Harry scheduled our interview for late afternoon. He often works into the night and is never quite sure when he will be up. It was a very cold and rainy day as we snuggled under the video lights in Harry's home near Western Avenue in Los Angeles. his longtime companion was at his side.

Well, I was the oldest of three. And I my father and mother were very much 19th century rather than Hunter century people. My mother was madly in love with what I might call Edwardian English life. So consequently, we were raised perhaps a little bit more strangely. Children generally on our block here now labor and I was supposed to set the example for the other two children and of course, so all these have been held with Marcel Shelby's a fairly strict levels, and was not able to fulfill these, in many respects because I was assisting. And the boys, for instance, told me that I threw a ball I could curl. And then I asked the girls, if I threw a ball I could run they said, No, you're going through a ball. I can grow until I could boy, the boys know that. You don't do it like a girl either. You throw it like a sissy. And that's when I discovered very early that sissy was neither boy or girl. It was something else This generation or your kids all grow up, but Oedipus complex is or you have a psych psychiatrist breathing down your neck

and you're tying your aid on. You think that if you're not a boy, you're a girl, because what else is there? And so Susie and girl, the same thing. But in my generation, I discovered very quickly that sissy was quite different from being there. But I want to know about our world. I want to know about people like us and Virgo, I find people like us. How do we, how do we move around in the world? And how do we live in different places. And he gave me that I've always considered was the greatest love Leo's tells me that any young kid just coming out could hear from an older gay man. She said, You go to some faraway place sometime, maybe maybe Darla, salaam, maybe Zanzibar could be an absolutely strange place. And it will have the smells and will have sounds and will have sites that you've never seen before that you're not familiar with at all new feel, utterly out of place, and utterly, utterly strange. And then across the square, all the sudden, you'll see a pair of eyes open and go. And you will try to open the blow your eyes the same way to him as he is to you. And when your eyes meet, and rock, you will go home and you are safe. This I thought was just tremendous load across the world somewhere there were people like us. So this is how we met. And this is what it would mean, to know you like we make that connection. And I would be home and I would be safe. There's just something I've never forgotten because this is there, I knew that I was okay to wherever I was there. This is how you make contact with another like me. And I would find my people. And he had told me many times he did Sunday, maybe you're going to be the one who will find words, the words that we can use to bring ourselves to each other together. We don't have them yet. But we always think someday, somebody's going to find the words, maybe it will be that word. And so long as you keep your vision, clear and pure and true belief and your vision high. You will find those people and they will find you. And when you have the words, you will make it possible. First of all read each other 14, let's say this was the beginning of merging, which would eventually come your degree it was the modern sciences in 1950.
