- Well, sure.
- Clyde Wilson told Governor White, one of them that I was the most dangerous person in the world because there was nothing about Ray Hill that he doesn't wear on his shoulder--
- Yeah.
- --and rub in people's faces. And everybody else, according to Clyde Wilson, has got something rattling around their closet.
- That's for sure. Well, I've got a few skeletons.
- I don't think so.
- But they're way back in the closet.
- I think we've got you figured out.
- Yeah.
- Hold on, just a second. Line one, where you calling from?
- [INAUDIBLE] Houston.
- Well, you're on the air.
