And this study was done at the Hopkins Children's Center in Baltimore. This studies indicate that with time and age, children may well know what their gender is, regardless of any and all information and child rearing to the contrary, they seem to be quite capable of telling us who they are. The children who are not reassigned and were raised as boys fit in well with their normal male peers, and we're better just as psychologically gender reassigned children. These findings were presented Friday at the Lawson Wilkins, pediatric Endocrine Society meeting in Boston,

amazing. And I said, Associate Professor of Psychology, Michael Bailey, this has very profound implications for the development of gender identity. This suggests that hormones effects on the brain has a major impact on gender identity.
