RADIO Oh, yes, it's time for the "After Hours News and Views" with Big Roy and Chris. It seemed that Big Roy was
PRESENTER: enjoying that song by Candy Kane

BIG ROY: Oh, immensely.

[LAUGHTER]

I really like that.

RADIO Oh, and you can eat it all night long.

PRESENTER:

BIG ROY: We gotta hear some more from that side.

RADIO Yeah. Yeah, she's good.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: Thank god we don't have a camera because Roy doing swing was not pretty.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Chris.

RADIO That's a lot of swing around, I'll tell you.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: It doesn't swing the same way it did 30 years ago.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: I'll tell you one thing, though, Chris. Chris is on three different stations.

RADIO Yeah, oh, yes.

PRESENTER:

BIG ROY: It takes three television stations to cover all of him.

RADIO Ooh, ouch. And what's this about me needing to butch it up?

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: You should see yourself.

BIG ROY: You? Butch it up?

RADIO That'll happen.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: Do you see yourself in "The Voice?"

RADIO No.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: You're in the very back. They have a picture of the candlelight vigil.

RADIO And what am I doing, something real nelly or something?

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: Well, you're just standing there. That's pretty nelly.

[LAUGHTER]

RADIO Yeah, I'm just your regular run-of-the-mill fag--

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: But no, it was interesting to see.

RADIO --with my big faggy voice.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: There is nothing run of the mill about you, darling.

RADIO OK, time for the news.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: It was fun having a section of the community being on, actually, three television stations. It was two dozen people out there holding candles.

RADIO But it was important that we did it.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: Yeah. It made Channel 11. It made Channel 13. And supposedly, it made Channel 26.

RADIO Now, people might not know what we're talking about.

PRESENTER:

CHRIS: Yes. This past Tuesday was the 10th anniversary of the murder of Paul Broussard. And make sure you pick up your "OutSmart." There's a wonderful article in there on the history of that and some of the scientific studies on it as well. The whole edition is dedicated to the memory of Paul Broussard. And Q-Patrol had a candlelight vigil out there on the evening of his anniversary of his death.

And to have that kind of media coverage for any gay event we thought was pretty amazing. So thanks to especially Tim Brookover for getting the media out there. And so now that I've jumped in over in front of Roy, and so he hasn't even given out a shout-out yet--

BIG ROY: Yeah, well, we've got to give our shout-outs to our listeners. I mean, they do depend on us.

CHRIS: Oh, God help them if they depend on us for their news and information.

BIG ROY: [LAUGHS] Yeah, well, we also got a new listener here in the Montrose. Kevin and his lover Bill are listening in--

CHRIS: That's two new listeners

BIG ROY: --here in the Montrose of all places. And of course, I want to give Randy down there in New Sharon and to Brandy and to a number of our other listeners all over the place. Well--

CHRIS: Blaise and--

BIG ROY: Well, folks, we've got some hard news to head off with tonight, and it's coming from right here in the Houston area, actually, out in Katy. And a Katy teenager told investigators this week that he was compelled to kill his friend due to guilt over their homosexual relationship. John Paul Marsh, 17 years old will be tried as an adult for the March 20th murder of 14-year-old friend Nathan Mayoral.

CHRIS: He was 16 at the time that the crime was committed.

BIG ROY: That's correct. And John Paul Marsh is out right now on a 75,000 bond that was posted early this past Tuesday. And the way the crime was committed, it was an overkill. It was an overkill in a personal relationship. When you have an overkill in a personal relationship, there was a strong bond there at one time. And what I have been getting, what I have been researching at and everything is that basically, Mr. Marsh was troubled because of his church teachings and his scholastic teachings.

CHRIS: And his stepfather's upbringing.

BIG ROY: And his upbringing. Folks, there have been many times when Chris and myself and others here at the station have handled what we would call hate calls, or people would call a hate call at first. And we find out that the listener has been listening in for quite some time to something that they really hate so much. And what it is is that there was the tremendous civil war going on inside of them.

And luckily, people like Chris and myself have been here to talk to these people on the phones and deal with them and help them to come to accept themselves and to accept the fact that they were gay. In fact, I was speaking with Ray Hill, and one of the murderers of Paul Broussard was claiming and is claiming now that he was gay.

And Chris is giving me this real big evil eye, but this is what Ray Hill, who's been in close contact with these people, has been saying. And one thing we do know for sure is that there was a lot of people who's been really damaged by erroneous upbringings and things of that nature. And it comes and it festers. And this is what happens. This is what happens.

CHRIS: Yeah, unfortunately, this is all too common. And it was an extreme tragedy to have it come out with this. And there's going to be a lot of healing that's going to have to be on a couple of different ends on that. Apparently, the victim's father has stated that he and his wife had a very good relationship with their son, and felt that he would have come to them and said, hey, I'm gay. But since he didn't, they really don't believe it. But I'll be honest, if it was just the use of a gay panic defense--

BIG ROY: I don't think it would have been so severe.

CHRIS: Well, not just that, but even the way he described the event, there was a bit of-- there's not as much remorse, but a culpability in his statement of how this occurred, that yes--

BIG ROY: Yes, that's true. He wasn't hiding anything.

CHRIS: Yeah. He's not coming out and saying that, OK, this kid was putting the moves on me and I was afraid, and that's what happened. According to his statement, is that they were partners. They were active in some form of a relationship for some time. And the older person, Marsh, wanted to break off that relationship and the victim didn't want to.

And it seems to me he's taking some culpability in the fact that there was a relationship. This wasn't something that was a projection from the victim. But this is going to be interesting to see how all this is going to bear out in further investigation and when this case finally does go on to trial.

BIG ROY: And then another thing about this particular case is that the parents right now are trying to make it seem like it was a rape and that John Paul raped their son and then killed him. A rapist kills their victim. He does not go to this extent.

CHRIS: Yeah. I mean, just wrapping up on this, you could tell. I mean, they were saying at the very beginning that the way the body was found, that there was some sense of nurturing or love or protection in there, because of the fact the body wasn't just thrown out wherever. It was wrapped. And it was wrapped in a way not just to conceal it, but was wrapped in a way that showed some respect, I think, in that manner. And it is a tragedy. And like I said, this is something we'll be looking at and getting some more of that angle.

BIG ROY: And you'll be hearing more of this later on in future editions.

CHRIS: Oh, yes. Well, this is a topic that I think is very near and dear to our heart of combining hate crimes and how education and upbringing brings into that influence. And maybe we can--

BIG ROY: This is a very important angle to look into.

CHRIS: We can see what we can talk and maybe even get Dr. Ashton in here.

BIG ROY: OK. Now, we got some good news, though.

CHRIS: That's right, there's more. Rural gays, so break out the farmhouses, boys and girls. The US Census Bureau on Tuesday released data on same-sex unmarried partners for five additional states, showing the continuation of the trend of dramatic increases visible thus far. Gay couples reporting their relationships on the census rose 583% in North Dakota, 529--

I'm sorry, 429% in New Mexico, 385% in Colorado, 295% in Oregon, and 271% in Maryland, with data available from almost half of the country, 21 states, plus the District of Columbia reported same-sex unmarried partners has increased an average of 411% across those states. Texas has not been released yet, but is on its way.

BIG ROY: All right. Hey, Jimmy, I hope you're listening because have I got a news item for you to listen to.

RADIO OK. Oh.

PRESENTER:

BIG ROY: I've been pretty obsessed with it and All Star News is reporting that Warren, who just left Duran Duran, has made a mold of his erect penis and is planning to market a line of edible chocolates in its image under the name of-- can I say that on air?

CHRIS: Rock Cock.

RADIO Rock Cock?

PRESENTER:

There is no admission charge. And as always, individual donations will be encouraged to help support the center.

JIMMY CARPER: No, it's that I know it was today, but I want to talk about it.

BIG ROY: The 30th of June?

CHRIS: Yeah.

BIG ROY: The 30th of June?

JIMMY CARPER: OK, the last Saturday. It just came in on hand net.

JIMMY CARPER: Well, that'll be worth it.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, that'll work.

BIG ROY: And I'm going to help spread the word because there's a lot of gay Hispanic people, and Hispanics are really big on soccer.

CHRIS: And of course, Roy, yeah, and--

BIG ROY: Actually, the rest of the whole world is except for the US.

JIMMY CARPER: OK.

CHRIS: And in part, Roy really wants to be an athletic supporter with it.

JIMMY CARPER: And he certainly is.

BIG ROY: I would love to be an athletic supporter. I love American soccer teams.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, you have-- no, I'm not going there. OK.

BIG ROY: I want to go there.

[LAUGHTER]

CHRIS: Well, he does have a lot of timing with jacket.

JIMMY CARPER: There you go. Speaking of local entertainers, we have lots of straight friends who are entertainers, who do things for the gay community. Joel Stein is one of them. He just recently did a fundraiser for the gay and lesbian switchboard.

Even though Joel is straight, he's been putting out music in Houston for quite a while. And he is going to be a guest on Pat and Rosie's Night Sounds next Sunday night, not this Sunday night, next Sunday night, midnight till 5:00.

He won't be there for the whole show. But if you can listen to us, you can listen to him. And he's a real rocker. You will like his music. I've been listening to it at home and oh, yeah, it's good stuff.

BIG ROY: Oh.

Many more Palestinians reported wanted to March with the group, but were prevented from entering Israel territory by security forces.
