getting back to it. That's how it affects us. Since we are a gay and lesbia production company. We've gotten a lot of people who can't go through Access, and they'll come to us and we can film and get them on Access. You know, it's it's a difficult situation.

So when we see everyone across Houston popping up and talent here and talent here and, and wonderful things going on over here. And we've gotten together. And we've realized that there needs to be an epicenter, a place where gay and lesbians in Houston can turn to and visually and in some of the ideas that we've had is that you can pick up a TWIT and see, see a picture. You can pick up advertising, pick up The Voice, you can pick up what's another publication in Boston, the Triangle. But you can't you don't get to meet the doers in our community.
