And they sometimes forget the power of what happens in state legislator legislatures. And so the federation of states is trying to help make every statewide law every state have a statewide queer law. One group. And I think that's a mammoth task. Right now, Texas has one of the oldest statewide lobbying organizations, but I really have a dream for there to be good strong state lobbies. In every state, we need them. No states are in state government. It's it's state government that determines family issues, and, you know, custody issues and marriage rights. And it's state government and state legislators, legislatures that decide whether or not we're criminals in a state, and what we can do about hate crimes, those are state laws. And so, and we need state funding for HIV AIDS and HIV, and there are many issues like non discrimination and employment has, you know, if we don't get a federal law, our only chance in the States. So in addition to that the the right wing is really focusing on state legislators, legislatures right now. And so we too, have to have an equally strong voice there.

It's got to be from the bottom. And we've got to have that kind of intensive organizational structure that the right has. And, you know, we have a great fight the right program, right now, the task force has been going around the country fighting, right. And it's so important for all of our groups to realize that this has to be a coalition, it has to be partnering. And it has to be at every level, when it's important for what's going on in Washington. It's vital for what's going on in Austin. And it's vital for what's happening here. You know, we have lobby groups in Washington, and that may do a great job lobbying, but they don't determine who they have to lobby, who does the local groups on the statewide and local level determined, and really, the local groups actually have a huge impact on which member of Congress is reelected, or not reelected, and state representative, and it's so important for folks to realize how critical each of those levels are. And I would, you know, people ask me, Well, I just don't have the money to remember every one of those groups. Yeah, right. You know, don't go to the black IP once a week, you know, once a month,
