

JIMMY CARPER: --that, so I'll be seeing you because I also am the co-host for Esoteric Adventures.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Well, wonderful, yeah.

JIMMY CARPER: We follow that, so--

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Well, that's great.

JIMMY CARPER: Great, so are you going to be here like this Friday night?

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) No, actually, this will be my week off, this coming week. I'll be on the 21st.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, OK, fine, fine, I'll be talking to you during the week about what we can do about this segment. OK?

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) That sounds great, Jimmy. I look forward to it.

JIMMY CARPER: So what's been going on in the world of normal?

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Well, I wanted to update your listeners on the Houston DEA cease and desist effort we had this past Thursday.

JIMMY CARPER: Mhm, yes, yes.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) We only had about 30 people show up, but that's 10 times more than we had last time we visited the DEA.

JIMMY CARPER: That's right.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Very brave people that lined the sidewalks there. We delivered a wheelbarrow full of data we wanted to give to the DEA library, scientific, medical, legal, modern information--

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) --to help them, perhaps, change their stance. Well, they wouldn't accept the wheelbarrow. They took a small packet of information, and we hope they do read it. Our event went well, I would think. A lot of dignity involved. They treated us right.

JIMMY CARPER: Good.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Now, because of the magnitude of Thursday's cease and desist efforts in 55 US cities, I want to focus on and quote from a letter written on Thursday by my friend Kevin Zeese. He's an attorney who's devoted 24 years of his life to ending the eternal war on marijuana patients. And here's the quote, "why I put myself at risk for medical marijuana." Excuse me.

"On June 6, reform advocates organized demonstrations in 55 cities at DEA offices across the United States to protest their continued prosecution of community-based marijuana dispensaries, growers, and patients. Medical marijuana providers in states that have voted for allowing medical use are heroes who are risking serious criminal charges for providing medicine to the seriously ill. Reformers across the country need to stand up and say no more. We need zero tolerance for--" these guys always talk of zero tolerance, but "we need zero tolerance for medical marijuana injustice."

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, we do.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) "Now, back in 1988, the chief administrative law judge for the DEA Francis L. Young ended up ruling strongly in medical marijuana users' favor. Judge Young rejected as false the most common argument of the DEA, allowing medical use will send the wrong message, saying the fear of sending such a signal cannot be permitted to override the legitimate need of countless sufferers for the relief marijuana can provide.

Judge Young also ruled that the evidence in the record clearly shows that marijuana has been accepted as capable of relieving the distress of a great number of very many ill people and doing so with safety. It would be unreasonable, arbitrary, and capricious for the DEA to continue to stand between those sufferers and the benefit of this substance. Now, that was 14 years ago, and the DEA has only escalated its efforts to block the seriously ill from getting their much needed medicine.

We still hope the federal government will come to its senses, stop punishing the seriously ill in order to prop up their failed drug war. We hope they will allow safe access to medical marijuana so that the will of the people can become reality, but today, we needed to make a statement. We will not go away. We will no longer tolerate any more injustice. We will stand together against their denial of medicine, and in the end, we will prevail." And I end quote on Kevin.

JIMMY CARPER: Good.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) I wanted to say if you missed my show yesterday with Mr. Kevin Zeese, who along with nine other activists was arrested at the Halls of Justice in Washington DC on Thursday as part of their cease and desist effort against the DEA. I invite you to please visit my site to hear the archive of the show at www.cultural-baggage.com, and as we discussed, my next one-hour show will be at midnight on the 21st. My guest at that time will be-- I'm drawing a blank.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: It's the hour.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Yeah, yeah, yeah, I'm sorry. But anyway, he's a writer who writes for *Rolling Stones* and the *High Times*. I'm sorry I just can't think--

JIMMY CARPER: Well, congratulations on a successful demonstration.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Well, I think it went very well. The good thing is ASA or the Americans for Safe Access will continue these efforts until we make legal medical marijuana available for patients who need it, and I'm not sure how many people came from your show or whoever's show, but a lot of people, strangers, out of the blue showed up from KPFT, listening to the station. And I was real happy.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, because I heard promos from it on other shows also.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Yes, no, no, it was good to see somebody besides normal people, and the DPFT people showing up.

JIMMY CARPER: Good, good. OK, good luck on your show.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Thank you, Jimmy.

JIMMY CARPER: I'll be listening to you next Friday after next.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Friday the 21st.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, thanks. Good night.

CALLER: (ON THE LINE) Thank you, and good night.

JIMMY CARPER: Good night. Dean Becker, the only heterosexual man to ever have a permanent spot on this show--

SARAH: Is that right?

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, he is the local president of Normal, and he is an advocate for medical marijuana for appetite. Cancer patients need it. AIDS patients need it. There's nothing else out there that really works as well as marijuana. That a lot of people take marinol. A lot of people take testosterone shots, both of those can have side effects that are a hell of a lot worse than just the nice little high.

SARAH: I've never understood the objection.

JIMMY CARPER: I never did either. Anyway, we do have a Hispanic show. Francisco is here.

SARAH: Uh-huh.

JIMMY CARPER: And so we need to close this out, and I've got a little thing that I want to do with Chris so--

SARAH: OK, well, let me end this the way I always do then.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

SARAH: When decorum becomes repression, the only dignity free people have is to speak out.

JIMMY CARPER: Thank you, Sarah.

SARAH: Uh-huh, I'll be back.

JIMMY CARPER: You'll be back next month, won't you?

CHRIS: I'll be back next month. That's right.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, OK, well, we'll be doing more then. Let's go to Chris because there's something that I want to do with him. And I--

CHRIS: You want to rephrase that one?

[LAUGHTER]

MAN: Jimmy, you're getting in more trouble tonight.

JIMMY CARPER: There's something I would like to do with him on the air. Does that make it any better?

CHRIS: No.

[LAUGHTER]

RADIO CREW: I don't think so.

WOMAN: You know, you're not some of the visual shows we've seen here, Jimmy.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Oops.

CHRIS: Among other things, that ex-gay movement is really starting to look Good now.

JIMMY CARPER: Hey, hey, hey, hey. I got your ex-gay right here.

CHRIS: I think a little reprogramming could be a lovely idea right about this time of year.

JIMMY CARPER: Well I got something through the email, and it had to do with issues regarding exercise and/or diet regimens. Now, there are a couple of folks on staff who are big, you being one of them, Chris.

CHRIS: Hey, I ain't the one who's called big Roy.

JIMMY CARPER: [VOCALIZING]. That's right, and we wrote the other one.

CHRIS: That's why when Chris shows up here, he goes back to Mikey, so that we don't have to go to a big Chris also.

JIMMY CARPER: Ooh, OK. So there's a little question answer here that Chris and I are going to do, and it has to do with the wonderful-- everyone just loves to exercise and be on diets, don't they?

- Oh--

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, right, OK. So here's a little question and answer here, OK. "I've heard that cardiovascular exercise can prolong life. Is this true?"

CHRIS: Well, your heart is only good for so many beats, and that's it. Don't waste them on exercise. Everything wears out eventually. Speeding up your heart will not make you live longer. That's like saying you can extend the life of your car by driving it faster. Want to live longer? Take a nap.

JIMMY CARPER: Ah. "Should I cut down on meat and eat more fruits and vegetables?"

CHRIS: I want to add to this. Depends on the fruits you eat.

JIMMY CARPER: Uh.

[LAUGHTER]

CHRIS: You must grasp logistical efficiencies. What does a cow eat? Hay and corn, and what are these? Vegetables. So steak is nothing more than an efficient mechanism of delivering vegetables to your system. Need grain? Eat chicken--

- Ba-kock.

CHRIS: --depending on the chicken you eat.

[CHUCKLES]

- Woohoo.

CHRIS: Beef is also a good source of field grass, green, leafy vegetables. And a pork chop can give you 100% of your recommended daily allowance of vegetables slop.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: "Now, is beer or wine bad for me?"

CHRIS: Look, it goes to the earlier point about fruits and vegetables. As we all know, scientists divide everything in the world into three categories, animal, mineral, and vegetable. We all know that beer and wine are not animal, and they're not on the periodic table of elements. So that leaves only one thing, right? My advice, have a burger and a beer and enjoy your liquid veggies.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: "How can I calculate my body fat ratio?"

CHRIS: Well, you have one body. You have a body, and you have body fat. Your ratio is 1 to 1.

[LAUGHTER]

If you have two bodies, your ratio is 2 to 1, et cetera.

JIMMY CARPER: "What are some of the advantages of participating in a regular exercise program?"

CHRIS: Can't think of a single one. Sorry. My philosophy is no pain? Good.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: "If I stop smoking, will I live longer?"

CHRIS: Nope. Smoking is a sign of an individual's statement and peace of mind. If you stop, you'll probably stress yourself to death in record time.

JIMMY CARPER: "Now, aren't fried foods bad for you?"

CHRIS: You're not listening. Foods are fried today in vegetable oil. In fact, they're permeated in it. How could getting more vegetables be bad for you?

JIMMY CARPER: "Now, what's the secret to healthy eating?"

CHRIS: Thicker gravy.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: "Will sit-ups help prevent me from getting a little soft around the middle?"

CHRIS: Definitely not. When you exercise a muscle, it gets bigger. You should only be doing sit-ups if you want a bigger stomach.

JIMMY CARPER: "And is chocolate bad for me?"

CHRIS: Are you crazy? Cocoa beans? Another vegetable and the best feel good food around.

[CHUCKLES]

And I hope this has cleared up any misconceptions you might have had about foods and diets. Have a cookie. Flour is a veggie. And when life hands you lemons, ask for a bottle of tequila and salt.

[LAUGHTER]

[MUSIC - THREE MARYS, "HOMOPHOBIC BLUES"]

THREE MARYS: (SINGING) You're not my judge or my jury. Your friends could fa--

[AUDIO OUT]

Cha cha cha cha.

JIMMY CARPER: In-- you betcha. That was "Homophobic Blues" by The Three Marys. Oh my, and the two women are actually named Mary, Mary Jo Paranzino and Mary Abt. And the male is also Mary, Jon Aterton, who was one of The Flirtations. And that's from their new CD, the Three-- actually it's not new. It's their only CD, *The Three Marys Provincetown's Favorite Close Harmony Group*, self-titled CD. So it is time for Francisco.

FRANCISCO Good morning.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Good morning. How you doing?

FRANCISCO Evening. Doing OK. How are y'all?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Well, fine, and I've already told you the news that we're having a change in time for *After Hours* that starting next week. We're on from Sunday morning, 1:00 AM to 4:00 AM, so we're going to have to drink another cup of coffee and pop those no doughs before you get here.

FRANCISCO I was just telling Roy that it's hard enough for some of us to make it here like--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: I know.

FRANCISCO As we creep up in R years--

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

--1:45 is a challenge.

JIMMY CARPER: I know. I know, and now, it's like, oh my god, I got to get somebody here at 3:00 in the morning for an interview.

Yes, that's going to work.

FRANCISCO So it's like I have to be in at 245 now.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

FRANCISCO OK.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, sorry.

FRANCISCO OK.

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: It's the world of radio. Things change. There's vast changes happening here at KPFT. There are--

FRANCISCO I've seen.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: --someone has told me that there are 25 new shows being added.

FRANCISCO Wow.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: So there are shows that you've been listening to that aren't here anymore. There are some long term shows that are gone. The nighttime music is gone.

FRANCISCO So the *Governor's* gone?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Well--

FRANCISCO His name?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Night-- no, the *Governor Good Grief*?

FRANCISCO The one that comes after us normally.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: He's going to be on Thursday morning, 3:00 to 6:00.

FRANCISCO OK.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. She's still here.

FRANCISCO OK.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, because he is just the last cutie pie.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, I know it.

FRANCISCO Hoo.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: And where was I?

FRANCISCO Changes, changes, changes.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, changes, changes. Some shows now are-- well. Some shows are now going to be on only once every other week. Some shows have lost some time, but we still have--

FRANCISCO Three hours.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: We'll have our three hours. We're just an hour later.

FRANCISCO So we're still the majority of gay and lesbian programming in Texas.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: We are. We are. And as Ray pointed out in an email to hand that late this evening-- actually, he read it to me over the phone because I wouldn't get a chance to read it or print it out, that this station has not only just 5 hours of GLBT programming, but there's another 2 hours with the prison program with Ray because it does serve gay prisoners and gay people. And there are, I don't know how many openly GLBT programmers here who do other types of shows.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: So the community is well represented at the station.

FRANCISCO They're a lot of people.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO So Roy still gets his-- I mean, Ray still gets to do the prison show?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh yes, at the same time, 9:00 to 11:00 on Friday.

FRANCISCO That's really just a tremendous public service, I think, that Ray does in doing that show. So it's nice to know that

SANCHEZ: that is still going to be around. I look forward to seeing how some of the changes work. I know that the KPFT has gone through some interesting times in the past--

JIMMY CARPER: Absolutely, absolutely.

FRANCISCO --year and a half.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: To put it mildly, yes.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, this is kind of-- actually, they have taken many ideas from *After Hours* because of how I kind of sublet it out to folks once a month, and that's kind of where they got the idea for doing shows every other week. And there are some programs that people are going to do something monthly and several shows that are as a special features.

FRANCISCO Good.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Cool.

JIMMY CARPER: And that is to represent more communities and more of the diversities on radio.

FRANCISCO One of the things I've always liked about this show, particularly, is just sort of the magazine atmosphere in terms

SANCHEZ: of how it's done, and just sort of it seems like you spend a whole month going through a whole magazine and do your news section. You got your transgender news section. You've got your Latino news section, and then today, we're taking a little venture on the lighter side. So you've got your little you know, so sometimes you got fun things. We're going to be talking about Hispanic men, and sex, and their preferences, and--

JIMMY CARPER: Somewhere in between, I need to squeeze in something about the Gay and Lesbian Film Festival.

FRANCISCO Please--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Chris has got some information on that that he wants to give us.

FRANCISCO Good, where's he at?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: I don't know. He's around here somewhere.

FRANCISCO Well, at some point, Chris will join us--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh yeah.

FRANCISCO --and let us know. I look forward to seeing some of those movies.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: And--

JIMMY CARPER: Yes? There's a Big Roy.

BIG ROY: Yeah, we also are going to have-- I know it's being put on by Q Texas and a few other things. We must not forget next Saturday, June 22, Gay Date Astroworld.

JIMMY CARPER: Well, that's not next Saturday.

BIG ROY: Then two Saturdays.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

BIG ROY: Well, I don't have a calendar in front of--

JIMMY CARPER: It's only the 8th, honey.

BIG ROY: Oh, oh, yeah.

JIMMY CARPER: I'm old enough. Don't push it.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Oh, Chris, you got some stuff on the--

JIMMY CARPER: Well, before we do this, Jackie Thorn is behind me, and there's a special show coming up at next Saturday. And so since we're a Saturday night show, we got to do those a week ahead of time. Jackie, you want to give us a little plug there?

JACKIE THORN: Yeah, basically what it is is it's a new club up in the Conroe area that has opened up. It's called the Ranch Hill Saloon, and it's owned and operated by two women up there. And they have asked us to put on a show, a benefit show, and so we are doing that this coming Saturday, the 15th, starting at 9:00 PM. And the benefit will be for the Galveston Transgender Shelter.

JIMMY CARPER: Ooh, OK. OK, that's the Ranch Hill Saloon in Conroe. That's next Saturday night at 9:00 PM, great. OK, thank you. Thank you. Thank you. Good night, Jackie.

JACKIE THORN: Good night, Jimmy.

JIMMY CARPER: See you tomorrow, and see you tonight at the Briar Patch.

JACKIE THORN: Yeah, definitely.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, now, OK, let's--

FRANCISCO How are you?

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: OK.

JIMMY CARPER: I'm at the point I can only talk about sex in the moment because it's so hard for me to obtain any.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Well then, Jimmy, what you need to do is join the priesthood. Obviously, they're having more than we have.

JIMMY CARPER: Evidently. It's just that I've always been attracted to older men.

FRANCISCO That explains--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: They've got some very much older men.

JIMMY CARPER: That's why it's so difficult because at my age, how many men are older?

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: You are the older man.

JIMMY CARPER: Out of the grave, you know?

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO So you don't like them to wash the gray out of their hair, right?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, no, I like that gray.

FRANCISCO Who is it that has gray hair that I thought was attractive?

SANCHEZ:

CHRIS: He doesn't have any hair. What are you talking about?

JIMMY CARPER: Everyone.

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO Can't believe I'm going to say this, but I thought you know who is getting gray hair that looks handsome and not

SANCHEZ: my favorite person? But Dan Quayle. Have you seen him?

JIMMY CARPER: No, I haven't.

BIG ROY: No.

FRANCISCO Yeah, he's like--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Really?

FRANCISCO Yeah, so you see like gray coming in--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Great. Now, if he'd just keep his mouth shut.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: If he could just learn to spell.

[LAUGHTER]

And I hear, I've seen that Al Gore has shaved his beard mustache.

FRANCISCO Thank goodness.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO He's--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: It did no good.

FRANCISCO I think men do that when they're dealing with some changes in their lives, and I've done that. And I've noticed

SANCHEZ: that. I think I see that, and--

HUNTER: I could see him with a goatee more than a beard.

[? CHRIS: ?] Why can't he just have a good nervous breakdown like all--

JIMMY CARPER: But yeah, you see, he proved this thing, then all of a sudden, he realized that instead of being more sexually appealing, it just made him look older.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: And so when you're going through a crisis, that's one thing you don't want to look.

FRANCISCO I can imagine. I would have had some issues if I had been raised basically to be president of the United States

SANCHEZ: and won, and then it just--

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

HUNTER: And then have Katherine Harris smirk in your face.

[LAUGHTER]

That nasty woman needs to go back to Radisson and serve coffee again.

JIMMY CARPER: Whoa.

BIG ROY: Whoa.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, you brought the right co-host, yes.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Yes, he did.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO But he's up and about, and I don't know if you've seen him. He's been making the rounds, and it's changed him.

SANCHEZ: He's more energetic. He's connecting a lot better. He's talking from his heart, and--

BIG ROY: He's not so stiff.

FRANCISCO He's not so stiff.

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

But as--

BIG ROY: The look Jimmy was giving me there.

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO Again, the age issue, you really can't-- but with Bob Dole on Viagra, he's--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: [LAUGHS]

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO He can set an example. He's older than the Empire State Building if you did not know that.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Who? Bob Dole?

FRANCISCO Bob Dole is older than the Empire State Building.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Now, that's old. Ouch.

FRANCISCO It is true. I did my research.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Well, Strom Thurmond must be older than half of the whole United States anyways.

HUNTER: The crypt keeper.

FRANCISCO The crypt keeper, exactly.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: He has retired, hasn't he?

HUNTER: Yes.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

BIG ROY: Strom Thurmond has--

FRANCISCO And we are going to be fighting to take that seat back.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: And Strom Thurmond is old enough to be Jesse Helms' grandfather. That's old, you guys.

HUNTER: And Phil Gramm retired, too, didn't he?

FRANCISCO Yes, so here in Texas we've got--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Oh, there is a god.

[LAUGHTER]

HUNTER: Ding dong, the witch is gone.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Now, if we could just get rid of the other one--

FRANCISCO Right?

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: --who saved Texas lots of money by hiring Hispanic people at below minimum wage. She was a wonderful treasurer for the state of Texas. That's who. Right, don't get me going. Don't get me going.

[? CHRIS: ?] Don't get her started.

JIMMY CARPER: No.

FRANCISCO Well, we're going to talk a little bit today about *QV Magazine*. Those of you familiar, we talked a little bit last time,
SANCHEZ: and I finally got myself--

BIG ROY: I love *QV Magazine*.

FRANCISCO I finally got my subscription mailed off today, so hopefully, I'll start getting earlier this week. So hopefully, I'll
SANCHEZ: start getting that stuff in the mail soon, but they did--

BIG ROY: I'm going to have give you my *QV* video that they sent me.

FRANCISCO Oh, do you have a video?

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Yes, of a QV fashion model show that they did out in LA.

HUNTER: Mm

FRANCISCO Oh wow. Hispanic menses in undies.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Yes and less.

[LAUGHTER]

HUNTER: Well.

FRANCISCO We can say more if we're going to be on after 2:45 in the morning, right?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: We can say a hell of a lot.

BIG ROY: Oh, yeah.

FRANCISCO Interesting, no bureaucrat's going to be listening from the FCC.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: I've got a song here. I'm playing [INAUDIBLE] with a big old shit in it.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: And look it, folks, if you don't believe me, just watch some of the novelas on the Hispanic channel, and they have a new Hispanic channel, Azteca.

FRANCISCO Oh, that's right.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Oh, you want to talk about pot. Aye yay yay.

FRANCISCO Have y'all seen Spanish language soap operas?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: I see them every Wednesday night at the community center because Robert's there.

BIG ROY: I mean--

JIMMY CARPER: These men, where do they get these men? Oh my god. I don't speak Spanish. I don't care.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: I'll tell you, and they talk about American soaps being hot. Those Spanish soaps or novellas, as they're called, they put us to shame.

JIMMY CARPER: They really do.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: The men are tall, dark, and handsome, and the women are like blonde and buxom. And they all speak perfect Spanish.

CHRIS: And unlike American soaps, they actually come to an end at some point.

BIG ROY: Yes, they do. They do. They do come to an end.

CHRIS: So that the same actors and actresses don't get 16 Emmys for the same--

BIG ROY: Roles.

CHRIS: --stunts.

HUNTER: Or in some people's case, umpteen nominations and no wins.

JIMMY CARPER: There you go. Poor Erika,

BIG ROY: I think she actually did get a win.

HUNTER: I think she did finally--

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

BIG ROY: I think Erika did get a win.

HUNTER: But the thing is she became more famous because she didn't win.

JIMMY CARPER: That's right. They thought they'd better give her one before she was in the wheelchair.

HUNTER: I guess it's not like the Oscars when you get a fatal disease, they just give you an honorary one.

JIMMY CARPER: I need to jump in here and remind folks that they are listening to *After Hours*, queer radio with attitude on KPFT Houston and KEOS college station. We're legal.

CHRIS: There's a reason she didn't win all those years.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Are we gonna--

JIMMY CARPER: She's awful.

CHRIS: She doesn't-- She has no talent.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Are you still going to be calling it *After Hours*? Or you're going to be like early hours or something?

JIMMY CARPER: Well, as I was saying earlier, *After Hours* first started in September 6 of 1987, and it came on at 2:00 to 4:00 AM. That's why they called it *After Hours* because it was geared up for men who had come home from the bars, didn't find a trick, and they were there by themselves alone. And it appeared for gay men.

BIG ROY: So actually, what we're doing, we're going back to what are we originally was.

JIMMY CARPER: Well, no, we're still ahead of what we were.

FRANCISCO And if you were listening when Scott Lewis was around also that--
SANCHEZ:

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

He also tried to help those people that didn't go home with someone, and--

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, he tried. Yes. He tried to-- Yes, he did.

FRANCISCO Actually, that's the first time Hunter was on *After Hours*.
SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: That's right.

FRANCISCO We were--
SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: Driving around.

FRANCISCO We were both at U of H. We called in to the show.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Really?

FRANCISCO Scott Lewis said, bringeth me some food.
SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: We stopped at McDonald's at the drive-through.

FRANCISCO We went to McDonald's.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: That was you?

HUNTER: Mhm.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh my god.

HUNTER: And so we're banging on the door. We have food. We have food. So we get in, and the first thing like--

FRANCISCO Scott Lewis looks across like the microphone and says, are you uncut?
SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

CHRIS: He has this thing, I don't know,. And then he asks you your shoe size--

FRANCISCO You remember the show.

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Then he ask you about the bunk bed where you sleep on the top or the bottom.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

HUNTER: Uh-huh.

FRANCISCO That was Hunter and I. [LAUGHS]

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh my god.

FRANCISCO Wow. [LAUGHS] Just goes to show that--

SANCHEZ:

MAN: What a wonderful story.

FRANCISCO --someone was always listening and someone's always watching.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: That was like--

HUNTER: Eight years ago, fall of '94.

JIMMY CARPER: Really?

HUNTER: Mhm.

BIG ROY: Really?

JIMMY CARPER: Wow.

BIG ROY: I've been here that long.

FRANCISCO That's amazing.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: I remember that.

JIMMY CARPER: And we were just talking about earlier because the fall of '94 is also the first time I had bisexuals and transgenders on the show.

FRANCISCO Oh OK.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Golly.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO Wow.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: What do you know?

BIG ROY: And I mean, I know I came in a month after the first transgender show because I remember you talking to me about [INAUDIBLE] and how you're all nervous and--

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, well, I didn't know. I didn't know any transgenders, and I had to sit here and talk to one for a couple of hours.

[LAUGHTER]

But she made it easy and I said a couple of wrong things, and I learned over the years. And hey.

FRANCISCO Well, the good thing, I mean, a lot of people probably learned from that exchange, and then that's the point of, I
SANCHEZ: think--

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

JIMMY CARPER: Over the years, we've all learned. I've learned on the air, and I hope people have learned-- actually, people have learned, and I hear mostly from straight people who said, wow, I listened to this transgender show, and I just couldn't even turn off the radio. That was just incredible. I've never heard anything like it or of the bisexuals with all the pagan stuff that GiGi likes to do, or the HATCH segment. It's like, oh my god, there's a group for teenagers who are GLBT.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: You betcha.

BIG ROY: One of the first things I learned, one of the first things I learned on the show was that the host of the show name really wasn't Mary.

[LAUGHTER]

It was Jimmy. I always thought, I was thinking the name Mary.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, that's right. That's all Buddy--

BIG ROY: Thank you, Buddy.

JIMMY CARPER: He only used my name once on the air in all the years I was with him. He only used it once.

BIG ROY: And folks, I actually have at home a very prized possession. I have a tape of one of the early shows in which Jimmy was with the show at the time, but he was in the back. He was in the back. He was one of the back room guys.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. That's really--

BIG ROY: And remember I brought that tape for you to--

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, yes.

BIG ROY: And Jimmy was nice enough to put a date on that thing.

HUNTER: Wow.

BIG ROY: I mean, this goes back a long time.

JIMMY CARPER: Thank you so much, OK.

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO Jimmy.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Let's go forward.

FRANCISCO Jimmy, I must say, you have had a profound effect on my gay life considering I've been-- I never thought that 12

SANCHEZ: years ago when I was listening to this show on the air that someday, I'd actually be on the show.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: OK, thank you.

[? **HUNTER:** ?] That's wild.

JIMMY CARPER: Now, let's get on with the show.

FRANCISCO OK, well, I'll just say my stories. They're like flashback to high school. I don't want to [LAUGHS] do that.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, yes, in fact, I mentioned that to Sarah tonight that you were also one of the listeners way back when.

FRANCISCO Yeah, I would like tune in and out on the alarm clock underneath my pillow, and listen in high school so my

SANCHEZ: parents wouldn't hear me listening to the show.

JIMMY CARPER: I am so damn old.

[LAUGHTER]

RADIO CREW: Now, everyone's--

JIMMY CARPER: I know. You noticed that. everybody just laughs, but nobody says oh no. I'm proud of every year I have. It took a lot to get here, and I'm glad I'm still here to tell you the truth.

FRANCISCO We are, too.

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: Yeah.

BIG ROY: We most definitely are.

JIMMY CARPER: So let's get to the sex part, OK.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Survey says, so what do Latinos really think about romance? We got-*QV Magazine* did a poll and asked some very interesting questions and--

JIMMY CARPER: Who is more romantic than Latinos?

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: No one. Italians come close.

BIG ROY: Nah.

JIMMY CARPER: Ah, but they're smarmy.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Yeah.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Excuse me. Ops. Hello, Mr. Pagano.

[? JIMMY CARPER: ?] Yeah, hello.

BIG ROY: Greeks have no idea what the word passion is.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Oh boy, I stepped into it big time.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: The flagstone question of which do you prefer to see your man wearing, boxers, briefs, or either? 42% of Latino gay men responded 42% boxers, 25% briefs, 33% either. My 1% of neither was not included, but--

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Wow, how did boxers get so popular? You can't see anything.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: No, maybe easier access, but I like to see tighty-whities--

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: You get to see some you know.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: It's some type of tease, but you don't see it, that sort of--

JIMMY CARPER: Exactly, exactly. You see that nice curve of the butt, and you see that--

BIG ROY: It's the visual--

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

BIG ROY: I call it visual foreplay.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, yes, yes.

HUNTER: Well, you should have seen what they had on the stage at Rich's tonight.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

HUNTER: They had porn stars.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

BIG ROY: Really?

HUNTER: Mhm.

BIG ROY: Like who?

HUNTER: I don't know who they were. There was just like six or seven of them, just wearing real tight square-cut--

BIG ROY: And Jimmy, you had a poof up here.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

HUNTER: --square-cut briefs.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh yeah. Oh, those--

HUNTER: And one had a just enormous show piece.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Very large personality.

HUNTER: Yes, very, very talented.

BIG ROY: Then he was well reared, I'm sure.

HUNTER: I'm sure.

JIMMY CARPER: Whoa. Woo.

HUNTER: If he can make me laugh, he can me holler.

[LAUGHTER]

See, see, we have to look at one thing. One of the benefits of us shifting later is all of us here on the second half, we can wait until last call to come into the station.

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO OK, at least, now, we get to leave while we're somewhat sober.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, so finally there's a benefit to us second shifters here.

FRANCISCO We have an open bar.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, we should.

FRANCISCO What's the ideal way for you to end a first date. I think a lot is going to be helpful for people like Hispanic men, so
SANCHEZ: what's the ideal way for you to end a first date? 39% said French kiss. 21% said all the way.

BIG ROY: There you go. I'm in that play.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

Let me tell you.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, yes, yes, yes. Once a slut, always a slut..

BIG ROY: You know that right.

HUNTER: Sluts heal quicker.

FRANCISCO 90% kiss on the cheek.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: (DISBELIEF) Kiss on the cheek?

FRANCISCO No.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: That's--

BIG ROY: Which cheek? Left one or the right one.

JIMMY CARPER: And I was going to say, no second date for that one.

FRANCISCO Yeah, if it was kiss on the cheeks, I would understand.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

FRANCISCO A hug, 17%, a handshake, 4%.
SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Ooh.

BIG ROY: Ooh, ouch.

FRANCISCO That means no second date.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

BIG ROY: That is definitely a no second date.

JIMMY CARPER: That means you don't even get asked for a second date.

HUNTER: --shake over.

BIG ROY: In fact, the handshake means they were lucky that that first date came to an end.

[LAUGHTER]

Lasted as long as it did.

JIMMY CARPER: Wow, (WHISPERS) Handshake.

FRANCISCO Which would you prefer to see your man driving, a truck, BMW, lowrider, Honda, Civic, Accord, Volkswagen Bug,

SANCHEZ: or other. Of course, the truck led at 26%, BMW, 25%.

BIG ROY: That is a very close second.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO Low rider at 19%.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, that's pretty good.

BIG ROY: Unless they're low rider briefs.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Low riders are pretty sexy cars. You think?

FRANCISCO Oh yes. Oh yes.

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: Yeah, it just screams like butch.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: I'll tell you--

JIMMY CARPER: It screams poppy.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

BIG ROY: I've always been fascinated at the Houston lowrider car festival like what they do here. I mean, these guys spend a tremendous amount of money and work on that.

FRANCISCO This is like a huge industry.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, it is.

FRANCISCO It's like a huge industry.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: It is.

BIG ROY: And it's grown nationwide, but it started here, I think.

JIMMY CARPER: But still trucks-- truck is it.

FRANCISCO Truck barely 26% to 25% BMW, is 19% lowriders, and--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: A Honda Civic?

FRANCISCO Yeah, but there's something about-- a Honda Accord came in at 12%.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: And I drive a Civic, so that's even lower.

FRANCISCO And then--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Well, Jimmy, we know you're always on the bottom anyway.

JIMMY CARPER: That is so wrong.

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO Volkswagen Bug at 4%.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Ooh.

FRANCISCO Others at 14%.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, the new ones, I think, are really cute though.

FRANCISCO Yeah, they are. They got a little flower on the little dashboard and--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: It's nice.

FRANCISCO --a little bubble driving around the freeway.

SANCHEZ:

[? CHRIS: ?] Yet they still have the stigma--

BIG ROY: A little flower on the dashboard?

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO Little flower on the dashboard, comes a little flower.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: But I'll tell you, after having a Honda Civic Silver-- the last Honda Civic I had was charcoal, and that was a good car. And now, I have a silver one, and I'll never have another painted bumper again ever. See, with the charcoal one, the bumper was just natural color, and so it didn't show anything. And now, every little thing, you just touch something, and you got a paint chip. It really sucks. It's like the first two months, it looked like I had my car for two years.

[? CHRIS: ?] That's why we wash them.

JIMMY CARPER: [LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Ouch.

HUNTER: Yeah, that would help.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, next.

FRANCISCO Who would you like to must go out with? Y'all want to take some guesses?

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: Ben Affleck.

[LAUGHTER]

FRANCISCO He's not Latin. He's a Yankee.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. OK, Ricky Martin.

FRANCISCO We can make him.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

FRANCISCO Hispanic--

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: Ricky Martin's not on here, is he?

HOSTS: No.

BIG ROY: No, he is--

JIMMY CARPER: What?

FRANCISCO No one responded Ricky Martin.

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: Someone left him off the--

BIG ROY: Well, I mean, he is nowhere on this list, nowhere.

FRANCISCO I mean, have you heard Ricky Martin, his name in the past year?

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: No, not really.

JIMMY CARPER: No.

WOMAN: He won't come out of the closet. We don't like you anymore.

JIMMY CARPER: OK.

FRANCISCO I felt so redeemed when-- as I was saying-- I was watching, it was some makeshift awards thing that was

SANCHEZ: happening in Monaco, and Ricky Martin was getting an award. And I think he's a very handsome, attractive--

JIMMY CARPER: Me, too.

FRANCISCO Attractive body, the way he just moves is also extremely tantalizing, but--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: It makes even straight men look at him and get confused.

FRANCISCO And as we're slowly getting older, like my hair's thinning like right here at the very top.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Ooh.

FRANCISCO I'll admit that. And Ricky Martin was talking in a speech, and he just made a point about Vieques in Puerto Rico
SANCHEZ: and stop the bombing in Vieques where we do military testing and keep all these poor children awake in the middle of the night with bombing away. So he made some comment about that, and then he sort of bowed his head. And the camera just happened to be coming from an upper angle just as he bowed his head, saying thank you, and it caught that like little glimmer of like the hair thinning. And I was like, yes.

[LAUGHTER]

HUNTER: Aw. That's called Rogaine.

FRANCISCO So I felt a little redeemed, but Oscar De La Hoya topped the list at 41%.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh god, what a hot--

FRANCISCO And with a face like that--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: With a bod like that, he can top me any day of the week let me tell you.

JIMMY CARPER: And he's been so friendly to the community.

FRANCISCO Oh, he has been?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

BIG ROY: He definitely has been.

FRANCISCO Not that Ricky Martin hasn't been, but he's much more candid about it.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, and--

FRANCISCO And he's a straight man of sort of--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, you don't expect a unqualified straight boxer, a sports figure, to welcome his gay fans.

FRANCISCO Yeah.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Now, I know this is completely off the subject, but because of you mentioned Oscar De La Hoya, does anybody know who won the thing, Lewis or Tyson?

FRANCISCO No, I don't know who won that.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Chris, find out for us.

JIMMY CARPER: Have no idea.

BIG ROY: He's got our news desk.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, it must be on the AM station somewhere.

BIG ROY: Yeah.

FRANCISCO As long as everyone's body parts and ears were intact, I'm sure--

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: I know.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: Ow.

BIG ROY: The Saturday night bites.

JIMMY CARPER: Who else is on that list?

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Antonio Sabato at 19%, but that's just amazing. 41% is Oscar De La Hoya. 19% second runner up was Antonio Sabato like over 20 points, like almost half folks, they would want to go on and date with Oscar De La Hoya. 18% for Antonio-- 8% for Antonio Banderas, then also with Andy Garcia and Jon Seda, who I don't know who that is, Jimmy Smits.

JIMMY CARPER: Jon Secada?

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: No, Seda.

BIG ROY: No, Jon Seda.

JIMMY CARPER: Seda.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Yeah, S-E-D-A.

BIG ROY: And is Seda-- I wonder if they meant to say Secada.

HUNTER: I think they meant Secada. Thinks it-- John Secada, yeah.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: If not, well, we'll call it John Secada.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, works for me.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Yeah, sure. Jimmy Smits at 4%, Enrique Iglesias at 3%. Oh, I think Enrique Iglesias is very sexy actually--

BIG ROY: Yes.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: --despite that mole. I just think it just-- His personality is also just very nice. Esai Morales, 2%.

BIG ROY: And he is?

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: I have no idea who Esai is.

HUNTER: I don't know who he is.

BIG ROY: Neither do I.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: But apparently--

BIG ROY: He's on the list.

FRANCISCO --he's an attractive man.

SANCHEZ:

[LAUGHTER]

How does this pair up with you--

JIMMY CARPER: Lewis--

FRANCISCO --Roy?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Lewis, eight rounds, knockout.

FRANCISCO Eight rounds, knockout.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Eight round knockout for Lewis.

FRANCISCO Wow.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: All right. Lennox Lewis beat the Iron Man.

JIMMY CARPER: And he didn't get anything bitten off.

BIG ROY: That just means there's going to be another round. There's gonna be a rematch. He must have eaten beforehand.

JIMMY CARPER: He must have, yeah.

FRANCISCO They actually fed him this time.

SANCHEZ:

HUNTER: They had a bucket of chicken outside the ring for him.

BIG ROY: Now, I was reading in one of the gay magazines this week-- I'm not sure if it was in the *Houston Voice*, or if it was in the *Eclipse*, or was it the new issue of *OutSmart*--

JIMMY CARPER: Yes

BIG ROY: --but Mike Tyson, there was some sort of a demonstration in Tennessee where Mike Tyson, there was a anti-homophobic demonstration, and Mike Tyson went and hugged one of the protesters. I'm not homophobic and all that stuff.

FRANCISCO Oh wow.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Go figure.

JIMMY CARPER: Chris?

CHRIS: There was a reason for why there was the gay protesters there for Tyson.

BIG ROY: Which was?

CHRIS: His last major fight that he had when he was during the interview for the conference, he got into a shouting match with the person, and there were some gay slurs that were uttered between the two. And that's basically what started it. So that's why there's been some anti-gay protests preceding the fight and leading up to it as it was going on.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: We talked last month about that gay boxing movie. Did anyone actually go see that? I never did. It was the one with two Latino boxers in the case. You came up, it was showing-- it was a play, and it was showing--

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, yes.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Did anyone go see that?

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: No.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: I heard great stuff about it in the press, but I never actually went to go--

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: No, I didn't.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: --to go see it.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: I wanted to get to go see it. With my work hours and with what I do, unfortunately, I don't get a chance to go out to the theaters. And the funny thing is that I'm finally making enough where I can actually afford to go to the gay theatres--

JIMMY CARPER: I'll remember that.

[LAUGHTER]

BIG ROY: Oops.

HOST: I think you could

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Now, we have at least a dozen witnesses to that fact, Roy.

SANCHEZ:

BIG ROY: Oh my goodness.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, next.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: If you saw the movie, give us a call. Let us know.

SANCHEZ:

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, that's 713-526-5738 526-KPFT.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: And a question on sexuality, what is your sexual orientation, and the respondents said-- of course, these are gay or bisexual men, and so yeah, it's a survey trying to-- 79% call themselves gay Latino males. 21% call themselves bisexual.

BIG ROY: None.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: None call themselves straight. They were reading *QV Magazine*, but-- so that's interesting. What turns you on or what look do you prefer? The survey results were homeboy Cholo b-boy look. I don't know what a b-boy is, but I assume it's Cholo homeboy sort of thing.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, it is.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: 45%.

BIG ROY: Big boy.

FRANCISCO SANCHEZ: Guy next door lucked 41%. I've never understood that category because I had lived in a house. There was a guy on the right side, a guy in left side, and they looked nothing alike so I don't know what the guy next door--

HUNTER: People who shop at the Gap.

JIMMY CARPER: I think that's supposed to be like kind of wholesome, nice guy.
