When they concluded that marijuana does not lead teenagers to experiment with hard drugs like heroin or cocaine. This study rebutted the theory that marijuana acts as a so called gateway. And it is a key argument, which has been a key argument against legalizing pot in the United States. Here's a quote kids get their first opportunity to use marijuana years before they get their first exposure to hard drugs. This was from Andrew Morrell, the lead author of the land, the RAND study. He says marijuana is not a gateway drug. It's just the first thing kids often come across. He goes on further to say that to a certain extent, we are diverting resources away from hard drug problems by spending money on marijuana control. This is not having downstream consequences on the use of hard drugs. Now a friend of mine, Rob Campea, runs the Marijuana

Policy Project in Washington DC and he has declared war on the drugs are. They have filed a formal complaint of prohibited personnel practice with the Office of Special Counsel charging the White House drugs are John Walters with violating federal law by using his official authority and influence for the purpose of affecting the result of an election.
