Oh, went down and got a copy of the report and gave them the \$2 or whatever it is. And I read the report. And what did it say? It said that we were working at a gay radio station. What, which is not true. No, we're not working. We're volunteers. And number two, it's not a gay radio station, not by a longshot just happens to have 45678 hours of gay and lesbian programming per week, per week. But it's not a gay radio station, as opposed to gospel stations which blare out the Lord hallelujah 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. It's just a station that allows us the opportunity to come in here and tell our side of the story which you don't hear anywhere else. Yeah. But anyway, she continued to say that we were doing our little radio show and we received a phone call from someone who made fun of our lifestyle, Wyatt. That's what it said baby. He made fun of our lifestyle. And that was

And we will, what we will do is we will keep you posted on this because I'm very serious about this, it made me very angry. At first I was going to try to fix it from the inside because I'm in there. But that's not good enough, that's not going to work we're going to do is do what any other person would do as a citizen. Like I said, you go to records, get a copy of your reports. I'm gonna go down there and we're going to write a letter. We'll sit down and we'll write a letter to the chief and ask her to please investigate this and find out how a death threat can be changed to a made fun of their lifestyle. Yeah, sort of thing and we'll just keep you posted to see what happens. Meanwhile, back with the chief, she had a beautiful baby, eight pounds and 12 ounces. And to me her husband said that he one of the newscasters. I believe it was Marlene McClinton on Channel 11 said that she had heard rumors that Chief Watson was not going to return to the department as the chief, right? And wanted to know if that was true. And the Chiefs husband, who is a sergeant at HPD said that the outcome of the birth had determined the response to that question. And there was some concern from the chief that if there was a problem with her child, or with her that she might not go back? Oh, well, that's very different. The baby is healthy, and the chief is healthy. And Sergeant Watson assured channel 11 And everybody else, which I was very glad to hear that Chief Watson will be back in probably six to eight weeks. That's soon just in time to get our letter. Oh. So we'll see what happens. But she had a beautiful baby, it was on television this afternoon all scrunched up, like babies look, you know, the day after

There was a program on one of the cable channels the other night, I believe it was on Disney, talking about how we mistreat so many animals that live with this on this planet. And how that there are 1000s and 1000s of cats and dogs that are put to sleep every day because their owners will allow them to run free and they multiply and just keep adding to the problems of wild and stray animals in our streets and how that they are humanely put to sleep but their lives are snuffed out because we don't care. And I was watching the news the last couple of days there's some place where they're digging up now looking at digging the ground everywhere and looking for toxic waste that was buried 10 years ago. I mean, even the attorney tonight from the Texas Human Rights Foundation said, Well, you're real lucky working for the Santa you're protected. That could be fired Tuesday. I don't know who he thinks he is or what planet he's on. I mean, I don't have anything special. The only reason they don't screw around with me, is the same reasons that they don't screw around with Perry Watkins. And the same reasons that the Supreme Court said that the United States Army cannot discriminate against him because of his sexual orientation. If you're not, they can't.
