Some police apparently think otherwise. As patrol cars filled with reinforcements left city hall in the early morning. Members of a guard force left behind shouted see the night and bring some big ones back with you.

I think it's important for everyone in this city to know that we're not going to continue to tolerate San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein held a late night press conference to condemn the violence. We police exercise considerable restraint. There will be a major police presence throughout San Francisco. Every law studio officer is being called back to report to the reporters on the scene so that the police did not show restraint when they started clearing the city hall area. Many demonstrators and some reporters were clubbed by police. City Hall sustained major damage and police from neighboring counties were called in San Francisco supervisor Cal Ruth Silva and about 150 other people. Sodomy charges are being brought for the first time under a 1991 Sexual Offences Act in the Bahamas. Cruise Ship employee Malcolm Chapman and Trinidadian Roger Nelson could face up to 20 years if convicted of having consensual sex in a public place on a beach early in the morning and act which is legal for a heterosexual couple.

A new amendment to the national hate crimes law in the Netherlands makes anti gay or lesbian remarks a criminal offence. The phrase vile faggot was given us an example of what might be prosecuted if spoken or published.

The Netherlands may also give legal status to same gender couples nationwide before the years out. According to Justice Minister Aaron's Tish Balan, his office has received petitions demanding gay and lesbian marriage rights from 250 municipal governments 32 of which have already allowed domestic partner registrations

for Montt has become the sixth state to prohibit discrimination against lesbians and gays. The bill was signed into law by Democratic Governor Howard Dean only a week after its passage by the legislature. The six years from the laws initial introduction to its passage was the fastest turnaround of the state so far, which ranged from eight years in New Jersey to 17 in Massachusetts. Vermont's new state law is the most comprehensive to date, protecting gays and lesbians in employment, housing, public accommodations, banking, credit and insurance.

However, religious organizations are exempted opponents of the New Law failed to intimidate its supporters in the legislature despite phone harassment hate mail, flag burnings and death threats. The governor noted if there are people who are willing to go to those kinds of lengths to express their feelings about homosexuals, then it's pretty obvious to me that the gay and lesbian community needs the protection afforded by this bill. This bill is about Vermonters standing up for traditional Vermont values. We do not give in to bigotry, we do not give in to hatred we do not give in to division.

Vermont followed New Jersey as the second state to pass an anti discrimination law in 1992. And four other states currently have bills pending California, New York, Illinois and Rhode Island. The Illinois measure has passed out of committee and will be going to the floor and both the House and the Senate. Rhode Island's house has narrowly approved the proposed discrimination band there in three separate votes on the bills three sections employment, housing and a group of issues relating to credit and public accommodations. Although Rhode Island Governor Bruce Sunland has actually put his support for the bill in writing in a letter to the house, activists believe the upcoming state Senate vote may be a toss up. Although the state Senate passed an identical bill two years ago, term limits have changed the Senate's makeup

for other states, Florida, Maryland, Texas and Iowa have already killed sexual orientation protections this year. The Iowa lesbian and gay rights bill was unexpectedly defeated by the States House of Representatives last month after having passed in the more conservative Iowa Senate. The surprising house rejection may have stemmed from the Office of Republican Governor Terry Branstad, which reportedly pressured House Republicans to vote no. It seems the governor might not have wanted the politically charged Bill landing on his desk requiring his signature for final approval. Over 120 people held a rally in Iowa City late last month to protest the house action. John Deeth was there.

But when the Alliance sought a university Charter, the reverberations went all the way to the governor's office and the state legislature. The bill quote, prohibits any college or university from spending public funds or using public facilities to directly or indirectly sanction any group that promotes a lifestyle prohibited by the Alabama sodomy and sexual misconduct laws. And quote, Governor guy Han is expected to sign the bill since he had been vocal in his opposition to use of public funds for the Auburn group. Civil rights activists believe the measure could not only bar gay and lesbian organizations from meeting on campus, but stop me Things for abortion rights and AIDS education as well.

After the debacle of lesbian icepick murders, queer cannibals and a homosexual cabal that murdered John F. Kennedy. We've been saved from permanent psychosis by way of a new film by Derek Jarman called Edward the second. Derek Jarman is the queer filmmaker of such scandalous semi historical works as Sebastien and Caravaggio. This time Jarman has set his sights on the 16th century morality play Edward the second by Christopher Marlowe and Marlo is perfect material for this iconic class director. In the film, Edward the second is crowned king of England after the death of his father, at which time he summons gaveston His previously banished lover back to the throne. gaveston and Edward enjoy a deliriously happy period sharing both the bread and breadth of England. But while the king revels in the pleasures of the flesh, his jealous Queen Isabella plots his downfall. And indeed, in a scene that gives new meaning to the word hot, Edward the second gets his final desserts. This in itself would be quite familiar territory for any films with a gay storyline. Boy Meets Boy boy loses boy boy loses life. But Edward the second is infused with a political edge that transcends the simplistic morality of the original story. While Jarman keeps the original language, the staging and costuming are decidedly contemporary. And this is where the genius of Edward the second lies, Jarman has managed to fuse the poetry of Marlowe's original work written in the late 1500s. And without a hint of anachronism, placed the story in the present day. There's a marvelous scene in the film of a clash between the king and Mortimer, who has plotted his downfall along with the queen, and all the extras are from ACT UP and outrage. This is not to say that Edward the second is perfect. Annie Lennox of the Eurythmics lends her unusual star power to a sequence that seems more bent on providing a music video with which to sell the film than on providing any narrative fidelity. But all in all, Edward the second is both a visual feast, very reminiscent of Caravaggio with its reliance on dark and light, and a feast for your ears with the language and poetry of Marlo relatively intact. But most of all, it represents our own perspective, a filmmaker who is openly gay making a gay film and Jarman's long history as a filmmaker has and will continue to inspire a new generation of gay filmmakers who are tell our stories as they need to be told. It's a small step, but one that needs to be taken. This is Keith
