They charge Myers with lobbying for Indiana laws allowing the quarantining of people with AIDS as well as backing mandatory testing and reporting of people who test positive for the HIV virus. Mayor Dinkins had appointed a transition team to oversee the selection of a new health commissioner American Foundation for AIDS research President Mathilde Krim, who is a member of the search committee recommended that a more thorough search be conducted before endorsing Myers apt have also sent a letter to Jenkins asking for an independent investigation of Myers record, but Crim retracted her request for further investigation. And the committee unanimously endorsed Meyers Mark Harrington is a member of act up who says although they're protesting outside of City Hall, it's not Dinkins, whom they're targeting.

The people that were angry at are those in the transition search committee that looked for the health commissioner that are supposed to represent the concerns of the AIDS community. Mr. Tim Sweeney from Gay Men's Health Crisis, Dr. Matilda Krim, from amfAR and Deborah Fraser housy, from the black leadership commission on AIDS. All they did in investigating wires was to interview him directly, rather than talking to people in Indiana. And when we finally contacted people in Indiana, we heard how bad his record of working with those community groups was. So they didn't really want to do this investigation. my association with the Gay Games goes back to the first games in 1982. I was the tournament director for the tennis tournament in an all volunteer organization. And in 1986, when it was proven that this could be a next successful event. They got some money to hire staff. And I was lucky enough to be the executive director for the project and the only employee for three years leading up to the games in 1986. So it was an extraordinary experience for me and one that I enjoyed tremendously. But for the last three years, people have asked me in San Francisco, whether I was going to be involved in organizing the Games in Vancouver and I've said no way I'm just going to go up and play tennis in August. I'm not going to be have any responsibility whatsoever. But as as things often happen, you can't predict the future. And I got a call from Vancouver to ask if I could come up for a few months to lend my expertise and to kick the event into high gear, as they were waiting for the availability of their new executive director who will be starting at the end of January. So I am having devoted this many years of my life to the success of the games. How could I say no?

That's great. And for Gay Games, three in 1990, do you feel there is a stronger response from the continental and international gay community than in 1986?



10:34

Definitely, the spec spectrum of the games and the outreach of the games has continued to expand tremendously over the last eight years. In 1982, there were people from 14 Different countries in 1986, from 17 different countries. But I think that in 1990, the expansion has been we're seeing now the expansion is tremendous. I think that has a lot to do with the fact that people in Canada are more sensitive to international representation, and by being part of the British Commonwealth, have much more of a facility for translating their message to a variety of different cultures. We're lucky at this point. We're recording this in mid December. But we have about 1400 athletes already registered before our May 31 final deadline, and we have people, volleyball teams from Germany, we have registrants from Switzerland, from Israel, from Australia, from New Zealand, from a variety of different places in Europe. And while there were was a core participation from many of those places in 1986, the same thing has happened internationally, as this happened with the total growth of the games, which is that a few people went back to the places they were from and said, You can't miss it next time you have got to be there. So we are seeing, I'm quite happy to say we're seeing a tremendous expansion internationally as the games get more of an international flavor. Of course, this is the first time that they have been outside of San Francisco. So I think that in itself has lent a lot of impetus to the growth of international participation in the games.
