and this is Art. In Washington, the gay liberation movement is likely to be responsible for the increasing numbers of male prostitutes on the streets of US cities. According to a new federal report. The typical adolescent male Hustler, contrary to the stereotype of a gigolo, or a child lured into pornography is an over 16 homosexual who may enjoy his work, the study said. The study said that many male prostitutes are runaways, or were thrown out of their families after revealing their homosexuality, and many grew up in one parent families were abused by a family member dropped out of school or were ridiculed by peers for their sexual preferences. There appears to be an increasing number of adolescent males involved in prostitution. And this increase appears to be related to the growth of the gay subculture, claiming the study. The study was compiled for the Health and Human Services Department by a San Francisco

consulting firm. The \$250,000 study was the first nationwide look at adolescent male prostitution. The researchers interviewed officials and social workers and seven cities developing a so called hustler profile based on interviews with 79 adolescent male prostitutes. Most adolescent male prostitutes are gay identified, said the study showed and the great majority are between the ages of 16 and 22. It is extremely rare for a youth under 16 to be involved in prostitution, despite recent news reports of alleged child pornography rings. Unlike female prostitutes, male adolescent prostitutes usually do not have pimps. Also, unlike their female counterparts, so you usually dislike their work, a significant percentage of males indicate they enjoy hustling, including its sexual aspects of the study. Many adolescent males involved in hustling exhibited positive self images, imagining themselves to be entrepreneurs, entertainers, and sexually desirable partners. Many also see hustling as an appropriate way of exploring their homosexuality.

lesbian Since a group C mentally and medically healthier than heterosexual woman, women and homosexual men, observed a male gynecologist after reviewing a groundbreaking study on health of lesbians and bisexual women, factors in influencing lesbian gynecology, gynecologic care. A preliminary study was recently published in the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology, a publication was, which is found in almost every medical school and hospital library in the country. And her study, Dr. Susan Johnson summarized gynecol experiences of 100 Lesbians and 15 bisexual women 19 to 52 years of age. The average age of the group,

however, was only 29. And white educated middle middle class women were disproportionately represented in the study, the women studied had no cases of herpes, gonorrhea or syphilis, lower rates of endometriosis average average, average rates of menstrual problems and less trouble with depression. Yeast infections were also less common among the women in the study than among heterosexual women. In other studies, only 23% of the lesbians studied reported sexual dysfunctions and contrast to 63%. Of the white middle class married heterosexual women in a similar study, cervical dysplasia was almost non existent in the study population according occurring only in one bisexual woman.

Oh no. There was growing confusion Tuesday concerning who will teach new Houston police officers about homosexual lifestyles. Mayor Kathy Whitmire said she thinks Police Cadets should be taught about gay lifestyles, but she is opposed to a police academy decision to hire gay Political Caucus President Lee Harrington for the job. Captain Leroy Meek na head of the police academy announced plans Monday to hire Harrington and Bill Scott founder of and a counselor at the Montrose Counseling Center to teach the course beginning March 22. He said the four hour class on homosexual lifestyles will be part of 20 hours of sociology instruction taught at the academy. Other instruction focuses on the lifestyles of blacks and Hispanics. Police Chief John bales said Tuesday no decision has been made on who will teach the class. Bail said the course will be enhanced by bringing in a member of the gay community to help instruct the class asked what he thought would be who he thought would be picked as the instructor he said it will probably be Scott on whether Harrington also will teach the class bail said I'll leave that decision to the academy wittmeyer said Tuesday she is opposed to the hiring of Harrington because the course might focus more on the political activities than on the city's gay community. Meanwhile, Geneva Kirk Brooke, president of citigate sins against pornography said she might sue the city to block the appointment of Harrington and Scott. Citizens Against pornography is a group composed of about 60 Church and civic organizations. By the fact they admit their homosexuals they are admitted law violators. They'll teach police not to enforce the law, said Brooks.

Although the American Psychiatric Association removed homosexuality from its list of illnesses in 1973, a major professional Symposium on the issue revealed that there is still a considerable disagreement about gayness amongst psychiatrists. The debate which emerged at a two day meeting at New York Medical College two weeks ago, centered around such questions is whether homosexuality is inherently abnormal, as more classical psychiatrists believe, are a normal variant of human sexual behavior. As more sociological oriented, doctors maintain, and whether gay people should be converted to heterosexuality through therapy or assisted in becoming more comfortable with gay identity. However, whatever their views nearly all denounced homophobia and prejudice, which they said pervades the psychiatric profession as well as society at large. Doctor judge Marmor of Los Angeles noted that case physicians are still denied resident residency training in psychiatry by most hospitals, and that no psychoanalytic Institute with knowingly accept a gay trainee. Dr. Marmor also told the conference we must stop thinking of homosexuality as a singular phenomenon. It is a diverse it is diverse and character we Race and its manifestations and has multiple routes, genetic, hormonal, psychodynamic, and socio dynamic. The sickness or arrested development model of gayness seems to be rapidly yielding to an ever growing accumulation of evidence and opinion that sees same sex attraction, attraction as biologically normal behavior with complex and varied origins. This symposium also noted that research into the origins of homosexuality, which have long been limited to studies of gay people who sought psychotherapy is now focused on non patient homosexuals with diverse lifestyles, with the consequent awareness that homosexuals as a group are not mentally less healthy than heterosexual, and that the same bad parent child relationships that are characteristic of many unhappy homosexuals are also found among unhappy heterosexuals. Dr. Marshall foreign Steen of Boston's Massachusetts General Hospital, who is gay told that it is a miracle that any gay person can become stable and happy individuals since they grow up lacking social validation of what they are, unlike, unlike women and blacks who can get it who can at least identify with one another. gays have no one to counteract the negative societal asked assault on their egos. It's no wonder that a time of stress gay people are much more prone to severe depression for Enstein edit. Even Dr. Irving Biber one of the foremost spokespersons for the school of thought which sees gayness as a sickness that the therapist should have no stake in sexual out come of a patient being treated. Sponsors the gay archives in Texas, it's a collection of somewhere between 800 and 1000. Books on gay lesbian and feminist issues, and issues of general sexuality. We also have several 1000 publications from all over the country, some many from our, you know, different countries. We also have tapes, audio, visuals, videotapes, 1000s, of news clippings, God are we going to need help with, we have boxes of those. Right now it is right now. And it for the past two years, it's been

located in the garage apartment over my garage. And it has outgrown that space. Up until now we've had to limit the use to by appointment only. We've had a number of people use it, a lot of University of Houston students have used it. We've had people come from out of state to use it to do research for books and publications they were working on. And we have come to the point now where I personally, Carl and I personally are needing that space. Besides that it's outgrown the space we have for it. And as of the end of this month, we're going to have to put it into storage until such time as we can find a location for it. It's a it's a valuable resource to the community. And I think it will be a loss if it's if it's had to be if we have to just put it away and leave it. Of course, if here again, if we had a gay, gay, gay and lesbian community center, perhaps we would have space for that and I'm prejudiced. That's one reason I like to see. But personally, right for the time being, I am really interested in simply finding a location doesn't have to be enormous. But a location that is accessible to the community, preferably in Montrose interact is in the process of, of what we will probably in the next couple of months hire a coordinator for our organization. So there's the possibility we will have someone there if we can find office space that we can rent very, very cheaply. I mean, like for next to nothing, or space or less. Like I said, we are tax exempt. So whatever we get, if we aren't able to pay up to what they're expecting, they could deduct it, whoever that kind soul is, could deduct it, but that's that's where we are right now. In a crisis. We don't we have no no alternative at this point. But to put them in storage and temporary storage.

Well, welcome to Uncle Artis neighborhood. This week, we're going to do something just a little bit different. We have a little bit of music, a little bit of poetry. Tonight. As you may or may not know, February is Black History Month and I wanted to do something for our black brothers and sisters out there. So I hope you are listening to the show prior to this. They they had a tape of Gwendolyn Brooks reading from her work, kind of reluctant to follow her. But I have some some stuff by some black poets tonight, and a little bit of black music. And in case you're wondering what we opened up with that was Josie cotton, asking the musical question Johnny ru queer. The first song is not by a black artist, but it's about a a woman who, in a sense started the whole civil rights movement just almost inadvertently. It's both an album that Mike Miesch gave me as a going away present by a gay artist by the name of Willie sortal And it's all about Ms. Rosa Parks. And that was Willie sortal singing about Rosa Parks. They, I'm going to read a poem out of Nikki Giovanni's latest book of poetry called cotton candy on a rainy day. And this one's entitled crutches. It's not the crutches we decry. It's the need to move forward, though we haven't the strength. Women aren't allowed to need so they develop rituals. Since we all know working hands idle the devil. Women aren't supposed to be strong. So they develop social smiles and secret drinking problems. And female lovers whom they never touch except in dreams. Men are supposed to be strong. So they have heart attacks and develop other women who don't know their weaknesses, and hide their fears. Behind male lovers whom they religiously touch each Saturday morning on the basketball court. It's considered a sign of health. Don't you know that they take such good care of their bodies? I'm trying to say something about the human condition. Maybe I should try again. If you broke an arm or leg, a crutch would be a sign of courage. People would sign your cast and you could bravely explain. No, it doesn't hurt. It just itches. But if you develop a niche, there are no SAVs to cover the area in need of attention. And for whatever guilt may mean, we would feel guilty for trying to assuage the discomfort and even worse for needing the aid I really want to say something about all of us. And my shouting. I want you to hear me. Emotional falls always are the worst. And there are no crutches to swing back on. And that was at a James singing Salloway we have a poem here now by an African poet named Maria ZZ Cooney out of a book of his called Zulu poems. This one's called Friends. Honey are the words you speak Wyldstyle drift slowly into sleep. You tell the story over and over again. I drowse in the palm of your hand, whilst you hold the body aching with pain. Softly you cover it and whisper in my ear. Although knowing I do not hear you, you do it for the heart, which alone never sleeps. That'll have our yellow alert here. I see the lights just went off. Can you get that please? Thank you. Yeah, yellow alert, know that don't break out the hankies guys, when that's not what we're talking about here. We, we are in desperate straits here KPFT we need to raise some money just to, to do our everyday business here of being on the air 24 hours a day. We don't get money from the government, we rely on money from you. And, you know, Ray tells me that we used to be able to count on a greater portion of the income for this radio station from the gay population. I think Ray said at one year, it was up to about 50%. Right, we

constituted for a long time about 1/7 of the support of the station. If we got time in accordance with how we paid money, we would be entitled to a whole day. That hasn't been the case for a long time during my administration. We generally stayed around 10% of the income for the station was coming off this radio program, which is a good showing. reaching meaningful people in a meaningful way. I'd like to see that come back up. Stein collective we could be creative and original with our promo as well as matter of fact we do not have a promo so every once a while they throw on the unvoiced over Wilde 'N' Stein music promo and give us a plug. We need to do something about that. That's right. That's right. And I have reasonably that already is going to meet the real Ed Doppler and do something nasty in the production studio in order to come up with one and I think that's a wonderful idea. I promise to save and tell about my trip to the jail, the end of the program, but those of you who wanted to enjoy the more erotic moments of that and may do that, and this is not satire, this is not like my interlude with Officer Crow that I told about just before Mike left. This is the real thing folks I last Saturday evening around midnight, after having spent about couple hours in bed from an early right as opposed to late Saturday night, decided I wanted to go across to the convenience store for some late night munchies. And so Patrick and I dressed and wandered out in front of our house and right on the corner of Westheimer in Whitney. A squad car had stopped a driver of another car, who no doubt had made one of those illegal turns off of Avondale Street. Avondale is the street like the MTA in Boston, you can never get off. Once you get on that sucker. You gotta go all the way to one end or the other. You cannot turn off of Avondale street after dark and Montrose and if you think that's weird, then I think probably think it's weirder than you do. And so that's the reality a lot of people get ticketed for that. Anyway to recognize the drivers of cars a person who is frequently in the neighborhood and belongs here and may not have paid any attention to the sign is he left probably where he lives nearby to go to where he was going nearby. And so I watched that for a few minutes and started to walk cross street to the convenience store when a young friend of mine by the name of Charles who is also a person seen regularly in Montrose neighborhood, stepped out in the street to stop westbound traffic long enough for a eastbound pickup truck to find a convenient parking space which is very rare to find. in Montrose. No U turns were made no illegal actions were taken in and Charles was doing the good neighborly thing of trying to assist somebody to get to those elusive parking spaces which are in such high premium here in Montrose. As soon as he stepped back on the sidewalk from doing the good deed, one of the officers involved officer Kelly run over and started shouting at him that only uniformed police officers are allowed to direct traffic. And that may be true downtown. It's not necessarily true in Montrose. And I have noted during times of flood, anybody that stands out in middle the street and got to get to do so can direct traffic and traffic will obey them. And I see a lot of and uniformed people directing traffic in times of crises. And if you don't believe there's a crises in Westheimer in midnight, then try to drive down the sucker find out otherwise. But at any rate, the officers started pressuring Charles Charles a young man that I have known for some time I love it. Charles young man that I have known for some time, who has a nervous tick. And that tick results in kind of muscle spasms in the upper thorax area, the chest, shoulders and upper arms. And as the officer put the pressure on Charles Charles began to respond that way and Charles wanted to get away from the officer he had broken no laws that I have ever seen on any books in Texas and I researched that and there's no law against directing traffic if you feel there's a need of doing that. And Charles started on down the sidewalk. The officer grabbed him on the shoulder, spun him around and said don't walk away from me when I'm talking to you before he realized he had nothing else to say. So he stood there silently for a few moments and suggested that Charles move along. By this time the Tick was getting pretty pronounced in Charles and he moved from there about 12 paces to the corner, whereupon the officer caught up with him. And I had apparently confused his nervous tic with some way of mimicking the officer. I don't know exactly how I come to that conclusion, but that's what he said, Are you making fun of me? Grabbed Charles by the arm hollered at his partner and his partner who was officer Holt Shaw officer hold Shaw came over, they both got hold of Charles led him up into the art, waving threatening gestures with their heavy flashlights and informed Charles that he was going to jail. I think that's exactly the words that officer Holt Shaw used. And he was beginning to get uptight Charles all this time was trying to explain that he had a nervous tic, he

couldn't control it. Charles's usual explanation for such thing is that it is somehow related to his bodybuilding, which Charles spends a great deal of time doing apparently. And the officer Risk Officer. Kelly responded that officer hold Shah was a body builder, and he did not have a nervous tic, which seemed to be obvious. And I had reason to believe that they were going to hit Charles considering his tic subordinate. And I had certain knowledge that they were going to take him to jail because that is what they said. So I suggested that if they had to pick on someone that they pick on someone who could handle it. So they did, and they threw me in the back of the squad car and then announced politely that they were carrying me to BeechNut station. And then they radioed in and told the dispatcher that they had no prisoners, and that they were headed for BeechNut. And anybody who's been on the streets of Houston long enough to know about police beatings intimately know what trips to BeechNut means and I thought my pretty face my pretty face. And they decided to search me once more for weapons. Sometime during all this process, Officer Rob Kelly turned on his little trusty tape recorder, which he had cleverly disguised in his pocket. And then he came out and started searching me and I started fighting my case, I said, Look, I have been arrested for this business many times before and several times before. And I have always won these cases. And I frequently subsequently sue. And so I have not violated the statute. And I want you to know that before you carry me away. And the second place, I know what trips to BeechNut mean, and I do not deserve any violence. I do not play violence, you can't put a gun on me. I am famous for not having one. And you have just arrested Ray Hill in the middle of Montrose with at least 25 witnesses, most of whom wrote down the number of this squad car. And so you just really can't get away with that kind of thing. So they carried me out to BeechNut and checked me into a private room. I think it was the only one in that whole jail that had a private room. And the next morning, they carried me to city jail, which is in atrocious condition. They're awful shape. I'll be talking more about that in subsequent weeks as we tried to do something about the conditions in city jail. And I managed to get out of jail somewhere around five o'clock that evening, Sunday evening. And yeah, I'll go to court. And yeah, I'll when the case goes, I have not violated the statute. And then I'll report it to internal affairs. And depending on what Internal Affairs does if they punish the officers for wrongdoing, which seems to be strange, because every officer in their system thinks that if you talk to a cop, you're interfering with it. And that is not incidentally a violation of that statute. And depending on what Internal Affairs does, I will decide at that point whom to sue and whether or not I will sue them. The last time we went this go round, I spent an hour and 40 minutes in jail got 5000 bucks, that's a rate of 50 bucks a minute. I'm talking about considerable more money. I spent some 960 minutes in city jail this time, and boy was I angry really hacked me off. So more on that later. As for the mayor's position on Lee Harrington's appointment to teach at the academy. Lee has done a great deal of research on this area. And Lee is no longer president of a Political Caucus. He came to that position with counseling experience, and they may or may not have looked over his resume. And so her response may not be from the most knowledgeable position. He is no longer president of a Political Caucus. His term expired Oh, last night, and he can go back to doing counseling and other things that he has done for a long time. I think the mayor is misinformed.

The crime study reported to the meeting not at liberty bank earlier today, I guess decided that what they need to do is come close Westheimer down for a while because there's certainly enough squad cars, enough lights up and down the street to do that. Those of you who are coming into the area, it is not a special holiday. There is not a parade. It's just Montrose on a normal evening. I've said it before and I suppose I'll say it again. There's nothing really wrong Houston police officers except they're a bunch of punks that think they're violent substitutes for manhood. And that's not a fit. And they are very adolescent because they think violence works is the first thing you learn when you grow up is violence. After you get through the fight, you still got to deal with the problem that you were fighting over anyway. And police officers haven't figured that out in Houston, Texas. Maybe someday they will invent something to cure, sick, macho, and we will give it to all of them, and they'll be a lot better shape thereafter. This has been the Wilde 'N' Stein show. And we do this about every Thursday. Those of you who've been regular listeners to this program for many years in there, some of you folk out there, probably have noticed that the program has not quite jaded. We've got some wonderful volunteers, Jimmy's developing quite a following and art already had one when Mike left, and that's holding the program together.
