And I have actually been in a room with five men who had been sentenced to life in Texas prisons, for multiple convictions under the sodomy statute so that it made habitual criminal act kick in. And I was with them the night before they were released. So we're going to be talking about that. And that is my Pride Week show. Now, right now, I want you to know that although there's a lot of tragedy and a lot of heartbreak, my shows are fun. They are, they are time laughing. You might spend a little time crying, she would only spend more time laughing. And I get I do play with your emotions like any playwright.
