And one of the things they find out from knowing the adults involved with our program is that simply isn't true.

our topic is on breast cancer. That's right, breast cancer and cancer in general. Unfortunately, in our community, we have a lot of us don't go have checkups as normal is as most heterosexual women do. I'll put it that way. And there's many reasons for that. Sometimes we feel a little bit intimidated going to the doctor and having to come out as a lesbian or feeling we have to come out as a lesbian. And we just kind of try to avoid it. I know mine personally, I'm for those of you who haven't listened to before, I'm 52 years old and didn't get my first pass marital I was 42. So I understand the apprehension about that. But fortunately, my friend here did take care of things. And Susie, tell us a little bit about what you've experienced here in the last couple of months.

Well, Diane, I'm like you as well, I'm 50. At that age where they tell us women, you need to go have these checkups and how important it is. But again, we think, Oh, this is not going to happen to me, this happens to someone else. And I consider myself a cancer survivor. Yes, you are. And cancer doesn't care. If you're rich or poor. If you're an only child, if you're a single parent, if you're young, or just a small child, it doesn't care. We can be a victim at any at any time. And one day I woke up, and I was one of those people.

Yeah. And you know, they don't care. Sansar doesn't care if you're gay, or straight, or bisexual or at or black or white. You know, there was some misinformation out there. In 1999, there was a study done, that said that lesbians had a much higher incidence of breast cancer than heterosexual women is matter of fact, the statistics were one in three lesbians would develop breast cancer. Well, since then, after more conclusive research, we found that that is not necessarily the case. So just because you're still living on the only information as I was, it's not one in three lesbians. As a matter of fact, we have about only a 1% chance higher incidence of breast cancer, and that's due primarily not because of our orientation, but because of our lifestyle, and some of us drink, or smoke, or party or eat the wrong things and, and like myself a little overweight, maybe those are all contributing factors to that. And one of the other things is pretty conclusive is, you know, if you've had children or breastfed, then you're less likely to have it. But I'm here to tell you here, Susie, my friend has a beautiful grown daughter, she's

had children. So just because you have have not had a child doesn't mean you're going to get it nor does if you had a child, I mean, you're going to get it. Susie, tell me a little bit about how you discovered the want. But

dying, it happened, like one Saturday morning Sleeping in just waking up and doing just some stretching and thinking about my coffee that I was about to have, and, and like, you know, okay, I'm stretching and maybe I'll just do a self exam while I'm doing this. And, you know, just not thinking thing, anything about it other than just a normal Saturday morning. And while doing that, I found a small lump. And just my gut filled and told me this is not right. And I remember just putting my head in the pillow and saying, Oh, my God, this is not right. And then right away Monday morning, making an appointment for mammogram, good for you. And again, it was just a self exam. And it didn't cost me anything. It just took me a little bit of my time. And self exam. I really, really support that.

There's a lot of information on there, including some of the symptoms that you can look for, you know, sometimes cancer can be a very silent disease, it doesn't always have to have, you know, a lump. Yes, that's an indication that you can have cancer before you feel the lump.

I mean, you can have pain or redness or swelling, art or in not alone, just swelling, or a discharge from your from the nipple of the breast can also be an indication. But you know, you can't you can't kind of self diagnosed unless you actually felt a lump. The only way to be sure that nothing's happening is to have mammograms and pap smears. That's it kids. I know. I hate doing it, too. Nobody hates doing it worse than I do, okay? But it's something you need to do for yourself and the people that love you. You know, go get those annual breast examinations and pap smears if you're over 40 If you're under 40 I think it's once every two years that they recommend. But don't wait. Don't wait until the last minute. You know, my friend Susie here is very fortunate. She did the self exam and found it and then immediately made an appointment. You know, some other people I know, didn't make an appointment. They wanted to just go away. Maybe this is something I just didn't feel right or I'm afraid with a doctor's gonna say, and they just ignored it. And unfortunately, it didn't turn out too well. So, anybody's got any

And so I had the tumor removed. And then they said they will we have to run more tests to see if maybe it's made it to your lymph nodes, if it's spread. At that point. That's when I my first surgery was like at a local hospital. And so then I'm like, Well, I'm headed to MD Anderson. And they ran more tests. And they said, Yes, you have there, there's more cancer, we have to do more surgery. And we do need to see if it's made it to your lymph nodes. So I had to make a decision really fast. And I'm not a doctor, I don't have the answers. But there are so many options out there. It's not like we just I had a mastectomy. That's what I had. And but there's so many options is not like it used to be. There's reconstruction, there's implants. My choice was reconstruction. And I'm still in the in the healing part of that. But again, you have to make choices really fast. But there's a lot of information to help you make those choices. And it's not as scary as you may think it is. And so again, I had the Masek, they might my choice was what we would call a mastectomy with reconstruction.

And then if they see something that doesn't look right, they really magnify that picture and they go in for some more intense mammograms. And then they can really fine tune where this tumor is, where it's headed, where it's going. But they really don't know till they really go inside and see what has happened. In my case, it did not make it to the lymph nodes, which again, goes to

early detections, right. Excellent. Big time. And, you know, I don't know how long it takes to go to the lymph nodes. I'm probably depends on the person. I have no idea. But like Susie said, early detection, and she didn't wait a month or two months or a year. She found it Saturday. She called him Monday, and had it taken care of. So if there's anything even, you know, in a lot of times, you know, my age or even over 40 years old, there's these five fibrosis cyst or something they call yes, that, you know, kind of feel like, oh my gosh, and the first time I felt when I said, Oh my gosh, but they're not cancerous. It's nothing to worry about. But it's definitely something you want to check in because feeling it, you can't tell if it's the fibroid sisters, or a tumor, you don't know, you don't know until you go in. After they do a mammogram, a sonogram and examination and determine whether or not it's it warrants a biopsy. And not until they do the biopsy and send it the tissue off for testing. Do they know what it is? You know, after you did the first biopsy, you had to go back to see if it was in your lymph nodes. What kind of test did they do for the lymph nodes? Actually,

But I can tell you some of the friends that you know right now have had the experience either with themselves or people they know that had been through it, talk to them, don't go in a shell, try to keep it to yourself. So nobody worries that does nobody any good. The whole purpose of this talk tonight is to get it out of the closet and out on the table. So people are talking about it or are aware about it. So they know what to do when something is suspicious, you know of any kind, don't wait, get your do yourself exams, do them once a month at a minimum. And even if you're under 40. You know, cancer happens to 20 year olds, there's nothing. There's no reason not to do a self exam once a month, it takes two minutes. I don't care if you're 15 years old, but especially after you're 40. You know, I myself and Susie too, we both been through menopause. And at once you go through menopause, you're have a higher incidence of cancer. So you really need to pay attention at that point. But even if you haven't regular periods, there's nothing wrong with you, you feel great. You're never felt a lump steel, check yourself. It only takes two minutes, and it could save your life. And even if you don't value your life, people love you and imagine what it would do to them. So please do yourself exams. I've got some statistics here for the from the Susan G. Komen organization. It says an estimated 211,000 new cases of invasive invasive breast cancer are expected to occur among women in the year 2005. That's 211,000. An estimated 40,000 women will die from breast cancer this year. That's a lot of people. Not yet. It's not the number one cause of death heart diseases with women. Even though we think that's a man has these heart diseases, but a runner up there is cancer. We don't know what causes it, why it happens. We know that it's more prevalent among Americans. I don't know why. But other countries don't seem to be having this problem. That yes, they do have brisket, breast breast cancer, but not to the extent that we do along with other cancers to maybe something in our environment. I don't know the diet. Another

statistic is that 80% of the women that have breast cancer is not hereditary. Rarely. That's right. And but being that I am that puts my daughter at a higher risk.
