These are both available now. These both these escorts are available 14 hours a day six or seven days a week. Assuming these to be fairly normal numbers. current average market share can be thought to be around 3.5 clients per week or less. Average advertising would probably be at least three \$30 a week, because you have to advertise in a press or you know wherever at current average minimum fee ignoring the fact that now have discounts for repeat clients, that would indicate around \$320 or less per week before taxes. If that were spread out over a 40 hour week, it would be like eight bucks an hour. So these guys are not making you know a whole bunch of money. The analysis, the number of currently advertising has fallen to 44. The lowest has been since mid April, but still well above the low 30s number that had normally been up to that point. FY in FY indicators stay about level with the average going up, but the median staying about the same and most frequently used numbers tending downward, I still expect the number advertising to go down, I now expect the fee to stay relatively the same as now we have polled and mystery shop 84%. And there are three advertising for the first time of the minimum fees for an hour or more. The range is 50 to \$100. That's the same, the median is 85. And the average is 100. And the two most frequently used numbers are 175. So that's what the farm and market report is for this week.

But the more radical to the root and to get grassroots politics, ties into how the personal is the political thing, and will eventually bring about change towards the progressive. I have always been a little bothered about how Stonewall is slid in such a historical kickoff to the GLBT movement, when there were true pioneers, heroes and she rose like Maurice Kite, Harry Hayes, Phyllis Lyons and Del Martin, who were doing the work in the 1950s and continue to this day. What happened at Stonewall and what was significant about it was, it was the first time that we know that our community fought back to say, hey, we ain't taking this crap anymore. The outcasts, street people, prostitutes, what did they have to lose? And these are the people from Stonewall. Also, when looking at the history of the times, there was a lot going on that year in 1969, Woodstock, moon landings, and I forget what all else, things were happening in the world. We can always have the fine and upstanding ones to be our banner carrying carriers. Sometimes I wonder if we ever do. The Georgia sodomy law was overturned through a horrible case of an uncle who insisted his 17 year old niece. He claimed it was consensual, and she claimed it was rape. The court thought they could not prove rape. So they charged him on the sodomy law. And when it went before the judge, that law got ruled unconstitutional, the guy walked. That's how the sodomy law got overturned in Georgia. That's not our own homosexual conduct law. 2106 of the Texas penal code is being challenged in court by two men who probably are not who we would have chosen to be our poster children for this cause. We never are, the nature of their offense was under somewhat questionable circumstances. Speaking of heroes, hell, Ray Hill, our very own grandfather of the Houston GLBT community is an ex con, I think I've heard re-expressed that it is part because he knows the prison life. Because he knows the prison life, he doesn't have the fear of it, that many of us might, and that has allowed him to stand up for some things. Of course, bless him, he really doesn't want to ever go through the prison experience again, and works very hard only for the GLBT rights. But for those who are incarcerated and their families show up as a living. He is a living example of getting out of the system and overcoming addictions. We do not need to glorify those that Stonewall as some courageous freedom fighters, even though we do owe them a debt of gratitude for kick starting a sluggish social media movement. We can acknowledge our history and recognize it for what it is and move on. But I do like to say that. Also I two other people kind of wrote in and said, gave quotes, one from Bob Dylan saying, when you ain't got nothing, you got nothing to lose. And Janis Joplin, at the same time was saying freedom is just another word for nothing left to lose. And that's why we have gained so much. And to go along with that something else that was on the net. And this is, this is a changed. Copy from the original. It says because gay men and lesbians and bisexuals and transgendered people are discriminated against in housing and employment. And because how we act is more important than who we are. And if we get harassed, that's our problem. And if we get attacked, we provoked it. And if we raised our voices, we're flaunting ourselves. And if we enjoy sex, we're perverts. And if we have AIDS, we deserve it. And if we march with pride, we're recruiting children. And if we want to have children, we're unfit parents. And if we stand up for our rights, we're overstepping our boundaries. And because we are forced constantly to question our own worth, as human beings, and if we don't have a relationship with someone of the opposite sex, it is not recognized. And we are told our love is not real. And if we come out of the closet, we're just going through a phase. And because lesbians and gays and bisexuals and transgendered history is virtually absent from literature, and because homophobia and transphobia, is sanctioned by the Supreme Court. And because transphobia is sanctioned by certain gay men and lesbians, and organizations that purport to support the concept of equality, and for lots and lots of other reasons.
