Oh, Senator Jesse Helms of North Carolina, who is not on this committee, sat in on the meetings and started the movement, if you will, to vote on home on her separately. That's what they're doing now. She has been called, among other things, a damn lesbian, a, not a garden variety lesbian, but activist mean, lesbian, Phil Gramm, our great senator here in Texas has changed his vote originally he was not going to oppose her nomination. Now he is they're essentially making fools of themselves. Some of our better friends in the Senate, Carol Moseley, Braun, Barbara Boxer, among many others, Dianne Feinstein, some, some very some men who have grown some testicles recently, if you would have stood up in and testified as to how embarrassed they are. Lloyd Benson today as our Secretary of Transportation, Treasury, Treasury, some money or something cars or something. Yeah, they're making fools of themselves, but it wouldn't hurt to call Mr. Graham's office or the president's office and say, you know, get over it. Roberta Acton berg is highly qualified, and she needs to have her job. It's very important job. And if they if the fact that they're gay or lesbian is brought to the attention of the Armed Services officials, they are supposedly going to be directed not to listen to it. Sort of know ask, don't tell. It's still a second class citizenship, in my opinion. And perhaps some people are looking at this as a partial game that we can build on later. But there's just still something in me that says, I want it all. I don't think it's naivete or childishness, necessarily. I'm just tired of it. I'm tired of the soldier of the year. Coming out of the closet being thrown out the next day. I'm tired of Marguerite camera, Meyer 26 years nurse of the year, coming out of the closet. She's out the next day. You know, I know some of these people that are anonymous there that have had excellent service records. They're gay, they're lesbian, they're gone. It's not right. I would rather not serve with full understanding of why I'm not than to just be excused if I'm quiet. I'm tired of that. So I don't I don't like Congressman Frank's compromise. At all,

But I was just amazed this week, I had the day before the city released a new booklet, a newspaper, if you will, a tabloid type paper, Glenda shared a copy of it with me, they printed up 50,000 of them, and they will be available at various clinics and other forms. And it's called a student's guide to HIV and AIDS is excellent for anyone. I have seen similar brochures like these, literally, all over the United States and Europe. And it's if not the best one, certainly one of the two best that I have ever seen. It's gender sensitive, its sexual orientation sensitive, it's full of common sense, it doesn't have too much of a stress on the unrealistic expectation of, you know, monogamy and abstinence as but it does, you know, include that in there as it should. It's just an excellent document. And as a minor point, I want to thank the city of Houston, moving forward on on our community recommendations, because that's where it


came from. And it doesn't really matter, you know, who gets the credit. But what really matters is that folks go out there and find this H A student's guide to HIV and AIDS. It's an excellent, excellent paper. It's, it's fun, it's easy to read, it's informative, and I really can't say enough good things about it. So you can call the city of Houston health department and ask for it for your organization asked for it for your school is made to be in schools, and I would really love to see them run out of the 50,000 that they had printed and have to print some more.
