then also the District of Columbia, and the territories, and what they're doing, they're going to do rallies, they're going to do marches, they're going to work in Texas, we're going to have a youth rally. Sounds good. Well, that's so important to draw to draw in the younger generation, especially the youth, we're gonna have a march and then we're going to have a lobby day. And, and this is going on all over the country. And actually, I want to make sure that people know, and we'll mention this again, but I want to make sure that people know that part of this partnership, that the task force is as developed with these statewide groups includes a free membership to the task force. If you join the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force at the \$25 level, you will get a free membership basically in the task force. And you'll also get a membership in your statewide organization. And what they will do that the task force's has committed that we will send that \$25 down to the state all of it. So basically, we're giving away memberships in the interest of being partnering and promoting work. And that money is going to go to promote the equality begins at home actions that were you know, we'll talk about, you know, the stuff we're doing in Houston, Gigi is working on, you know, to make sure that we reach out and, and draw to other communities that perhaps have not been, have not seen Austin as accessible for them to go to, you know, folks that need help with, you know, \$15, to put them on our bus with us. Sure, that need help with a place to stay. Yeah. But the events are going to be great. It's just, it's really exciting. Isn't that exciting to hear the good work that that the anti Defamation League and John Bernstein, the regional director here is just a pleasure to work with. He and I work real closely, you know, because the task force is, is very focused on not just working to advance the cause of the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community, but also we believe we're part of a broader social justice movement. And that means partnering with whether it's the American Civil Liberties Union or The AFL CIO, you know, Linda Chavez Thompson fabulous speaker spoke at Creating Change last year. But let's just run down the legislation real fast. There's, there's a hate crimes bill that's being promoted. And there's an action alert that has gone out on a couple of different listservs. I know you know that y'all got one.
