And our school library had a it was well stocked shelf upon shelf upon shelf of books about homosexuality. In all of this, I mean we're talking 50 6070 volumes. There was one book on bisexuality, it's called the bisexuality Sourcebook. And as I want to say it's by Thomas Geller, gallon something like that. So a little book about four inches by four inches square, maybe about 75 pages. I mean, it's a couple of essays, couple of lists, of, you know, bisexual groups, and that was it. I mean, there was nothing out there. So compared to that, you know, I know of about five or six books, but you know, compared to, I mean, how many are out there about homosexuality, and we don't even want to start talking about straight people.

That was the first bisexual book I ever found. That was actually a book by Lonnie Kaahumanu. And Lorraine Hutchins. And I actually got to meet Lorraine Hutchins. She's one of the CO editors got to meet her to bisexual conference. It was really exciting. And I was so excited. I forgot to get her autograph and I'm still kicking myself about that one. But um, that was exciting because that was a collection of essays written by bisexuals, not necessarily. Well, there were some who were strong in the bisexual community and still are. But just bisexuals like you and me and just talking about their experience. is, and that was really an eye opener because all the books I've ever read about homosexuality and homosexual coming out stories they never seem to fit me. And then here was by any other name a collection of bisexual coming out stories really, really incredible and really powerful.
