You saw it all on television. Right? Well, let me tell you what I saw. The first thing that gave me the impression that this would be no ordinary weekend occurred about 10 miles outside DC I already told you about that the guys with the rainbow flag tooting their horn. I saw the steps of the Capitol covered with gays and lesbians and their friends and supporters seeing the marches theme song I heard hundreds and hundreds of voices harmoniously repeating the catchphrase no one is free until everyone is free way. I saw middle American PFLAG parents with their polo shirted offspring, sharing hotel elevators with nipple ringed Leatherman comfortably. I was there. I saw children being children chasing each other barefoot through the grass on the Washington Mall, running away from two mothers being reprimanded by two mothers. I saw more than 5000 gay and lesbian couples joined together in a commitment ceremony having been inspired by the example and encouragement of two elderly gay lesbian couples who had spent their entire lives together in a loving monogamous marriage like relationship. I cried them even though it's illegal. I saw performance by Naughty a comic with AIDS. He was funny, he was topical. He was emaciated. If you ever have the opportunity to see this guy in his show do so you'll laugh till you cry. I saw two beautiful men from Houston carrying a beautiful portrait like banner of themselves and their two beautiful young sons. Under the heading we are family. I saw 1000s of new panels displayed for the first time with the names project AIDS Quilt on the expansive lawn between the Lincoln and Washington memorials. It was the only time during an otherwise very bright and sunny weekend that the skies turned dark and rainy. I saw no one using drugs or alcohol during the march by the way. Very impressive. I saw uniform a uniform no I saw uniformed middle aged white men on the steps of the Pentagon laughing smirking as they watched they lift the band demonstration on the lawn below. I saw a middle aged Hispanic man obviously a veteran burst into tears begging them screaming at them to stop laughing. He held an American flag and a rainbow flag. I saw the expression on my family's collective face when they open Newsweek on page 43 and saw my picture in an article with the headline get this gay power is making gains the old fashioned way with money and insider cloud Oh, snap for that.

You know what else I saw 300,000 people marching in front of me down Pennsylvania Avenue past the White House toward the Capitol. Then I turned around and saw at least 700,000 More behind me. It leaves.
