On a single notable day last month, both London and Canberra issued different decisions on military service by gays and lesbians. Speaking for the British Ministry of Defence, Jonathan aid can announced plans for decriminalization of homosexual acts by armed services personnel. However, those engaging in homosexual acts will still be dismissed from the service in Australia, where a number of Human Rights and Equal Opportunity cases involving gays in the military had forced a policy review, Defense Minister Robert Ray reaffirmed the existing policy of dismissing personnel for homosexual conduct.

The Brazilian organization at Toba provided a lesbian and gay presents at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development last month in Rio de Janeiro. Throughout the 11 days of the conference, a Toba presented an educational exhibit on the oppression of gays and lesbians and on the AIDS epidemic around the world.

120 Jewish lesbians and gays from Europe and Israel gathered in Paris in late May for their third regional conference. The series of workshops, political meetings and social events was a model of unity until the proposal of a resolution in support of the State of Israel. Things are changing at the so called newspaper of record, though Salzburg are called for better coverage of minorities and promised the times will come to have openly gay and lesbian senior editors and managers.

Over 800 protesters participated in the first lesbian and gay rights march ever held their a picnic that was the final event of Gainesville gay and lesbian Pride Week attracted about 20 members of the Ku Klux Klan from all over the state. The Klan preached hate messages, displayed signs and distributed pamphlets. But picnickers didn't let them spoil the fun. A lesbian couple kissed passionately just a few feet away from the hate mongers. lawsuits were brought against pride declarations in both Kansas City and its suburb Westwood. Although both cases were tossed out of court. Pride organisers in Kansas City are also pursuing a suit of their own against the police department, which charge them a fee for the escort service. It provides free to other parades there.
