panel, the US Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, ordered the district court in Sacramento to expedite his release on bail, and setting the stage for his immediate release from the Correctional Facility at Terminal Island. And Mr. ePass, has served more than two years of a 10 year sentence for growing medical marijuana for himself and other people. But due to the recent rulings out there with Angel rates, versus Ashcroft and his scenario, I guess, pretty much fit the same thing that angel had done. And so they had to rethink the sentencing they had given him. And he's now out and I've seen a picture of him hugging his daughter, and I'm sure it was a wonderful day for them, you know. But anyway, there's some other news. This is, for the first time in the 60, something years, a pharmaceutical company, the pharmaceutical press, excuse me, the publication division of the Royal pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain, has published a book on cannabis and its uses. This is the first time since the mid 1940s, that a book of this type has been published. And it's an authoritative review of the development of cannabis based medicines and their applications in a wide range of therapeutic areas. And it's it's a further sign that changes afoot if you know what I'm saying that yeah, they you know, you get the Royal Society doing this kind of stuff. It shows there's some some weight behind this medicine and it's it's being used on a continual basis now in Great Britain for people with MS and AIDS and that you know, other debilitating disease.
