In Colorado, when voters go to the polls in November, they can vote to turn back time on rights already extended to gays and lesbians and initiative sponsored by a group called Colorado for families values would make it legal to discriminate against gays and lesbians in Colorado. Scott Schlegel says polls predict the initiative will fail. But gay rights groups aren't taking any votes for granted. ordinances in three Colorado cities Denver Boulder and Aspen currently prohibit discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. Even so, according to a Denver newspaper, there were 30 formal complaints of bias based on sexual orientation in Denver last year, six in Boulder, and three in Aspen. Some complaints involve dismissal from jobs, others involve rent increases or the denial of housing. This kind of discrimination should be legal, say members of the Colorado Springs based group Colorado for family values. The organization is sponsoring a statewide amendment prohibiting protection from discrimination for gays, lesbians and bisexuals spokesperson Kevin Tibideaux. their

Please have a pen ready for the information I'll give you in a moment. Knowing who we are is the only way people can understand what we are. And lesbians and gay men have never been more visible than we are today. But visibility has also left our community vulnerable to increasing homophobic attacks. Newsweek's cover story gays under fire explains why. According to Newsweek, the fall of communism left the extreme right wing without a villain, and the increased visibility of lesbians and gays made prime targets for a

new propaganda offensive. These right wing bigots are responding to our fight for basic human rights, with rhetoric about special privileges and secret homosexual agendas. Newsweek talks about the way they are using misinformation and stereotypes to try and enact legislation to bar anti discrimination laws. Most Americans reject this campaign of hate. For example, a Newsweek poll shows that over three quarters of Americans support an end to job discrimination against lesbians and gay men. But the areas where Americans are less supportive are lesbian and gay marriage and parenting rights. It's no accident that these are the areas in which we are least visible and therefore least understood. So while increased visibility can make us more vulnerable, the only answer is to be even more visible and to be visible in our diversity. And this well researched fair set of articles by Newsweek are certainly a step in the right direction. Let Newsweek now you appreciate their attempts to educate rather than inflame Americans. On September 25, California Governor Pete Wilson signed a B 2601. into law a bill protecting the state's gays and lesbians from employment discrimination. Last September, the Republican governor vetoed a similar bill HB 101 sparking weeks of demonstrations and street protests across the state. The question on everyone's mind this September was, what would Wilson do and When would he do it? David Smith, then Public Information Director for the Los Angeles gay and lesbian community services center echoed the pessimism of most of the state's lesbian and gay activists.

Wow, equally strong as 101 is based on a very different statutory scheme, one that the state court of appeals last fall found to require a prohibition on sexual orientation job discrimination. Since that time, the governor own administration through the labor Commissioner's Office has followed the appellate court decision and has been pursuing cases of sexual orientation job discrimination. This year's bill simply puts into the statute books, the governor's existing policy. I did that because I thought it would be much harder for the Governor to veto such a bill. There has not been the same intense level of opposition by the religious extremists and hate groups as last year. However, I know that they're still very much opposed and are lobbying the governor. I find it hard to imagine how he could possibly veto a bill but simply puts into statute the existing policy of this administration.

In spite of Pete Wilson's surprising signature on a B 2601. The fight for lesbian and gay civil rights in California is far from over. The governor vetoed a more wide ranging civil rights bill sponsored by House Speaker Willie Brown the following day, that bill would have extended lesbian and gay anti discrimination protections in the areas of housing and public accommodations. And we're also provided similar protections for non English speaking and disabled Californians. And right wing religious zealots, led by Lou Shelton's traditional values coalition claimed the passage of AB 2601 will encourage the spread of homosexuality and of sexually transmitted diseases.
