Sure. Would you like a rundown of all of our service? I would, okay. A lot of what we've been talking about tonight, the coming out issues, the psychological issues that go along with that, whether that's low self esteem, depression, definitely when you get this in the mix, and there's a lot of shame involved in maybe the coming out process is not easy. It's ripe ground for drug and alcohol abuse, any of the addictions and compulsive behaviors. And a lot of all these issues fall under what we call our life program. Substance abuse, chemical dependency, those sorts of things caught fall under our chemical dependency program where we have outpatient treatment both on individual and group bases. We have one of the few outpatient groups still running since there was a shift in funding for chemical dependency treatment on an outpatient basis. We also have a large HIV program, which is funded by the Ryan White monies. And we have both group and individual services for those who are injured. affected and affected by HIV. Another big piece of what we have is funded by Ryan White as case management for HIV, if you need to be hooked up to any kind of social services, because there's, there's a myriad of them out there, but it's hard to know where to look and what you're fit for. And a case manager can help you do that. We also have recently got some funding from the Texas Council on alcohol and drug abuse, for case management for people who are both HIV positive and have chemical dependency issues. Because it's it that's a real complex.
