Meet town hall meeting that happened today over at baring Memorial United Methodist Church on Harold Street. Michelle and I were both present for this meeting. present at that meeting was Texas Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee from the 18th congressional district, along with a nice Parker, city council woman at large. And quite a lot was talked about at that meeting.

Yeah, it was really interesting meeting. Again, this is the second round table discussion. This Ben had in Houston, specifically about the hate crime that was committed in Jasper when Mr. James Harper Jr. was murdered last month, that again, his sister and his daughter both showed

up and both testify for the record on their feelings about hate crimes and their support of the hate crimes bill, which by the way, we understand is now going to be called the James Byrd Jr. Hate Hate Crimes Prevention.

That's correct. Also present at that meeting, was acting assistant secretary, Acting Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights. Mr. Lee?

Yes, Mr. Bill Ionley.

You're correct. A and the eldest daughter and sister of Mr. Byrd were there and they both had a very poignant entry into the into the discussion. And one of the mazing things that I found out that the current hate crime legislation has is so narrowly focused right now. That it's really incredible the way it's really working. I mean, it's,

that's, that's at the federal level. In order to get the crime, the hate crimes bill passed several years ago. Not only did they limit those people who were covered, which means it only covers race, religion, ethnicity, national origin, it didn't cover and it doesn't cover sexual orientation, disability, or gender. In addition to covering the few categories that it does cover, it also requires that when a hate crime is committed, it be committed on Joy during the victims. During only certain acts that the victim is doing, that are federally protected, such as going to school, acting as a juror in public transportation.

video game. That came that actually. If you're in a convenience store, and it doesn't have a video game, then it's not a hate crime. If it does have a video game, then it is a call. That's very confusing, but that comes out of law. And that comes out of a case that occurred where the video games were considered something done on a nationwide basis, and therefore were part of interstate commerce. I don't understand anyway, the new law if it passes, and in order for it to pass, it needs support from a lot of people. It needs support from everyone in Congress, and there are a lot of people who don't support it. But if it passes then it will cover more categories that try to get sexual orientation or gender and disability into the eye and it will eliminate the

requirements that it be only only a hate crime when it's done when the victim is doing these few things that are federally protected. They're going to eliminate that for Shouldn't they hope only if it passes, however?

And this is the hate crimes bill that they're going to try to pass this coming year, and the state legislature. So that's why they were gathering information. And this one today was somewhat differently focused, although there was talk about the hate crimes bill, the federal bill, and there was some alluding to the state bill. The thing that a lot of the panel members brought up, and that Mr. Byrd's sister, and daughter both brought up was the need for education in the community, and cooperation within the entire community. And that's not just the gay community. That's the entire community of Houston, and of Texas, we work together in coalition to make sure that violence is considered as as considered abhorrent behavior, and is not tolerated.
