The Lesbian Gay rights lobby of Texas lobbies on a statewide level in the Texas legislature on behalf of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people. And we lobby on issues like AIDS and HIV funding, hate pet trying to pass stronger hate crime laws. We are working on non discrimination in education. And right now particularly, we're going to be trying to stop a bill that bans lesbians and gays from being able to adopt in the state of Texas,

right. We're going to talk about that in more detail in a few minutes. Clarence tell folks what the Houston gay lesbian Political Caucus is. The title may seem obvious, but there's more to it than that.

Well, it's a it's an advocacy and lobbying group. We actually have three similar setup to the lobby. We actually have three core corporations we have a political action committee, which actually screens interviews candidates, and and based upon their level of support for issues of importance to the gay lesbian, bisexual transgender community endorses and makes recommendations to the community. And those get out the vote programs. And a lot he has a similar equity pack is what the RS is the caucus political action committee. And then the caucus itself is an educational social welfare lobbying organization. We have anti violence project that we're working on with the anti Defamation League and NAACP and Houston area Women's

Center National Organization for Women in lots of other groups on focusing on hate crimes and, and violence against folks based on bias. And then we have an advocacy roundtable that we're working on, which is bringing together all the groups in the Houston area to talk about common issues and how we can work together to advocate so there's lots of education and advocacy work. And then we actually have a charity, the United Equality Fund, which deals with the more purely educational aspects of what we're doing. That doesn't feel with lobbying, you know, can't because it's a charity. So we're busy group. Lots of it's all volunteer, I'm actually the President's and all unlike the lobby. It's an all volunteer group. So we have a volunteer board and all volunteers, the lobbyists fortunate enough to have Diane's, the paid executive director. And then of course, his staff. They're a small staff that works, whether that's Is that what you want to know about? Yeah, that's

exactly what I want to know. A lot of our audience, especially young people, young folks who are just in the process of coming out, may find it hard to believe that you could go and talk to political leaders. And I think they'd be interested to know for example, Dan, when you go and talk to legislators, what's the reaction when you go in? And you tell them you're a lesbian, gay rights lobby? Do they cringe? Do they start jumping out of windows? What kind of reaction you get? And this is Texas?

Well, we're highly popular. It's mixed. You know, I, I know that so much has changed in the last generation. I know that I know, the first lobbyists, the first person who lobbied on behalf of lesbian and gay Texans and used to go into the Texas Legislature and talk to lawmakers and they certainly had a much rougher time than I have. But there are days you know, there are days and there are people who just despise you know, talking to us and they don't want to talk to us at all. There's some people that feel guilty about talking to us because they know they're not supporting our issues when they should be. And so sometimes they avoid us. But then there are some great people. I mean, there are some great people in Houston like representative Deborah Dannenberg and Representative Scott Hochberg and state representative, granite Coleman and Deanna Davina was great. But it was Senator Alice's general health Senator house, Senator wittmeyer. And you know, there's so many more people, so many more legislators that are actually really working on our side on many issues. Now, and so I feel very fortunate. And it's, you know, they're like, you know, legislators are people, and they want to know, how issues affect us and the and we need to be able to tell them and talk to them about them. But we also need to know about politics we live in. And I think it's really important that the political time we live in this is difficult on behalf of lesbian, gay rights issues. So you know, we know all that going in, but we have so many more friends than we've ever had before.

But one of the things that I think is so impressive is the access because of the history of some of these organizations that you know, we're proud and privileged and honored to be a part of the access that Diane can pick up the phone and call the Lieutenant Governor and talked about Bullock about something, you know, the leadership that she needs to talk to Pete Lang me, she can talk to the lady. And there's a relationship established there. And a lot of that is because of the work that Diane's done. And a lot of that is because of the respect of this organization that has existed over a period of many years, has established and the same thing is thankfully true in Houston. You know, when I call the mayor's office, I didn't get an executive assistant, the mayor calls back, then he's not calling back because Clarence Bagon, these call, he's calling back because the president of the Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus, and there is a certain amount of access. And that's why it's so important to be a part of the lobby, and to be a member of the statewide group and a local group and, and a national group as well, that access that, that that that group has is so important. And we need to make sure that we're keeping the lights on and Austin and you know, the lobby office and make make sure that we have money to do the important get out the vote programs here in Houston, we're real proud to be coordinating with the lobby, they've been real good about getting funding for phone banking and mailing for the election and voter outreach projects. And we're all excited to be the group in the greater Houston area that's working hand in hand with a lobby to help coordinate that on the local level. But wouldn't be able to do it if the lobby weren't there on a statewide level, working with leadership and making sure the funds are there to put this together, because unfortunately, that's what it boils down to. You got to have members, you got to have money.

And, and so, you know, we're going to be doing a lot of getting out the vote efforts, because what's at stake right now is that if we let our state be controlled by extreme right wing voices, that want to keep queers criminals in the state of Texas that want to deny HIV funding, that want to make it that we make it so that we don't have custody of our own children are we can adopt, and those proposals are real, they're on the table right now. If the extreme right wing takes over or takes over government and controls government in Texas, those kinds of laws will pass. And I don't think our community knows that right now. This in my mind is the biggest election I've ever witnessed. For gay Texans.
