Also the transgender leadership, much of it met with the Human Rights Campaign within the last few days are talking about transgendered inclusion and to end it. And I will give you a quick peek into how that meeting went. It's it's a mixed bag. It's a mixed bag. It's not bad. So don't worry, you don't

One is the show that we're Beth Richard was the co host and sure we had Cheryl Kosta on the program who's one of only three openly transgendered radio hosts in the country. And I don't know. You know, it's kind of fitting that we're going to have a member of the cart because-.

It's, I was talking having a conversation with somebody the other day, about the number of people that that I have known in the last on the last, I don't know, eight or 10 years that are gone. And it's an amazing number of them who drag queens in. The first one that I remember is a person that many people Houston may not remember a person by the name of Tiger Lil.

Tiger Lil was one of the one of the few people who did live performances in her shows that I can recall, and became very, very famous in New Orleans. And since then, it's been just a continuous stream. But this is one, that community will not easily replay

No, absolutely not. In fact, when they were listing the honors that Lady Victoria Lust has received over the years they did they didn't have enough room in the article to list them all. Maybe there's, there's like two or three paragraphs worth and that just covers the surface.

No, I guess I need to get down here and start reading the paper more often.

It's a nice guy for you know, click up the radio and let Jimmy just you bet TJ faggy. Wait, you can tell we're in strange mood here tonight. Is there a? I don't know, Halloween was last month? I don't know.

It's well, you know, it's National Gay holiday anyway.

That's right. Yeah. So I had a phone call from somebody who said that they heard us talking

about Halloween and said, you know that they hadn't really considered the risks of going out. And that they were glad we talked them.

Right. Right.

S Sarah DePalma 17:21

And you know, that's one of the strange things about the show that we do sometimes will say things on the air and I'll think to myself, is there anyone out there actually hearing any of this? And then a few days later, some Yeah, call me and say you know, I heard what you said in it. It makes me feel pretty good. Actually, it's it's nice to know that, you know, something we say actually registers somewhere. Sometimes it's like, it's like being on the internet occasionally, I think goes into cyberspace and only the Martians ever know what's going on?

Was it from a Hispanic member?

J Jimmy Carper 18:11

No, it's It's it you know how much I I like prison art. You know, it's it's an art medium all by itself?

S Sarah DePalma 18:18

I have never heard of it.

J Jimmy Carper 18:19

Yes. And so I got a card this week with a pop up member.

S Sarah DePalma 18:26

Okay, and got it.

J Jimmy Carper 18:28

And it was much, much nicer looking than Scott's. And it was from an openly queer man to Oh, who listens to the show and enjoys every aspect of it.

S Sarah DePalma 18:41

We've had several cards and phone calls and letters from folks who are-.

J Jimmy Carper 18:45

Thank you, Paul.

S Sarah DePalma 18:45

Who were in, in jail or in prison who were listening to the show. That's one of the things about radio is that it was a no walls can really hold it. Radio over the years has been responsible for doing a lot of things and goes through prison walls.

J Jimmy Carper 19:01

Yes, it does. Yes. One guy got really a wonderful letter from from the man who did the card. Well, that's really, really, really nice. And, you know, it's, that's, that's how we get paid around here.

S Sarah DePalma 19:15

Yeah, it is. And actually, when I made my decision that I was going to resign from the other things, one of the reasons I decided I was going to keep the show that I was wanting to keep doing the show was it was in fact, because of the calls and the stuff that it makes me at least feel like I can be useful somewhere.

J Jimmy Carper 19:30
So we're reaching people.

S Sarah DePalma 19:31
Yeah, yeah. Well, I guess we got to talk about the resignation. Yeah, yes. We got to talk about that first.

J Jimmy Carper 19:37
Yes. Because I'm really surprised. Well, first of all, I was surprised. You had been the head of its time Texas, right. And he had said to you, you know, you know, I don't want to do anything national. I don't want to get that involved. And all of a sudden, you took over the national-.

S Sarah DePalma 19:53
Took it to keep it from collapsing. And because if I didn't, it was going to die.

J Jimmy Carper 19:57
Now what happened?

S Sarah DePalma 19:59
Well, actually, it's a whole lot of things. Let me start from the beginning. I guess the first thing is that I took a full time job. Well, that has a lot to do with stuff. Right. And so right off the bat, the time has simply got constricted. Yeah, it wasn't possible to do. It's Time Texas. And to do It's Time America on the kind of time that I had available. So that was that was a, I'd say that's 50% of it. Right, there is just the lack of time. But there were some other things. There's been an awful lot, there had been an awful lot of political infighting between transgender leaders. And I frankly, just didn't want any part of that.

J Jimmy Carper 20:41
Sarah?

S Sarah DePalma 20:43
No, no, no, no, let me explain. Okay. My only purpose in ever being a transgender, ever taking a leadership role in the first place, is that I felt I could do things that other people didn't, because I knew how it was just that simple. I knew how to do it. And part of what I tried to do is to teach other people how they could do it too, okay. But I found that it was harder and harder

to actually spend time doing that, because I was fighting a constant rearguard action from this group and that group and the other group, and I had told him several times that this, you know, had to stop that it was not what we were supposed to be about. It was not what the community wanted. And I just couldn't, never could, I'm not going to name names on the year, but I just couldn't ever get people to understand that is this. If, I guess maybe I'm from an old school, my feeling is if you're a leader, then that's what you do. You know, you lead, you don't bicker. You can discuss all you want to but you make a decision, you live by it. And I found that I couldn't. I couldn't find many people in the community who were willing to do that. So that was part of it. And then part of it honestly, is I got tired of receiving hate mail from people within our community within my own community. Well, and I'm not talking about, you know, well, people disagreed. I'm talking about hate mail. I'm talking about the kind of stuff like I hadn't seen since I left Texas A&M. And I understand that people are living in there are people who live in the closet, and that they see what we're doing is threatening. But it's, it's really discouraging to try and do what I was what I was doing, and have people undercut you contact the opposition in some case and say, well, they don't speak for me, and then have that thrown in your face. I found that real hard to do, and then have to try and fight the gay community on top. Again, I'm not gonna name names on the air, but there are in the last couple of weeks, there have been several instances of people that I felt thought were friends of transgenders, who have just really severely let me down. When it came right down to it. It was looked out for themselves first in the rest was just talk.

 Jimmy Carper 23:04

Well, you know, what you're stating is not unlike any other part of the queer community?

 Sarah DePalma 23:11

Oh, no, I know that. I know that.

 Jimmy Carper 23:13

And I have seriously doubt serious doubts at it. That not that way, throughout the world, any type of group, you know, the, the black community has same types of problems and all of that. And I recognize that too. Not that I've ever wanted to be a leader. But, you know, I realized, halfway through doing this, this thing called After Hours that I could come in here and do what I do, and get other people to do what they do on the air. And I don't have to deal with you know, this is radio, half the people don't know what I look like.

 Sarah DePalma 23:50

That's right. That's right. I have, I've decided that I am going to continue to work on behalf of a name change bill. I have been working on this bill for for two years now. I think this bill has an excellent chance of passing in the state legislature. If it passes, it would be of tremendous benefit to the people that I genuinely believe in. And I want to talk about that a little bit about why it is that I've kept the show when I haven't kept up. I've seen on the air many times, that I am a firm believer and role models that I think role models are just crucial. And I've often

wondered how my life would have been different. Had I had an openly gay teacher somewhere along the way, or an openly transgender teacher, someone that an adult that I could have sat down and talked to and the fact that that didn't happen, I know you can look back on your life and say, well if this has happened and if that had happened, and there's nothing you can do about that there's really not a lot of point in playing the what if game, but all the same. I really do believe in role models. And I have had numerous calls and in little cards, from people that that are below the age of 18, who are listening to the show, and they're listening to it on Walkmans. And I believe in what I'm doing on the show, there, they are telling me that I am serving as a role model, which is kind of it's a little bit, it's a little bit scary, I mean, but at the same time, I also realized there's a responsibility there. And I really do believe that we have to show people that being transgendered is not a death sentence, it's not a reason to commit suicide, it's not a reason to become an alcoholic, it's not a reason to become a prostitute, that being transgendered is something you can deal with, like anything else, and that there are healthy ways to deal with it.

Sure.

 Sarah DePalma 25:52

And, and I have come to see how much this show is doing that I have heard from people and in so this, there's an area where I know I can still have an influence, and feel good about it,

You know, and that may, that may be the key right there. The transgendered community is much like the gay and lesbian community in that we come from all stratas. And so the big thing in the queer to gay and lesbian community anyway, is that, you know, gay people cannot agree on anything for more than a minute. Period. Yeah, because we are so diverse. We're all colors. We're all we're all stratas. And so, we may, there may not be a queer leader, there may not be a transgendered leader, but there are going to be a lot of people like you who do one thing really well. And you get that, you know, and then that's the step or step on the ladder or a rung up, and other people. Jane Fee has done her thing.

Oh, yeah. And Jane Fee before I resigned, and I talked with Jane extensively before made the desicion.

 Jimmy Carper 27:06

You know, and lots of other people are gonna do the little thing that they do best.

Sarah DePalma 27:11

Yeah, I actually, I talked to Jane before I made the decision. And we talked about several things. And Jane has had the same experience I did. And to a large extent, that's why she is basically backed out of doing it too.

J

Jimmy Carper 27:24

And she's probably seen more of it than you because she's been in it a lot longer.

S

Sarah DePalma 27:29

Yeah, she she's had specific goals that she set out to accomplish. And once they were done, she got out. I had some specific goals in I think in the short time that I was there, I accomplished them. I was determined that it's time America was not going to die. And it was on the verge of doing that. Today, it's time America, signed on to become part of an organization called Gender PAC-. Good. Which is on which they hope will be a transgendered version of the Human Rights Campaign. And I'm very pleased with that I fought for it. I believed in it. And today they signed it. Jessica Xavier will probably take over as the national director. So I know ITA is in great hands. Good. It's time America had not picked up a single chapter in almost a year. And the few months that I had it, we picked up 21 chapters. So ITA is off and running. And I'm very proud of that. Okay, my biggest my biggest disappointment is that we were never able to accomplish anything with the gay community that was meaningful in Texas.

Well, Sarah, your contribution is that you got the organization to pick up 21.

S

Sarah DePalma 28:44

Well, that's right. That's right. My biggest regret is that the LGARL will go blindly on their way into the legislature, and they will say gay, lesbian, gay, lesbian, gay, lesbian, until hell freezes over. Transgenders will not get into hate crimes legislation, because no one else in the state was willing to pick it up and fight for it. And I say that to the transgender community here. The opportunity was there, no one was interested. So it didn't happen. The same thing is true about several other pieces of legislation. We're going to try and take a Texas version of it through and we had we had people signed up to support it. But no one else in the state was willing to fight it with me. It would have been Phyllis, myself and nobody. And I said I'm not willing to fight for community that won't fight for itself.

Simply back take care of your own stuff for a while.

Exactly.

And gear up for the next fight.

Yeah, exactly. And I would say this to the train to transgenders out there. There was a person who came over to my house last week, you know, she knows who she was. I talked to Jessica Xavier today. And they just as I think I mentioned early in the show, eight transgender leaders met with the Human Rights Campaign to talk about putting transgenders into end. This is long story. We've been talking about it on the show now for more than a year. And essentially, the HRC, at the end of the day has done nothing. After more than a year, after more promises and talk, they've done nothing. And Jessica Xavier has basically said to them, Look, we're coming up in February to lobby Congress again. And if you want to come with us and see that what we're telling you is true, that we that ended can pass just as easily with us in it is it can, without as in it come how long. So the HRC has essentially said yes, that's what they're going to do. And in theory, what they've said now is, well, if they see that we've been telling the truth, like forever, they may reconsider getting us in otherwise they may think about doing an amendment. Well, if that's going to happen, that isn't going to happen, because of me, it's going to happen because you out there are going to need to go to Washington in February, in lobby on behalf of your own rights. And I've talked about it on the show, I'll keep talking about it, I believe in it. If I can get the time off to go in February, I'm gonna go. But in the final analysis, whether the transgender political movement succeeds or fails, is not dependent on me, it's not-.

-anybody else know, it's dependent on a large number of people getting off their, you know, what, and making a decision that they think things like end it are important. It's been one of the real disappointments to me to this point, that there hasn't been that we have been able to convince people that it matters to them. They seem far more important in their hormones than they are in fact that this could keep them employed. It's very strange. In I guess, the gay community probably started out that too, there's extreme sense of powerlessness. In the transgender community, there's a sense that they are second, third rate fourth grade citizens, and so nothing they do would matter. And they can't be taken seriously. If there's anything I've tried to communicate to you and the show, is that's bull. Yes, it's utter absolute nonsense. But that still persists in so I'm gonna stay on the air, and I'm gonna keep trying to convince you that it's nonsense until you get it good.
