The first go around and and that either Jim Makan or noble Gunther is going to make it into a runoff is very, very important. And the votes between those two men is going to be very, very close. And the gay community in particular has a very good opportunity here to get behind one of those candidates and push them into the runoff and eventually elect them. Because I think either one of those men could beat Frank Brisco.
