Well, back in those days, there really, really wasn't a hell of a lot of literature about the subject. But I was able to read what there was and read through the biases of the authors and in between the lines. And basically, you know, this was back in the days when Christine Jorgensen had just had her surgery, and it was the big sensation at that time. And I determined No, I wasn't transsexual, you know, because I liked women. And you know, and I enjoyed the the outdoor plumbing that I had. And I really had no desire to exchange it. Not that the procedures were that well known at that time, anyhow. Didn't have ordinances. Well, I wasn't, you know, and by the same token, I, you know, I did not consider myself to be gay. Even though I had a very large feminine gender component. I didn't consider myself be gay, because I basically was not attracted to men. I mean, Jimmy Carper, sitting over there, through looking at me through the window is a very attractive man. But I'm sorry, Jimmy, you know, you don't do anything. In that regard. You know, I love you to death. And I would go anywhere in the world with you and go out with you and so forth like that. But as far as going to bed with you, it doesn't turn me on.

So I walked into the dining room said, Okay, you can come out now she came out and saw me in a nice, stylish sort of office like black dress. And she says, I've known about this for a long time really? Well, she found clothes and she'd found makeup and so forth. Like, I'm like a lot of people I started with makeup. I played around with my mom's makeup when I was like three, four years old. And on up from there, it that Mom took to it. She asked the usual two questions that are asked when transgendered people are caught. The first two questions are Are you gay?

She is an ordained Deacon s and disciples of Christ's Church. I have gone out in public with my mom before. And in particular, I have gone to church with her I've a number of occasions as an and that's perfectly acceptable where I do go to church.
