And then we had a short while we had a brief history of the of the banquet and then a guest speaker was Dr. Michael Ross, who is here in Houston. And he's originally from New Zealand and he has the most unique us Zealand accent. Now trying to listen to him. His speech was was a it was very interesting. Let's put it that way. But he thought just Texas drawl and I'm sure he did. And then we had the awards which we give out each year. The champions award which is awarded to the non transgendered individual company, group or entity, which stood up as staunch supporter of the transgender community and that went to the city of Houston Health Department this year. Because they have initiated the the HIV outreach program for the specifically for the gender community. Then the People's Choice Award is awarded by a vote of the transgender community to the individual chosen as the outstanding person of the past year in the local transgender community. And that went to Lily Roddy, who is also the resident horoscope. Writer for OutSmart and she was secretary of the of the unity committee this year, not that that had anything to do with her being elected. The the de McKellar award which is awarded to the local individual who has steadfastly stood up as a sponsor, staunch advocate for the values of the local transgender community went to Sarah rook, who is a an engineer out trans transsexual in the process of transitioning and ultimately plans to have the reassignment surgery. But she is one of the management people for Rochelle, and was instrumental and getting corporate support for the for the unity banquet this year. The Lifetime Achievement Award went is awarded to the individual who's accomplished over the course of years numerous achievements that have helped or positively impacted the entire local transgender community. And that went to Dr. Peggy Rudd, who those of you in the transgender community may know of her as the author of the books, my husband wears my clothes and cross dressing with dignity and several others. But the thing that you may not be aware of is Peggy was one of the people that initiated back 10 years ago, or 11 years ago, I guess, at one of the Texas tea parties got together with several people from Houston here, and came up with the idea of having the Unity banquet. And so she was honored for that. And in addition to the Lifetime Achievement Award, she also received a proclamation from the mayor's office making the Saturday, Peggy Red Day. And then the apogee Award, which is awarded to the individual who accomplished or achieved one thing or culmination of things that represent the high point of the past year to all the groups and aspects of the local transgender community. Went to Kristin Williams, who is the Executive Director of the cat's transgender shelter down in Galveston, and fee has almost single handedly with the help of about three or four other people in the Galveston and cats group brought that thing to life and he kept it alive, despite a very minimum of funding and so forth. And so she really deserved that. And then the final award was the Heritage Award, which was a special award that was given to Renee Fenner, who was one of the instigators, if you will of the Gulf Coast transgender community from which most of the other transgender groups in Houston can trace their lineage. But Renee and Renee was the president of the Gulf Coast transgender community at the time that Peggy was involved with the Trius group where we had the two groups excuse me, were the two groups had split. And with a certain amount of hostility and animosity there and this was the probably one of the factors that led her to, to come up with the idea for the unity banquet. But had Renee Fenner not also worked with Peggy on this line. It never would have come to fruition because of the fact that there were just the two groups and you know, and if one group sits out, it isn't much of a unity banquet. So and the food was fabulous had

filet mignon and twice baked potatoes and green beans that were done absolutely perfectly with green beans, almond, Dane and and chocolate mousse for dessert. That I'm gonna have to walk my dog for another five miles tomorrow morning. The calories and she's gonna hate me. Yeah, but she needs she needs the exercise too. But anyhow, that's what that's what happened at the Unity banquet. It was great. And in fact, they're already talking about trying to get a larger room for next years. A unity banquet and you know, we'll get some planning together on that. And then one one last thing is tonight, Sunday, Sunday, Sunday Sunday at the at the briar patch 2294 Holcomb Boulevard actually Greenbrier and McClendon block north of Holcomb. Sunday April 21. At 8pm. The Imperial Court and myself are presenting a fundraiser for the cats transgender shelter called give me shelter. You can imagine where that name came from. But anyhow, it shouldn't be a great show, we do have a slight conflict in that the Lean on me foundation is having their semi annual thing at the BRB tomorrow night, but they started six o'clock, and we're gonna start about a 30. And so and I've been promised that once like once the person the entertainers have done their number there at the at the VRB that they're gonna come up to the briar patch and do a number there for our show. And we should have a goodly audience there from the transgender community that was at the banquet tonight. A lot of them have said that they're going to be there tomorrow.
