And he said that two of his employees had been ticketed for jaywalking, walking from the mind to Jr. Oh, come on. It's true. And so the there was some kind of zero tolerance operation going on. So I said, Well, all right. We can't get in touch with anybody over the weekend. But I'll see what I can do. And so I left the house before my program and I stroll down and went to the little police substation. And I asked the officer who tries so hard to look straight behind the desk. For the sergeant in the area. I wanted to talk to the sergeant about the extent of all this, this zero tolerance. And he said no sergeants are in the field, yada yada yada. You have to call him when you get back home. So I said fine. I'll come back to the station instead of walking out of the substation. Lee Harrington was passing and so I walked Lee down to his apartment, which is right there on Crocker Street. We crossed the street in front of his apartment and a squad car made a hot U turn turned on the lights and come rushing back to take it us for jaywalking on Crocker street. What is that, right? I mean, radioland, Lee Herndon. And of course, the opposite got out of the car and said, let me see your driver's license. And I said, your mama and the horse that y'all wrote in here? Oh, no, you're not gonna see my driver's license because I don't have to produce my driver's license. Lee Harrington had his driver's license out of his pocket in New York Minute. And they immediately process is taking the officers did you get out of here and he ran away. And so I was left, refusing to show my identification and the reason I refuse your identification is the federal suit in Houston that establishes that you do not have to document your identity upon the casual demand of a police officer is titled he'll vs Houston. Right? Well, in that case, and so I said, Why don't you call your supervisor let's just get this straight. And so he got on horn and called for a supervisor sergeant and Sergeant CoBank said, Who have you got and he said Ray Hill and sardines while I'm going down the station to pick up the lieutenant so to Lutz sergeants and lieutenants showed up, and I spent 45 minutes in the back of a squad car. And no, no. And so meanwhile, Charles

Armstrong comes up on the scene and starts begging them to de escalate begging me to de escalate and there's like six squad cars so the zero tolerance routine stopped as long as I was under arrest because I had them all tied up on Crocker Street. And so the lieutenants and sergeants came and said, show your dog I was licensed the opposite. I said, your mama to the horse that y'all rode in on because I'm just simply not going to surrender a ride that I've won in Supreme Court. This morning. At nine o'clock, a swarm of police officers rushed the line waiting at Stone Soup for grocery distribution, what demanded identification from everyone there and arrested at least two people for outstanding traffic warrants. They're in jail. These are people with a these are people sick enough with AIDS to be living on disability and having to go to stone soup to get groceries. Right. They are women and there are men and there are people of all nationalities and races and the police in their zero tolerance campaign in Montrose ran there and gave those people of all things a hard time. So my message to the listeners have after hours for the rest of this weekend, and at least through Monday, do not drive into Montrose with a burned out tail light, cracked taillight or a cracked headlight Do not fail to turn without signaling do not do not stay well do not jaywalk. Because I think we'd get all this squared away. I'm calling a news conference for Tuesday, if anyone out there wants to join me the news conference who will be in front of the substation for Tuesday, early afternoon about one o'clock. And so we're going to bring attention to all this. If anyone knows the municipal judge in Stafford, Texas, there is a man with about eight t sales in Houston city jail, who is waiting to be transported to Stafford, Texas. Why? Because he's got tickets there. He's got a failure to change address on his driver's license ticket five years old, and a failure to appeal appear in court for that ticket, which is also about five years old. And he will not get out until Monday when they have court in Stafford. So if anybody knows and their people everywhere, knows the municipal judge in Stafford, Texas, call Ray hill at home I am listed Yes, in every telephone directory you can imagine, as matter of fact bring you to see my life. My my telephone number, you could have figured it out yourself. And in the meantime, be very careful in Montrose. It's very dangerous out there and they have every intention to put as many people in jail as possible.

H Howard McHale 32:53

I thought that was the greatest line. It's not a carry out and it's not cracking homeless people. Don't take this under the bridges and eat it. Give me a break. By time I leave it with you. Well, of all the people. Every one of the guys that has moved out of my house and moved on to their own independent living is what Stephens house tries for. They need stone soup and make it. That's right. And they have nice apartments and they're wonderful, stylish people when you get four or \$500 a month one of those people, my people I mean to tell you, you are going to see this one down there. Let's move along. Let's move on. I'm gonna talk about the DNA spreading of the mining company.

H Howard McHale 35:29

I'm not gonna say.

J Jim Griffith 35:31

Well, we won't be jaywalking tonight, but I know what we will be doing afterwards to the corner.

H Howard McHale 35:36

Anybody wants to say bye bye Howie we can get into the mind for hours.

J Jim Griffith 35:42

Okay, now let's get serious because we only have 40 minutes or hours 12 to speak with our guests. We have in the house tonight. And Miss Donna Roche on down the road. Donna Roche is the AIDS Foundation Houston, education outreach coordinator who attended the International AIDS Conference in Vancouver, July 7 through the 12. She is here to talk about the information coming from Vancouver.

H Howard McHale 36:11

The conference, a conference and from a woman's perspective. Exactly. There was there's a lot happening with women with HIV. Exactly. Plus I wanted to hear her and when I talked to her I told I wanted to hear her just, you know, hurdle views of the things not just a report on this guy said exactly what really happened. What was going on T? What do you hear outside the session?

J Jim Griffith 36:35

Well, if you shut up, we can get her to talk. She's Donna. How are you? Welcome. Good. Thank you. Thank you. Tell us what a Education Outreach Coordinator does. First of all, with AIDS Foundation, Houston.

S Speaker 4 36:46

For the last few years, I've been doing HIV education in at risk populations, which means substance abusers. Homeless sex workers, sex worker, prostitutes, Oh, okay. Dancers, kind of whatever. doing basic HIV education, mostly in the treatment facilities, rehab centers, homeless shelters, women's shelters, and trying to get them to know how to protect themselves.

J Jim Griffith 37:15

What happened in Vancouver? Give us an overview of that you have not the plain food but you know, exactly good. Was it good? David Letterman. Anyway, tell us what happened in Vancouver, some some good things come out some bad things. But you're just your opinion about it-.

S

Speaker 4 37:33

It was really exciting. Because a couple of years ago, when they came back from Berlin, it was pretty depressing. Everybody had that news about AZT that it wasn't working. And it wasn't going to be very good. And everybody was very depressed. And Japan was so so it was kind of more middle of the road. Okay, well, we've been there. Vancouver, people are a little more excited, a little more hopeful, there's still a lot that has to be done. And everybody knows that. But they had more interesting things.

J

Jim Griffith 37:57

So people were more hopeful out of Vancouver, how come?

S

Speaker 4 38:01

Because of the news about protease inhibitors, because of the way the combinations are working, because some of the the research teams are finding out that it looks like we can eradicate HIV from the body, not cure it, not get rid of it, not stop you from transmitting it, but at least get rid of it to the point in the body where it doesn't seem to be doing any damage. That's pretty exciting.

J

Jim Griffith 38:24

Kind of like, block it out. Hide it. Yeah, stop it.

S

Speaker 4 38:28

Stop it to the point where it's in there, but it's hidden, and it's not doing any real damage, as far as I can tell.

J

Jim Griffith 38:34

exactly. Explain what a protease inhibitor is to people who don't really know because there are people who don't know.

S

Speaker 4 38:40

Yeah, protease inhibitor is just a different kind of drug, it works at a at a different point in the virus's replication cycle. So instead of attacking the virus, when it first gets into the cell, it attacks it on its way out when it's starting to bud and reproduce itself, and interferes with that process. So by interfering, it slows it down. It kind of damages the lifecycle of the virus, and that's a good thing.

H Howard McHale 39:03

So the news is coming out with a three drug combination, correct? Mostly, now, why not just have a protease inhibitor? Why three drugs? Isn't the drug company making some extra money?

S Speaker 4 39:14

No, everybody, every most of those drugs all come from different companies. So it's not that one company is profiting while they're all profiting, but I mean, not individually or not collectively, it's more like they haven't really tested those protease inhibitors as monotherapy yet, they're going to start they're going to start testing them in combination with each other one protease protease inhibitor with another, but they have found that mostly they work best when they're combined with the other drugs like AZT DDI, DDC. The stuff that we've had.

J Jim Griffith 39:44

Now is the three TC or the the protease inhibitor enhances the AC T. It gives it more life Is that Is that how it works?

S Speaker 4 39:52

It's like they all work together. They do different things. So one gets it when it's coming in one gets in when it's going out. So it's like you have Have more more angles to shoot from, and you have a better chance of getting the enemy.

J Jim Griffith 40:05

How come it's taken 13 years to find this out? What is it? Was it society? Was it government? Was it money? Well, what's the what's the poop scoop her Donna?

S Speaker 4 40:14

Yes, yes, yes. Kind of all of the above it takes a long time to get drugs tested and approved. And in all fairness to the people who do this. It's it goes a lot faster now than it used to, which is probably one good thing to come out of this-.

H Howard McHale 40:27

Is that. do you think that's a positive aspect of the the government that we have in in hold right now? I think it has the Clinton administration pushed for faster drug testing?

S Speaker 4 40:38

I think so because these protease inhibitors have come out in record speed, we were getting better anyway. With AZT, well, AZT took a while, but after that three, etc. Some of those drugs were approved fairly quickly, compared to the old days when it was 10 or 12 years before something would get approved. But the protease inhibitors have been really quick.

 **Howard McHale 40:54**

But the only thing the only thought I have on that is when the stuff when protease inhibitors came out and they're able to be on a study. Many people could get them for free, because they would join a study. And after they quit doing that scientific theory where some got placebos and some didn't everybody got the drug? There were a lot of those things happening. Well, now this party isn't members Come on, boy, they rushed him right on through now. Everybody's got to pay. That's right. They really do us a big favor by running these things through so quick. It's kind of a catch 22 Yeah, sure, is because some some of the guys would be, you know, they would get on a study or they would do whatever, great. They were getting these. Now it's what 24 To 4800 2400 bucks a month. Prices are different. And, and now because they rushed them through and approved them. Now they're paying like crazy. Or if they're not tidy with the A or some other, you know, wonderful thing. They're paying big bucks, and they can't afford that stuff.

 **Speaker 4 41:53**

Yeah, it's a mixed blessing. They got them through quicker, more people can get them but really comes down to more people with money. And that's kind of always been the case.

 **Jim Griffith 42:03**

When does the supply demand thing kick in? I mean, eventually the price is going to come down and-.

 **Speaker 4 42:07**

It will, the price came down on AC T eventually.

 **Jim Griffith 42:11**

That how many people? How many people have to die in order to get these drugs to them at a lower at a lower price? They don't I mean.

 **Howard McHale 42:19**

Well, nobody can get on studies right now. I mean, so yeah, that's great that they did it. But it's kind of great.

**S** Speaker 4 42:26

I think the good thing, though, is that more people are gonna get produce dinners. Yes, it costs a lot of money, but you can still get them. The insurance companies, if you have will pay for them. And if you don't, you can get some of them. Well, I know you can get one of them at Thomas street. So you can get them. No, it's not easy. And yeah, it's a lot better to have money.

**J** Jim Griffith 42:43

But say for example, insurance companies that have these dollar prescription or \$5 prescription things. Is that Is that still hold for the these protease inhibitors?

**S** Speaker 4 42:53

Yeah, I know people who are getting it through the insurance company that insures AIDS Foundation, and they're getting it, they have to get, for example, Crick's van, which they're getting through that one pharmacy in Pittsburgh, but they get it through Procare. So it's a \$5 copay.

**H** Howard McHale 43:09

What isn't it? Isn't it prudent to the fact that if we get these, these men and women who are HIV positive, who are sick on drugs that keep them alive longer, that the cost of their medical bills will actually come down?

**S** Speaker 4 43:20

Definitely, it's a lot cheaper to keep someone healthy than it is to hospitalized them and pay for the intensive care that you need. If they're in a hospital for three or four or five weeks.

**J** Jim Griffith 43:30

Someone realized this yet?

**S** Speaker 4 43:32

I think they're beginning to, but I don't know what managed care is going to do that. But that's probably another whole program.

**H** Howard McHale 43:38

— This is a good bill back in to see what's going on. I want to hear so-.

Jim Griffith 43:40

Hold on. Let me say one thing, if you ever, if you have a call in tonight and a question for Donna, with the AIDS, education and outreach, call us tonight and 526 KPFT. And we will answer your questions. I'm sure Donna will. Go ahead, Jim.

Howard McHale 43:55

Tell me about the conference. I mean, like that was the greatest news to come out the triple dog therapy and whatever. But what is the news? You know, what was the T you know what to pick up? You know, behind the scenes, what was the chat? You know, and especially from a woman's a woman's perspective, because women are, you know, the highest increase in infection right now. What is going on there? I mean, I'm sure they talked about more than just triple therapies. So what did you pick up? What was the tea? What was the dirt what's going on around the world? It was pretty exciting to be there. It's a huge conference 15,000 people there. Lots of talks going on kind of overwhelming to a certain extent you get there and you don't know what to go, what direction to go and who to hear. The first day they had Bob Gallo bless his little soul. Luc Montagnier from France mortal enemies talking on the same panel that was pretty entertaining, but the room that they had when they were talking about their various studies in trials and vary medical and kind of over every well, most of our heads.
