Oh, and apparently she got thrown out of the car into the street. So an ambulance was called in the ambulance got there. And the paramedic began to cut away her clothing and discovered that she was a non operative transsexual. This is a person whose This is a transsexual, who's not hit yet hit surgery and stopped the treatment from three to five minutes, right? While making comments about quote the bitch. What I cut took the story out of out of out of the Washington blade. And I've talked to Ricky and Wilkins about it. And Jessica Xavier because they helped to stage a protest about it. This is it turns out, Tyra probably wouldn't have survived. Anyway, the injuries apparently we were so severe that he even had a not stopped the treatment she probably would not have. But that's beside the point. There's beside that's totally beside the point. Finally, the crowd that had gathered, said to the paramedic, it doesn't matter. That's right. This is a human being start to do something. And he never did. The supervisor finally resumed the treatment. Wow. Now the bad part about all of this is that since then, the Washington Fire Department says they can't identify exactly which paramedic was involved in this deal. Therefore, they can't take any action. Well, Oh, yeah. Well, folks, that didn't sit well. No, I'll bet not. And so a coalition of bisexual, transgendered and gay people held the vigil on the steps of City Hall and more than 1000 people turned up Wow. Which is really something that's really sounds really something and now the Washington blade is suing under the Freedom of Information Act to find out exactly who did what, haha. And I wanted to point this out, because we're just talking about being in a small town. Being in a big city is not a guarantee either. That's right. Washington DC is a big place. Yes. sophisticated city.

Yeah. And you think someone in the medical field would have knowledge? Yeah, I have experience with all kinds of different people. So that wouldn't make a difference.

Well, that hasn't been my experience. And it hasn't been the experience of the people that I know in Houston. Typically what happens? Let's say you go to a county hospital, and I'll talk from personal experience here. It has happened to me, in fact, that have essentially been put on display. Wow, that you go to the doctor for something and next thing you know, people would be invited in to say, here's a transsexual come and come meet this transsexual. Now, I'm the kind of person that will say, you know, screw you and horse you wrote in and get the hell out of my room. But lots of transsexuals would never do that, and probably are horrified. Yeah. And they leave feeling to humanize. Yeah, um, they leave feeling like they've been victimized by the medical system. It turns out the doctors are no more are no more knowledgeable about us than anybody else. It's been our experience that we have had transsexuals turn away from rape crisis centers. We've had transsexuals turned away from homeless shelters, or yeah, we've had them turned away from battered women's centers. So there's it hasn't been our experience, that they know very, very much about us or that they're very supportive. And that's one of the things that we're going to attempt to change in the coming year, locally and statewide. There we have several projects in the works, specifically aimed at those professionals, because we realize what's occurring is occurring out of ignorance or not not mean. And so we're going to try and address it from that issue. But I did want to point out a story about Tyra Hunter, because if anything like that ever happened in Houston, I want you to call me right away. Yeah. I mean, I mean, get on the phone. I want to hear about it within seconds. Frankly, I don't think it will happen. And one of the reasons is because we have some sensitivity training going on in the police department, for example. D McKellar thanks to a nice Parker is doing some of that. Ray Hill has done a lot of work with that. Oh, yeah. I don't think something like that would happen in Houston. But I could it could it could it could you mean Yeah. I wouldn't have thought it would happen in Washington, DC. So

Well, the one thing that is true is that it's nice that HPD knows something about us. Yeah, but the county doesn't. You could stop by the county and you're you might just as well be in Borger. If it's the same effect, you know, if you get stopped in spring tonight, folks, you might just as well be in some small country because you're going to get that kind of treatment. Yeah. That's why I said what I did earlier by by getting the second form of ideas. One of the things that I that I did want to talk about with the Lesbian Gay rights lobby for it before I finish, and that is, Diane told me, told DNI that the board has already voted once not to include transgenderers. Oh, and she told me quite bluntly, that the board of directors in the LG RL does not believe that gays and lesbians and transgenderers have anything in common.

Yeah, that's right. Um, you know, the hate crimes, employment discrimination, all child custody, divorce issues, marriage issues, same sex marriages, you can go on and on and on. Oh, please, you don't think we have anything in common. So, I did find that very interesting. I did not know that the board had made that vote. And I appreciated Dianne telling us that because it was news. And I appreciated her honesty. And now I'm pointing all this out to you, because there is an article that's going to be coming out in outsmart within a few days. And in this article, I say some very unkind things about Diane. Oops. Now, I've already told Diane, this I in fact, I gave her the copy of the article in advance and explained to her that I wrote the article before I ever knew we were ever going to meet. Yes. And before I leave, before we go to we go to some music and then go to the tapes. I want to say something about Phyllis pride for a minute. Okay. Phyllis is going through some some tough times right at the moment. Really. And I would like I want to say publicly on the year. What Phyllis Frey has meant to me, personally, okay. The reason that I was one of the nine people who went to be part of the meeting with the Human Rights Campaign fund was because Phyllis Frey felt that I was a national leader, and helped to see that I got there. The reason I was able to go to Washington, and to lobby was because Phyllis five paid for my trip out of her pocket, including meals. Not only did she pay for me, but she paid for for other people as well. Wow. She and her wife paid for this out of their own pocket. Very seldom in any lifetime. Do you meet anyone who makes such a positive impact? I can count the number of people who have really made major life changing impact on pain in my entire life. When Phyllis is one of those people. I got back into activism because my life partner thought I should. But I have matured as an activist because Phyllis has taught me how. And I want to say to Phyllis, I know she tapes the show. I want to say to you publicly how much that has meant. And I know that you're going through a tough period right now. It's kind of a crash and burn situation for her. Okay, you know, she has been at this for two solid years. I know. I want you to take some time off. I want you to rest. And I want you to know that I'm telling you on the air. I love you. So take it easy. You've made a big important impact on us and me He personally in sticks, hang in there, kid. So I just want to, I thought that was something I got to say. Good. You know, I'm

So we need him out of there. He He's not up for reelection. But among the list of candidates who are running. I think that all of them with exception of jutaan will be one of volunteers. 14 chimps, as the Chronicle article, like to refer them as the fight came about. And I suggested this to Diane Hardy Garcia, who promptly said to me all they're blowing smoke up your skirt, I think she needs to go talk to some of these people, because I don't think they are. I, these are not the people that I'm talking to. These are not wild eyed radicals. These are people who are convinced that they're not that that African Americans are not getting a fair shake in the justice system and want it fixed. And I can see where this is potentially an issue that will prevent any hate crimes legislation from moving forward at all. So it's gonna be really interesting to watch over the next over the next year or so, and see how that all develops as well.

I have real doubts about some of them, how, how much further some of the legislation can get given

the attitudes that we have. There is such an attitude right now against affirmative action. There's such an attitude against any kind of social program. It's really debatable to me, if we if if the Lesbian Gay rights lobby doubled the number of people in the next hate crimes March, there's doubt it's doubt to me that it would still make any difference.
