And he wanted to thank the professional effort by the staff of heaven and by the firemen who came who got on the scene and got the fire out as quickly as possible. Any injuries? Not that I could see there was four ambulances that I saw on the scene that if something happened, but none of them went rolling out. So there was a couple of firemen that came out there were a little smoldering, but as far as anybody injured. No patrons know according to Charles, he said all the staff was accounted for and as far as he can tell, all the patrons were accounted for Greg's good. So no idea yet on how quickly they're going to be able to reopen the back area backward the dance pit area for I guess the best way to describe the area appears where the fire started. And it rolled over the top of the fire area over the pit area to the right hand side of the dance area. So looking in the back door off of Hyde Park, there was quite a bit of damage so I'm not sure how far how long it's going to be for them. Under reopen or in Charles wasn't ready to give an estimate about how long there so he just may want to keep an ear out for when they're going to be able to come back for Christmas. Benton County Superior Court Judge Carolyn brown on Friday sentenced Chris Wheatley is this person's name to 22 months in prison and recommended that she be treated at an all male facility in Monroe Washington, because it has a program for sex offenders. But brown admitted she was unsure what to do with Wheatley, who takes male hormones has grown a thin go t and then fools her victim into thinking she is a man. But authority say the 21 year old resident has female genitalia. Now, we've talked about this kind of this sort of thing before about being classified in jails by by genitals. The problem that Wheatley has with this particular case, I think is that she has no identification changes whatsoever. They say that she's mail. She has not pleaded guilty. But all the same. This is a tough situation. And so we're going to be watching this case in Washington. Wheatley, the person that has gone on their way to present here is going to have a very hard case. Because
