We don't think that it's very good to ignore our young people. We are the only minority that Does that the black community, the Hispanic community all get together and sit down and say, This is what we want for our young people. And they appreciate about getting that. And we think we should do the same way. pushing pushing. Proceed military person. Yeah, gotta be pushing.

Because late last year, queer nation held demonstrations in a school board meeting, which got them to come up with a enhance education plan. Actually, sexuality was actually included homosexuality and bisexuality. So it was actually pretty good. But now, they are saying that they don't have the money to put into effect teacher training to let the teachers can educate the students. And if they don't move, we're gonna have to move on them again, more.
