MAN 1: Yeah, because I knew Randy. I knew Randy very well. We demonstrated together, we laughed together, we cried together, we were angry together.

MAN 2: Jewel knew him very well too because he was at the--

MAN 1: At the care center.

MAN 2: And on the show.

MAN 1: Yeah.

MAN 2: Quite a few times, ranting and raving.

MAN 1: About something or other.

MAN 2: About something. And I can always remember him at Charlie's ranting and raving.

MAN 1: Perpetually.

MAN 2: Perpetually.

MAN 1: He knew everything on the menu by number.

MAN 2: That's the way we need to remember people, for what they did and the joy they brought.

MAN 1: Yep. But I'm over it. I'll tell you, I'm over people dying. Randy was 25.

MAN 2: Yeah.

MAN 1: And I'm just over people dying at 25.

MAN 2: Well, I don't want to steal any thunder from Randy, but statistically, well, I am 46 years old, and statistically I will not see 50. I am HIV positive, and my t-cell count has now dropped below 500, so I'm looking on the short side perhaps. This is a strange disease. You're supposed to be optimistic and stress free, and realistic at the same time. Go figure.

MAN 1: And people wonder, why are you so angry?

MAN 2: Yeah, yeah.

MAN 1: Yeah.

MAN 2: But we do have a song.

MAN 1: "Goodbye My Friend."

MAN 2: Yeah. That we like to play at times like these by Kara Bonoff. It's a pretty, pretty song and just brings good memories.
