: Chuck, I'm out of scratch paper.

[LAUGHTER]

The game is on hold. Chuck, are you looking for a husband?

CHUCK: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: Chuck, tell us about yourself. How old are you?

CHUCK: I'm 22.

SPEAKER 2: 22. What's your--

CHUCK: 6' 4".

SPEAKER 2: I'm sorry?

CHUCK: 6' 4".

SPEAKER 2: 6' 4". Uh-huh. And are you top or bottom?

CHUCK: Either.

SPEAKER 2: Oh, Chuck, you've dialed the right number. I always tell people, Chuck, I'm a dominant bottom. I'm a big girl but-- well, never mind. I can't say that on the air.

CHUCK: Basically, I just believe in play hard and take no prisoners, I guess.

SPEAKER 2: Oh. Chuck, you have dialed the right number.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: Do you live in the loop?

SPEAKER 2: Do you live inside or outside the loop?

CHUCK: Way outside the loop. Actually, I live in Texas City.

SPEAKER 2: Texas City.

CHUCK: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: Where's that at?

CHUCK: Down by Galveston.

SPEAKER 2: Oh, really? Do you have a beach house for us to visit? You're having a barbecue or something on the 4th?

CHUCK: No.

SPEAKER 2: Oh. Well, I thought I'd ask.

CHUCK: OK.

SPEAKER 2: So what are you looking for?

CHUCK: What am I looking for? Someone real. I don't need some Chippendale or whatever that guy said earlier.

SPEAKER 2: Well, now, Chuck, he's 16. Give him-- give him a break.

CHUCK: I'll give him five years. He'll grow out of it.

[LAUGHTER]

SPEAKER 2: In five years, he will be out of it.

CHUCK: When that girl smells reality, it's going to hit her hard. But anyway, I'm looking for someone who's just not mental.

SPEAKER 2: Yeah.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

SPEAKER 2: There's a lot of that in the community. So let's see. So what-- do you like to go out at all? Do you go clubbing? Or what do you-- what do you like to do for activities?

CHUCK: OK. I do go clubbing sometime. But I just basically go everywhere.

SPEAKER 2: Do you have a favorite club?

CHUCK: I got some friends that have. And we hang out up there. But I just don't go out clubbing a lot cause it's not my thing, really.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: What nights do you go there?

CHUCK: Saturday.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: Saturday.

SPEAKER 2: Saturday. Steve, who you're listening to here on the other side, is the DJ over at Heaven on Thursdays, Fridays, and Sundays.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: So just a little plug for Steve Underwood.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: You should come to the DJ booth tomorrow.

SPEAKER 2: Yeah. If you're out tomorrow night, come to DJ booth and see Steve Underwood. Well, I just don't feel like we have a significant match yet. I've got three names here. And unless you want to go out with Steve Underwood, Chuck, I could set you up for that.

But let me take some more phone calls. Because we only have about 13, 14 minutes left. Let me take some more phone calls, and see what we can find.

CHUCK: OK.

SPEAKER 2: Thank you, Chuck, for calling. I tell you, now Chuck sounded like-- oh, I forgot to ask him what size shoe-- Chuck, are you still there?

CHUCK: Oh. Yeah, I'm here.

SPEAKER 2: What's size shoe do you wear, Chuck?

CHUCK: 13.

SPEAKER 2: 13. Chuck, you have dialed the right number.

STEVE Hello.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Do you think that makes us shallow, Chuck?

CHUCK: No.

STEVE OK. What's your glove size?

UNDERWOOD:

[LAUGHTER]

CHUCK: What's my glove size? I don't know.

SPEAKER 2: Do you think OJ did it?

CHUCK: I don't care.

[LAUGHTER]

I am never going to meet him. I don't care if he-- no, I'm kidding.

SPEAKER 2: Chuck, that's the best answer all night long.

CHUCK: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: All right.

CHUCK: All right.

SPEAKER 2: Thanks, Chuck.

CHUCK: Thank you.

SPEAKER 2: I tell you--

STEVE I like him.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: I like Chuck too.

STEVE I like him Already. 6' 4", 13 inch foot.

UNDERWOOD:

[LAUGHTER]

Jeez.

SPEAKER 2: I bet it's not his foot you're thinking about.

STEVE Well, that's about 75% of what I was concerned about.

UNDERWOOD:

[LAUGHTER]

And the 25% can't be exposed?

SPEAKER 2: Where's our phone person? We've got more phone calls to take. Run in there and push the first button that's flashing. Do you see that? No, no, no, no. On the other thing. That thing. Yeah.

MAN: [INAUDIBLE].

SPEAKER 2: Well, push one. Hello?

ALEX: Hello.

SPEAKER 2: Who's this?

ALEX: Alex.

SPEAKER 2: Alex?

ALEX: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: Are you looking for a husband?

ALEX: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: You know you're on the air?

ALEX: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: OK. How old are you, Alex?

ALEX: Well, I was turning to my 17.

SPEAKER 2: Oh. And you're trying to find-- are you trying to get a husband with him?

ALEX: No. Please give me some phone numbers, but go ahead.

SPEAKER 2: Oh, OK. Well, hold on just a minute.

ALEX: OK.

SPEAKER 2: Well now, we got to get this all situated because I'm trying-- I've got to take my phone calls in here. Give me another one. Hello? Hit a button. We're very professional down here at 800-- down here at whatever we're at.

[LAUGHTER]

Hello, caller, are you there?

QUINCY: Hello.

SPEAKER 2: Who's this?

QUINCY: This is Quincy.

SPEAKER 2: Quincy. Are you looking for a husband?

QUINCY: Well, someone-- just someone.

SPEAKER 2: Now Quincy, do you live out in Alief?

QUINCY: Yes, I do. You remember, don't you?

SPEAKER 2: I remember you. The-- whatever that group was called. I thought you moved away.

QUINCY: No.

SPEAKER 2: OK. How old are you, Quincy?

QUINCY: I'm 15.

SPEAKER 2: 15. OK. Wait a minute. Now do you look like a model? Let me find my notes.

QUINCY: Well, I'm a cross between Jaleel White and Tevin Campbell.

SPEAKER 2: Oh, that's good. I wonder if-- I wonder if-- where'd he go? What--

STEVE UNDERWOOD: Ricky.

SPEAKER 2: No, not Ricky.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: That guy and KD.

SPEAKER 2: This one here, Jeremy. I wonder if he would be good for Jeremy. What do you like to do when you go out, Quincy? Do you go-- do you have a favorite club?

QUINCY: No, not actually. I just do whatever.

SPEAKER 2: Good. That was the right answer at 15 years old.

QUINCY: I do whatever.

SPEAKER 2: So I can't ask a 15-year-old if he's a top or a bottom. I'd feel horrible.

STEVE UNDERWOOD: Are you top or bottom?

QUINCY: Well, I'm whatever anyone wants me to be.

SPEAKER 2: Quincy, you go. Well, I think we ought to set him up with Jeremy.

STEVE Yeah. It wouldn't be illegal that way.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: That's right. Because they'd both be underage.

STEVE Consenting pre-pubic teenagers.

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: No. Well, I'm far from pre-pubic.

STEVE Are you post pubic?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: Oh, yes.

STEVE Do you have hair on your chest yet?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: No. It doesn't run in my family.

STEVE Oh. Never mind.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Oh, well, that's not a bad thing. That's not a bad thing.

STEVE No, that's not a bad thing.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: So what do you do for fun, Quincy?

QUINCY: Well, I like to go shopping.

STEVE Oh.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Oh. Tammy Faye.

[LAUGHTER]

Imelda.

STEVE Imelda Taylor day.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Quincy likes to go shopping.

QUINCY: Yeah.

STEVE Where do you go shopping?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: Well, I go anywhere anyone takes me.

STEVE The Galleria?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: Sometimes. If I have enough money.

SPEAKER 2: What's your favorite store?

QUINCY: My favorite store? I like Structure in the Galleria most definitely.

SPEAKER 2: Oh. OK.

STEVE The what?

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Structure in the Galleria.

STEVE Oh.

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: A lot of my kind of people hang out there.

STEVE Well, wrong store.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: What do you mean by my kind of people?

QUINCY: Well, when I go there, I just see lots of people that I like.

STEVE Like what?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: Old, big, strong men. But I don't like just big, strong men. I like all kinds.

STEVE Oh. Are you the oldest, the middle, the youngest? What?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: I'm a middle.

STEVE You're in the middle.

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: Yeah.

STEVE So you have older brothers and younger--

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: I have three older and one younger.

STEVE Oh.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Big family.

STEVE You like the porridge that Goldilocks ate?

UNDERWOOD:

QUINCY: Yes.

SPEAKER 2: Well, Quincy, we'll look for you here. We've got a list going. And we'll try-- we're trying to find the perfect pair. And we've added you to our list. And we'll keep looking.

QUINCY: OK.

SPEAKER 2: OK. Keep listening. Will, we only have about nine minutes left. Go in there and punch another one of them buttons. What else is going on in the world? I want to know if OJ did it.

STEVE Well, we talked about Tammy Faye.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: What did you say?

STEVE We already talked about Tammy Faye.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Yeah, Tammy Faye is in town Thursday night, over at the Holiday Inn at Hobby Airport. And she's going to be there, doing God knows what.

STEVE She was dethroned by Paul and Jan Crouch.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: And Jim Baker just got out of jail.

STEVE Jim Baker is out of jail.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: That's something new and exciting. Caller? Caller didn't want to talk. Let's take the next one. Caller, are you there?

RICKY: It's me again.

SPEAKER 2: Ricky?

RICKY: Yeah.

SPEAKER 2: All right. Let me tell you your options, hon, because we're running out of time.

RICKY: OK.

SPEAKER 2: Let's see. There's Jeremy, who-- now she seems a little snit-ish to me, if you ask me. She wants a model. She wants--

RICKY: Well, that's what I have, a model. But he's a-- he works out and everything. And he's 24 and everything. He's very intelligent.

SPEAKER 2: So you want to hook him up with Jeremy?

SPEAKER 2: We'll see.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: What is this with all these people--

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: All these people--

SPEAKER 2: All these people are calling in tonight. Oh, I'm married, but I want to find somebody else too.

RICKY: Yeah. Because I want-- I want something different.

[LAUGHTER]

SPEAKER 2: So I mean--

RICKY: A model.

SPEAKER 2: But I mean, are you like a model figure, and you're real gorgeous, and look like you belong in the GQ magazine and everything?

SPEAKER 2: Are you?

RICKY: --I'd say. Yes.

SPEAKER 2: Oh. See? Now I can't hook you all up because I can't get you all into any club in town.

SPEAKER 2: Well--

STEVE

SPEAKER 2: Well, I'll tell you whose-- I'll tell you whose retail value is the lowest.

[LAUGHTER]

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

SPEAKER 2: I'm not going to say a word. Anyway--

STEVE Well, we'll just say--

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: We tried.

STEVE --he just watch Models Inc.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: We tried. Watch Models Inc., Jeremy. We tried. And it just didn't work out. And I have a horrible headache, so I'm ready to go home. Do we have some fading out music, some closing music, Steve Underwood?

STEVE Yes.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: I don't want to play that. That's tired.

STEVE Boy George? Oh, well. Oh, I know.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Play-- we could play Alison Moyet. Well, what--

MAN: Talking about time.

SPEAKER 2: What have we-- what have we-- OK. In that case, give me that other Boy George CD. If she's going to call out some way, I'm tied. Give me that other, what you call it, Boy George CD. Girl, she's going to try and read me right here on the air. Well, to Jeremy, where are we at? To Jeremy and Quincy--

STEVE What's the Texas City guy? I want him to call back.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Chuck.

STEVE Chuck.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Chuck. Chuck was the taken.

UNDERWOOD:

UNDERWOOD:

[LAUGHTER]

MAN: Just use your imagination on that. They ain't right. They ain't right.

SPEAKER 2: What song should we do, girl?

STEVE What's her new one?

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: "Sweet Toxic Love?"

STEVE Yeah. No.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: That's kind of gospelly.

STEVE Move away. That's my favorite one.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Well now, move away. I have it on that one. It's the mix. Give me that one. So I'm sorry, guys, we tried. I had a free night at a local nightspot that a lot of people mentioned that it was their favorite hangout, with cocktails and everything. But we couldn't seem to work out a love connection here. Well, not all of us. I'll be down at the Midtown Spa tomorrow night with Armando Garcia.

Armando, don't forget to find me. Mention at the door that you're looking for me. And well, who knows what you'll find.

STEVE Well, he shouldn't have any trouble finding you. Just remember, there's more rings around Saturn.

UNDERWOOD:

[LAUGHTER]

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Right after she got thrown out of the army with her lesbian lover.

STEVE Well, that reminds me of that time that we visited your mother at the Betty Ford Clinic. Yes, when her black
UNDERWOOD: lesbian that got kicked out of the military, put her over the-- put her over the top.

SPEAKER 2: Well, if that black lesbian hadn't broken up with your mother, my mother never would have had a problem.

STEVE That's true. Lesbians who never share lesbians. Always cause a lot of problems.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Did we not play that song?

STEVE We didn't play Patti LaBelle.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Give me that song. We'll play a little bit of Boy George to finish up. And then we're going to close out. Patti LaBelle has a new song out. Have you heard this new song, Jimmy? It is hot. Patti LaBelle, mixed up by--

STEVE Music KRBE is too afraid to touch.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: --Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis. Can we read KRBE?

STEVE Only if you say KPFT Houston right after it.

UNDERWOOD:

[LAUGHTER]

[MUSIC PLAYING]

SPEAKER 2: KRBE KPFT Houston is really tired. They are-- I mean-- and the new music zone, and they play stuff from the '80s, like not '89, '81.

STEVE Right.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: The horror. The sheer horror.

STEVE Well, coming up after this will be the Queer Music Zone. And we've got--

UNDERWOOD:

STEVE --some new Pansy Division. Whatever you've got going on at 2:30.

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: Oh, that's right. Let's plug that. Finish up this Boy George song. And let's plug *Kathy & Mo Show*. It's over at Theater LaB Houston. It is just a spring. It's a stitch. We have an interview with Dee Macaluso and Deborah Hope.

STEVE Yeah. Sorry. [INAUDIBLE]

UNDERWOOD:

SPEAKER 2: And it is just a stitch. Robin, I took our mothers to see it. And they just absolutely loved it. And not only his mother fell in love with it, not only will Dee and Deborah talk about the play, but they're even going to act out one scene, which is a lot of fun, one of the funny scenes and stuff. JIMMY CARPER: Boy, that's a good film too.

MICHAEL It's very good.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

MICHAEL OK. So you should go by or call up the museum and ask when-- what's going on. The number is 639-7515.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: And Caravaggio, of course, was an openly gay painter.

MICHAEL Yes, he was.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: Way back when. And he used street people as his models. And that, at one point, he did this fabulous painting of the Madonna using, as a model, the most notorious prostitute in town.

MICHAEL Way to go.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: And everyone recognized her.

MICHAEL Well.

CRAWFORD:

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: I would imagine, if she's the most notorious, she has to be recognized. It was a scandal. It's great. OK. And if you pick up the current issue of *This Week in Texas*, there's not a whole lot to read, except for the letter sent by Michael Crawford. Michael Crawford sent a letter to the Twit. And they printed it.

MICHAEL Yes, I did. Well, they didn't print it without a snide comment--

CRAWFORD:

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, OK.

MICHAEL And it's all about what queer pride means. It's my reflections on Queer Pride Week, and the way we celebrate it.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, OK.

MICHAEL OK. And whoever the publisher is of Twit, I'm not going to chill because my people are under attack. And I don't

CRAWFORD: see any reason to sit there and watch them die. And I'm not going to have a cocktail because I don't drink.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

MICHAEL And we're going to be reading excerpts from the *Lesbian Avenger* handbook, which is subtitled *A Handy Guide for*
CRAWFORD: *Homemade Revolution*.

[LAUGHTER]

And there's going to be a lot of music, unlike music you usually associate with gay people, because well, I ain't playing no disco. We're going to be having music by The Offspring, the Beastie Boys, Nine Inch Nails, Stone Temple Pilots, New Arrested Development, and a whole bunch of other stuff that I bought recently.

JIMMY CARPER: OK.

MICHAEL Oh, and this new homo core band called Sugar Shock. I stayed with the drummer when I was in New York. So
CRAWFORD: we're going to play some of their music.

JIMMY CARPER: Queer music.

MICHAEL Queer music.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: OK. I'm all for that.

MICHAEL OK. Great. Well, thank you very much.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: Sure. See you next week.

MICHAEL OK. Take care.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY CARPER: OK. And coming up will be a little abbreviated version of the QMZ, the Queer Music Zone. So stay tuned.
