The leader of the youth organization of Norway's political party promoting family values has come out as a gay man on national television and as Goslin had intended to stay in the closet until the end of his term of office with the youth caucus of the crystal legal folk party at K RF the Christian Democratic Party. But rumors spurred him to out himself in mid October, I grew up in a Christian environment, Goslin said, when I was 12 years old, I realized that I was gay. At first, the K RF gave me the strength to deny my homosexuality, but inside I felt rotten. He also called the party's distinction between homosexual orientation and homosexual behavior, artificial a form of sexual fixation. If you take away a person's possibility to love someone, there isn't much left Gasland hoped his coming out would be helpful to others still in the closet. He is the first national level politician to come out in Norway since 1979. That was lesbian Conservative Member of Parliament wench lows out who was not renominated in 1985.

### Cindy Friedman 27:27

Voters in Victoria, Australia last month largely declined their first opportunity to vote for an openly gay candidate. Activist Shane Tonks filed for the state parliament in his drag persona of Barbara quicksand, although he ran on a lesbian and gay rights and aids care platform talks through most of his votes from heterosexuals. His 5% return was well behind the Labour Party winner and the Liberal Party challenger, but tonx was by far the leader among independent candidates in both votes and media coverage.

### Brian Nunes 28:05

Oregon's measure nine the failed ballot initiative that would have overturned and prevented civil rights protections for lesbians and gays was not the state's first anti gay and lesbian ballot measure that was measured eight was surprised the gay and lesbian community with its passage in 1988, overturning an executive order by then Governor Neal Goldsmith to prevent discrimination based on sexual orientation in state employment. This year 10 days after the defeat of measure nine, the Oregon Court of Appeals struck down measure eight claiming it violates employees rights to freedom of expression. The sponsor of both measure eight and measure nine was the Oregon Citizens Alliance. Their political director Philip Ramsdale, believes that if the ruling had come before the election, it might have helped measure nine to succeed.

Lithuania's leading gay activists have been Harris to such an extreme that five have sought asylum in Denmark, one refugee is Roma's Petroski is a co founder of the Lithuanian lesbian and gay Association. Petroski has told Danish authorities the police had detained him five times threatening him with sodomy charges if he did not turn over the association's membership list. over the last eight months. In August. Police questioned him in connection with the murder of a gay man. And in mid September, a car that had apparently been waiting for him to leave his home tried to run him down. Die now SGAs had also been threatened with sex crime charges by the Lithuanian General Prosecutor's Office.

Norwegian Prime Minister gro Brundtland is said to have asked Chamorro about the treatment of gays and lesbians in Nicaragua. Her Foreign Minister Ernesto Lael Sanchez met with Sweden's gay and lesbian National Federation for sexual equality following protests during a speech he gave. He claimed the law was not aimed at homosexuals, but was designed quote to protect women and children and quote, the highest

courts of the US Presbyterian Church has overruled two regional bodies to deny open lesbian Reverend Jane Spahr, a pastor ship. The downtown United Presbyterian Church in Rochester, New York selected spar a year ago, but some neighboring congregations objected. Early this month the denominations national judicial commission ruled the appointment improper because spar is quote, a self affirmed practicing homosexual and quote, spar was actually ordained before the US Presbyterian Church established its policy against gay and lesbian clergy. Although she came out afterwards, spar was surprised and saddened by the ruling.

John Shackleton the Navy's public affairs officer made a minimal enter statement Mr. Mine hole will be reinstated this morning to his former job at his former Squadron and doing his former duties. The Navy is in compliance with the court order. The government will return to court for a hearing of its appeal of the reinstatement order that mine holds attorney and gay advocate say Judge Hatter's tough position shows that he expects the military's ban on homosexuals to collapse. Mine hold told reporters he supports other gays and lesbians in the military who want to come out. I don't recommend it until the policy is changed.
