It's, we have an HIV and AIDS aspect to the clinic, we have an OB GYN aspect, and this year, we just got a grant to do a Teen Clinic. So we're very proud of that, and hopefully, hopefully expanded over the next couple of years.

Ryan White Care Act, as you may know, is up for renewal this year and that's a process that you renew it and it goes on for five years. One of the focuses of our board members, not the organization, I should say, is to make sure that the way the funding structure is set up is changed. Right now Houston loses about \$5 million. Every funding cycle under Ryan White, because the way it's set up, they're still using the formula use the 19 in the 80s when it was passed. So cities like Houston and Los Angeles, they only have about a difference of about 1000 cases. San Francisco only has 1000 cases more than we do. We're losing out several million dollars, which is a lot of money that can be used to address some of the issues that are here the crisis and African American community and HIV and AIDS as well as general minority outreach that we need to be doing.
