the endorsements for the upcoming primaries in March resulted into surprises. However, many participants were left with the impression that some changes in procedure for future endorsement meetings were necessary. Because of the show at the summit. The meeting held at the Bristol bar in Greenwood Plaza started almost an hour late as members fought the traffic into the parking lot. Then problems with parliamentary procedures caused delays in what should have been a smooth running and fairly non controversial proceeding at Gmail chaired the meeting that saw 36 candidates who were either in attendance or sent representatives. Several candidates appealed to the Alliance for endorsements and races that the committee had decided not to consider for endorsement. It was not until after a great deal of confusion and discussion that the point was clarified. Finally, it was explained that the slate were approved as it stood. The Houston Harris County in Texas Health Departments are not spending any money on AIDS education and outreach in Houston's gay community and epidemiologist said Thursday. Speaking before the Greater Houston AIDS Alliance, Robert Valetti, an epidemiologist with the University of Texas School of Public Health, said that to his knowledge, quote, local government agencies responsible for the education and prevention of disease have not developed, implemented or contracted for any sustained programs directed at reducing male to male transmission of the human immunodeficiency virus since the epidemic began in quote. A lady who was aid surveillance coordinator for the Houston health department from 1984 to 1989, said some federal funds have been channeled to agencies attempting to reduce male to male transmission of the AIDS virus, but that local money spent by the departments were limited to testing and counseling for male homosexuals. Ralph Lasher, director of the Montrose clinic said no study has been done to determine how the sexual behavior of the Houston gay males have changed due to AIDS. Last year said The clinic has applied for funds to complete such a study to orphans led he said people point to the success of outreach programs in San Francisco which has the second highest number of AIDS cases, as proof that the education and prevention in the gay community is no longer needed. The Reverend Chris Steele Chairwoman the legislative Task Force on AIDS which disbanded in 1989 said the problem with state funding is that the state health department cannot be perceived as promoting behavior that violates the state sodomy law which Grimes Alliance member and director of the AIDS education and training center at the UT School of Public Health, so the Alliance needs to work with city and county officials to improve education and prevention efforts. The Church of England has confirmed that it's repressed a report it commissioned the 1986 which recommended that the church considered blessing gay and lesbian relationships. The 134 page report was written by committee headed by London Deaconess June Osborne, but it was never made public. Reports said that many gay men and lesbians have had bad experiences with the Church of England, and that the church's bishops have a quote particular responsibility to set a tone of welcome and acceptance. Top church officials say that the report is advisory, not policy and will not be published.

Opponents of the new Massachusetts gay and lesbian civil rights law have gathered enough signatures to qualify a repeal measure for the state general election ballot, according to the Secretary of State's office. Opponents file petitions were 60,000 signatures, although they only needed 25,000. Last November, Massachusetts became the second state in the US to pass anti discrimination protections for lesbians and gay men. Opponents of the measure originally insisted that religious institutions be exempt from the anti discrimination law. That exemption was included to get the bill passed in the legislature. Ironically, the Massachusetts State Constitution prohibits repeal of any legislation which contains religious content, and the state Supreme Judicial Court must now decide whether placing the repeal measure before the voters would violate that constitutional provision.

This is a dangerous message to convey at a time when violence against gays is reaching all time highs. We urge Atlantic Records to stop conveying messages that promote anti gay violence. We're asking you to write to them and to tell them that you will not tolerate these kinds of anti gay attitudes. Last year, when the fifth International Conference on AIDS was held in Montreal, the Canadian government temporarily suspended its immigration regulations, which otherwise bar people with AIDS from entering the country. The Montreal organizers convinced Canadian officials that the presence and participation at the conference of HIV positive people was essential for a meaningful exchange of ideas and information between the experts and the people carrying the virus. This year, San Francisco is the site of the sixth International AIDS Conference. As in Canada, American immigration laws can deny entry to HIV positive people and to complicate things US immigration officers can also turn away at the border people they suspect of being gay are lesbian at a specially convened international meeting people with AIDS decided to boycott the San Francisco conference. David Lewis at the Vancouver Aid Society explains why

And we landed, and we had been in, obviously out of communication for some 12 hours traveling, and we get into Berlin, and we hear the wall was coming down. Well, of course, we're all excited and went to the wall, of course, and saw all the activity and touch the wall and took off, you know, knock down our own little piece of the wall, of course. But then we went over to East Berlin. Now normally, that would not take very long, but in this day, because of the crowds and the commotion in the situation, it took us about an hour and a half just to get through the

checkpoints. So we went, we were able to get a hold of our contacts because all the phone lines were totally jam packed. So if we stick to our schedule and go to the church, where we're supposed to meet Peter Sadler, Peter

Well, the people in East Berlin don't see it that way, quite honestly. And in fact, there are some 17, gay official gay organizations in the German Democratic Republic. And that does not include the artificial gay discussion groups, which are which meet in the various churches, which has met long before the official German organizations. But the German Democratic Republic believes that if there's a need for something, they will provide it, therefore they created these gay organizations,

Interestingly enough, AIDS care in eastern East Germany, or German Democratic Republic is somewhat decent, all drugs that are known that are useful, that help in treatment of aids are available. They also have hospice care, and many of the things that we have here, you also have to remember that East Germany is considered one of the most fluent of the socialist countries. And they do try to provide for anything that is needed by their

citizens, including AZT. AZT is available, free of charge free of charge from AIDS patients, and they don't blame the AIDS patients for having AIDS. It's kind of it's very interesting. It's absolutely fascinating. Well,

Some examples, when, while we were there, when there was the world premiere of the first officially sanctioned East German gay film, dramatic film, it was called coming out, and they pronounced it in English coming out that in German, which was, I would say, similar to our boys in the band, but it was about a school teacher coming out himself and deciding, you know, he's going to accept himself for what he is. And in the film, they have a depiction of what gay bashing is in East Berlin. And it's skinheads. Yes, they have skinheads in East Berlin also. And they have those same problems?

I think they have almost similar situations that we have. The state is against says, of course, they're against any form of violence, and we'll try to solve it. But what they don't have that we do is education, materials and homophobia. They really don't have them. They're just beginning to get that area. And interestingly enough, I think the most important issue is the financial issue. For instance, many gay people would like to go over to West Berlin, and see the situation and see what gay life is really like. But when they get take their train path and go over to West Berlin, they go over there to transit map, but very little money in their pocket. They can't afford a night out in the bars in West Berlin. They can't afford it. The average, East German makes approximately 40 hours a week.

That's a great question, especially with Eastern West Berlin, because there are two gay radio shows that play throughout the week in West Berlin. And they're able to be heard in East Berlin.

So the people in East Germany gay people in East Germany have a very good idea of what's happening in the outside world. Excellent idea. In fact, it was interesting. The second day the wall was open. Gay people from East Berlin were already going to man meter which is a gay center in West Berlin. They knew where it was because of the radio show. I spent an evening at Mad meter talking with the East Berliners as they came over. And Troy was trying to find out what their impressions were and what interesting things they wanted to do. though, what they wanted to do was see gay bars. They were very much afraid of the Western culture and the big a word AIDS, because their propaganda had always said that if you go to the west, you have to be leery of AIDS.
