We went there today we had over 30 people we have it's like our first demonstration and a long drawn out campaign where we want basically what we want council to do is to enact a non discrimination policy against people with HIV. We want them to adhere to a university precaution guidelines as outlined by the Centers for Disease Control, which mandates use of plastic gloves and
