This morning Moscone was to hold a press conference to announce the appointment of a supervisor to fill White's position. White had resigned from the board earlier this month, claiming that the salary was inadequate for him to support his family. Later, he changed his mind and asked to have that position back. Though Moscone had the option to reappoint White, a conservative voice on the board. The mayor had expressed interest in several other candidates. NOAC was a political opponent of whites, an outspoken liberal and the first gay candidate on the board. Harvey Milk was not in favor of reappointing white to his position for Pacifica in Berkeley. This is Lily Franklin, San Francisco supervisor and gay rights activist Harvey Milk was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in 1977. He became the city's first gay supervisor in a city with a substantial vocal gay population. At the time, he said his election would bring hope to minorities and the disenfranchised. Milk said people would say that if a gay could do it, they could do it. But milk always insisted he was not a one issue politician.
