Now if you're not familiar with this, the clinic in Galveston is called the Rosenberg clinic. And it is a place where people who think they may be transsexual it is where they go to discuss it discuss issues of transition. They go to discuss their life issues, and try to decide whether they are in fact transsexual. Yeah. And we were lucky enough to have a several people on that tape. And I thought some of the interviews that were on that tape were some of the best on Oh, yeah. No show that has been like that. Now Martine Rothblatt, is the author of the apartheid of sex. I have used her definition of sex and gender in my talks ever since I've read her book. And every time I've used her definition, I catch it. Her version is sex is the biology you're born with. Gender is all behaviors that's expected of you because of your biology. Well, we just had a meeting with the Lesbian Gay rights lobby of Texas in Austin two weeks ago, which was very successful. Okay, well, I'm going to talk about that after we do some more music that was very successful, very cordial. But when I use that definition of

gender, I looked around and is often the case all the women were shaking their head, yes, they understood it. Men all had this blank stare, like which I thought was very interesting. And we also had Gordon McKenzie on the show. Yes. And I'm going to tell a little personal thing about this four minute Gordian McKenzie. As I was listening to that tape, at the time, I said, Gordon McKenzie was the person who was most responsible for helping me decide that I was not going to have the surgery. Well, I'm backtracking on that. Where do you mean, I'm not? I'm not so sure that I won't have the surgery? Oh, wow. Well, I mean, you backtrack on that a little bit

this this whole year, you've been talking about surgical complications and how expensive it is, and yeah, and all the different problems. And so yeah, why now? Why are you changing your mind? Actually,

it's a lot, it's a lot of different things. I've just had a very unusual an odd experience. And I guess, I wanted to bring it up in the context of Martine and Gordian because this was what was in their books at the time. I just recently had to apply for medical insurance. Now, I have not had medical insurance for a long time. So this was a new concept from before. And it's my first time applying for medical insurance, since I transitioned. Oh, now for the listeners, you may not know that I am a non operative transsexual, meaning I have not yet had the surgery. I've not had a sex change operation yet? Well, these are as often the case on many forms. It says male, female, a mother. And at the bottom of the application, it says any material misstatement will cause you not to be covered at the time of your insurance. Well, that kind of puts me in a funny position. Yeah. Okay. I'm legally female. Mentally female, becoming physically more female all the time. But I've not had the surgery. So technically, I'm not. I'm not either.

If you're legally if you've had your name change, and you're legally female, Doesn't that count?

S Sarah Dipalma 28:39

I don't know. Most hospitals will still put you in the wards according to your biology. Oh, yeah. And what you have between your legs. So you know, we're dealing with insurance companies, you you don't have to give an insurance company much of a reason to say, well, we don't want to cover you. So I decided I would simply tell the truth on the application and wrote down transgendered female, because there was no place in the application for other. There's male who's female. And yes, that's it. Yeah. And I felt like I didn't want to make a material misstatement. So I said, Fine, I'll put down as it turned out, they covered me, I was shocked. Wow, I don't know if it's because they didn't know what a transgender female was.
