I want to thank them for inviting us to the heart, their holy union, I think that's a very personal thing to do. And I really want to thank them for having the courage to come on and do the interview. Because originally they said no. And they were scared to death about it. Oh, really. And I had offered to let them do the interview using the different names. And they they thought it over and said, Now we'll go ahead and do it with our own. Good. So I give them credit for that. One of the things that they talked about to it was the differences between British law and American law. And now they're in an unusual situation, because now they have a they had a holy union here. But the holy union is not recognized in this country. Right. What they're going to try and do is take that certificate back to Britain, since Britain would allow them to be legally married, and see if that's good enough to say, well, yes, you are legally married. And that's that, that would that end up with the best of both worlds, they will gotten a marriage, they will have had a wedding ceremony here with the words they wanted. And they will be legally married and Britain. Okay, so it'll be interesting to see how interesting. It's groundbreaking territory. They don't know whether it work. I don't know whether it will work. I do know that they had some bad information. When they got here, though. What happened was they went to they were told that in order to get a marriage license in this country, essentially all they would have to do is present the past present the birth certificate from Great Britain. And I think if that's all they had done, it would have been okay. What happened was that Vivian presented the birth certificate, and the birth certificate said male. And apparently they either asked for a second form of ID, or they volunteered it I'm not sure which but in any case, the second form of identification was a passport. Ropes and passports is female. Yes. And because the two did not agree, they wouldn't touch them. They wouldn't issue the marriage certificate. Now, Vivian doesn't look male at all. And I'm sure that whoever the clerk was in Harris County must look this is all these are a couple of lesbians trying to sneak when bias. Oh, and it's an interesting thing to me, because it's another example to me how transgenders and gays and lesbians issues criss cross. Sure. In this case, I'm sure that as far as Harris County was concerned, they hadn't attempted gay marriage, or attempted lesbian marriage. And it shows again, how how these issues criss crossing are just not as clear cut as they would seem. And it's very interesting, because Donna does consider herself a lesbian. So they, they, they feel like they have lesbian relationship. And they really do. I'm just pointing it out, because the next time somebody says to you, well, you know, gays and lesbians and transgenders don't have a lot in common. Tell them this story. Well, yeah. You know, and you can point out and say, Hey, wait a minute. That's not true, because I heard it on after hours. And you know, there was this British couple. It and that was why I wanted to come in and talk about it because it sort of fits into things we've been seeing on this show for several years. For what, almost two years now. Yes. Yes. So anyway, I thought that was interesting. I wanted to talk about the law conference coming up. Oh, yes. That's July 4, weekend, July 4 weekend. And he allegedly stopped a group of teens and took the teenage boy and alleged transvestite away in his patrol car and sexually assaulted him. Right. The teen reportedly told his father about the incident. And if any police report was filed, and if formal charges were against the police officer made, he will be placed on a temporary suspension pending the outcome of the case. Wow. So I have talked to Terry about this. She confirms Yes, this incident did happen. And she is working on it for more information. And we'll we'll tell you more about the story as it transpires.
