

SPEAKER 1: [? --result ?] the measure that would legalize the cultivation, possession, use, and distribution of marijuana for seriously ill patients whose doctors recommend it could be put on the ballot as early as November. Now the right horn of prohibition, Mr. Bob Barr said the Supreme Court had ignored the constitutional right and responsibility of Congress to pass laws protecting citizens from dangerous and addictive narcotics. SPEAKER 3: I love that.

JIMMY CARPER: I don't know if there were any four better voices than the original Flirtations. You know--

SPEAKER 3: Michael Callen was the lead singer of the Flirtations.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, yeah. You know, there's been all kinds of different acapella groups from The Nylons to Sons and Lovers and--

SPEAKER 3: Men Out Loud

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, Men Out-- it's just-- and they're good, but they're not The Flirtations. You know it. And if you don't have the two original Flirtations albums, right?

SPEAKER 3: Then you don't have a queer collection.

JIMMY CARPER: Then you don't have a queer collection is right. The original one called the self-titled Flirtations, which the song came off of, excuse me.

SPEAKER 3: And the follow-up you're mentioning is called *Out On The Road*.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah and that was the live one. That had some of the same, but had some little stories and some different things.

SPEAKER 3: Oh, they're funny.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, yes. Yes, very, very good. I never got a chance to see them together.

SPEAKER 3: I saw them, but Michael had already left the group. I saw them once at Fitzgerald's.

JIMMY CARPER: Really?

SPEAKER 3: Yep. Mm-hmm.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

SPEAKER 3: It's precious. But the title of the CD is called "My Love." And that's the title of the song.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, you're saying that's-- yeah, he does all cover tunes.

SPEAKER 3: They're cover tunes. This one, he wrote different words to a Lionel Richie song, which I'm sure you'll recognize the song.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, right. Yeah, I'll remember it. And you're listening to it on *After Hours*, queer radio with attitude on KPFT Houston and KEOS College Station.

JIMMY CARPER: Whoa, that ended kind of quickly there.

SPEAKER 3: Quick ending.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. Sure was. Sure was, sure was. And that was--

SPEAKER 3: Steve Lynn.

JIMMY CARPER: Steve Lynn, I remember that name.

SPEAKER 3: You know, I don't really know much about him. I just had this. It's a four-song CD. And that's all I have on him. I don't really know him or any details.

JIMMY CARPER: Well he used to-- I remember him from bar ads because he would-- I don't know, 10, 20 years ago, I think, he came to town and--

SPEAKER 3: Did the [? DRB and so forth? ?]

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, did all of that kind of stuff. That's how I know that name.

SPEAKER 3: Well, it's nice out country.

JIMMY CARPER: But that's about all he's ever done, huh?

SPEAKER 3: Yep, all that I know of.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

SPEAKER 3: Before that, we heard Matthew Heath-Fitzgerald doing "My Love."

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

SPEAKER 3: Brand new guy.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. And to the tune of "Lady."

SPEAKER 3: "Lady," the Lionel Richie song.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, yeah. That was nice. And it's all covers.

SPEAKER 3: Yeah, it's all cover songs. Mm-hmm.

JIMMY CARPER: So that is Matthew Heath-Fitzgerald.

SPEAKER 3: And I suspect one of them is his boyfriend's name.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, well. And you found him on the internet.

SPEAKER 3: On the internet.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. As you find a lot of these folks.

SPEAKER 3: Yeah. This was actually found in eBay.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh really?

SPEAKER 3: Yeah. Apparently, his manager was selling the CD and that sometimes you get exposure by having the CD for sale on eBay.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

SPEAKER 3: And so I saw it and said, well I'd never heard of him. So I did a search and right away he found his web site.

JIMMY CARPER: And so what you bid on it or what?

SPEAKER 3: No. I mean, I just bought it from him.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, OK. That's how that works. Do you still get nervous if you don't get one CD a day?

SPEAKER 3: Well I usually get one CD a day.

JIMMY CARPER: You are more music than I ever thought of being. And that's why it takes two shows.

SPEAKER 3: Yes.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah. What have we got going--

SPEAKER 3: I don't remember. What did I give you?

JIMMY CARPER: I don't know. David Brown.

SPEAKER 3: David Brown, "Every Kiss Is A Revolution."

JIMMY CARPER: Yes, yes. We haven't played that in a very long time. And that's another one of those nice message songs. I'm a freak for message songs even if it's not openly gay. It's just the message of standing up and being yourself and being proud of who you are, that type of thing.

SPEAKER 3: I played that song when we were doing-- before I got the show *Queer Music Heritage*, when we did those two little shows.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

SPEAKER 3: I played that, David Brown. And I wrote him about it. And he wrote back the nicest email and said, it brought tears to his eyes that somebody had got it.

JIMMY CARPER: Really? Yes and at least 19,000 people out there are getting it right now, David Brown.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

JIMMY CARPER: There, I did it again. See, let me-- this is one of those CDs where nothing's numbered, right? And so it says side A and then it goes on. And so I'm counting down, and I counted side A as a song. So I went--

SPEAKER 3: Millions of people have done that, Jimmy.

JIMMY CARPER: Thank you so much. And so, it's really the number two I wanted to play instead of "Kathy and Claire."

SPEAKER 3: Maybe we just better play it.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, I think so.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah.

SPEAKER 3: Jesse Hopeburg.

JIMMY CARPER: Jesse Hopeburg. Yes, now that's the name I haven't heard in a very long time. And he's [INAUDIBLE] too.

SPEAKER 3: Yeah. It's been a while.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, it certainly has. And of course, there's no date on it.

SPEAKER 3: It's probably like '96, '97, something like that.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, but he had a-- I have a cassette tape of his from much earlier.

SPEAKER 3: Different songs?

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, different-- yeah, yeah. The Constant Thing, "I Was Raised A Straight Boy." I like that one.

SPEAKER 3: Before that was David Brown from the *Splendid Wings* album.

JIMMY CARPER: And yeah, and you know those two songs, you were saying they-- you just think of them together. And they do go together. "Every Kiss Is A Revolution" and "I Was Raised A Straight Boy But I'm Not Today." Of course, we were all raised straight boys.

SPEAKER 3: You tell me.

JIMMY CARPER: Except for the women and yeah, it just-- that's what I don't understand about our detractors. You know, it's like, we all came from family values, hello?

SPEAKER 3: But yet we recruit.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, exactly.

SPEAKER 3: And this is a very fun song by Comfortable Shoes.

JIMMY CARPER: It is.

SPEAKER 3: A medley of Helen Reddy songs.

JIMMY CARPER: The first time I heard this was because I was a judge for *[? Glamor. ?]* And it was sent to me, and I just went crazy over it.

SPEAKER 3: I think that's when I heard it.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes. I thought it was great. In fact I played it on the air from the tape that they sent me. So this is great. JD, thank you so much for being here.

SPEAKER 3: Oh, you're welcome.

JIMMY CARPER: Every fifth Saturday--

SPEAKER 3: Great, every month that has a fifth Saturday.

JIMMY CARPER: Every fifth Saturday, every month that has--

SPEAKER 3: A fifth Saturday. They're not the same thing.

JIMMY CARPER: That's not the same thing, you're correct. Every month that has five Saturdays, you're here.

SPEAKER 3: Yeah. And you are changing meds, right?

JIMMY CARPER: I am changing meds, yes. And I better do it quick. Anyway, thanks for the great music, and we'll see you in, I guess two or three months because it happens every three months.

SPEAKER 3: Yep.

JIMMY CARPER: Something like that. OK. Coming up, the group is going to be here.

SPEAKER 4: Reported cases of AIDS have risen 39% in Houston over the past year. Many people currently do not know their own status. Many people are concerned about what information they have to give for testing or are afraid about how they learn about the results. JIMMY CARPER: Please. Please.

BOBBY: It would be a problem.

JIMMY CARPER: Please sick him on me. Please.

DAVID Yes, and I'm sure you'd resist so much.

WILLIAMS:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, yes. Yes. Look at me.

DAVID How about we all introduce ourselves?

WILLIAMS:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh.

BOBBY: I think these are still off.

DEVON: We're going to start from the left or the right? Which way are we going?

JIMMY CARPER: From my left.

DEVON: All righty then.

JIMMY CARPER: Hi, Patrick.

PATRICK: Hello.

JIMMY CARPER: Ooh.

HUNTER: He speaks again.

JIMMY CARPER: He doesn't do that too often.

BOBBY: Isn't that just a sexy voice, though.

JIMMY CARPER: I know, I know.

HUNTER: He's like the *Scream* voice.

JIMMY CARPER: And we have a new cutie.

DAVID: Can't get enough of your love babe.

JIMMY CARPER: Next?

LEE: Oh, hey.

JIMMY CARPER: Hey.

LEE: Hi.

JIMMY CARPER: Hi.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

JIMMY CARPER: Welcome to After Hours.

STEPHEN: Because I can come in here and have fun.

JIMMY CARPER: I can tell it's going to be between you and hunter.

DAVID: Oh, sorry Stephen.

STEPHEN: Very well.

DAVID Hey.

WILLIAMS:

STEPHEN: Well--

HUNTER: This is radio. This is not visual.

JIMMY CARPER: No.

DAVID Patrick is going to be talking tonight.

WILLIAMS:

JIMMY CARPER: I don't care if you take all your clothes off. They can't see you.

DAVID: Here comes a shirt.

HUNTER: Oh, I thought I was supposed to sign language. Dang.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, well.

HUNTER: And I took all those courses for nothing.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

JIMMY CARPER: --for nothing

DAVID: And I was hoping Lee and Patrick would dance.

JIMMY CARPER: What?

DAVID We're going to listen to Patrick and Stephen talk about trucks, OK.
WILLIAMS:

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

HUNTER: I would love to hear that.

BOBBY: Because you know, we gots a couple of country--

JIMMY CARPER: Trucks.

BOBBY: --queens in there.

DAVID: With antennas.

DAVID They're so dreamy.
WILLIAMS:

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

BOBBY: We try to excite everybody.

DAVID: [INAUDIBLE] 600 [? cats ?] and [INAUDIBLE]. It's just like, [INAUDIBLE].

JIMMY CARPER: Antennas? It's not this-- it's not that kind of a show.

BOBBY: [INAUDIBLE] He don't know what he's saying.

JIMMY CARPER: Put your antenna away.

BOBBY: The rods have to stay out of the room.

DAVID: [INAUDIBLE].

JIMMY CARPER: We're talking about out youth couples, right?
