

CO-HOST 1: And coming up--

CO-HOST 2: (WHISPERS) Thank you, thank you, thank you.

CO-HOST 1: Thank you very much. Coming up next, where they celebrate life in the heart of Montrose.

CO-HOST 2: Don't leave--

CO-HOST 1: Don't leave.

CO-HOST 2: --and stick around.

CO-HOST 1: Hang on tight.

CO-HOST 2: You did a great show, man.

CO-HOST 1: I had a good marathon.

CO-HOST 2: It was a dynamite show. You got some good people listening and calling in, and I think it's what's great.

CO-HOST 1: Right, that's what makes this radio station.

CO-HOST 2: It's KPFT wonderful, kind of station that you know that you're going to hear all kinds of wonderful things at midnight to 2, and 2 to 4, and 4 to 6, and 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

CO-HOST 1: Well, I'm going to get out of here.

CO-HOST 2: You are?

CO-HOST 1: Yeah.

CO-HOST 2: Should we push a button in?

CO-HOST 1: Oh, I guess.

CO-HOST 2: OK, let's see. Is this the right one?

REPORTER: The disorders began with a routine police raid on a homosexual bar, the Stonewall on Christopher Street.

CROWD: (CROWD CHANTING) Say it loud! Gay and proud!

RALLYIST: We take great pride in what's happened in the gay community and what's going to happen.

WOMAN: The people of Dade County has said enough, enough, enough.

CROWD: (CROWD CHANTING) Human rights are here to stay! Anita Bryant go away!

MAN: There's no question in my mind that the people of California don't want homosexuals teaching in the classroom.

MAN: State Senator John Briggs has just conceded the election.

WOMAN: Both Mayor Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk had been shot and killed.

REPORTER: Dan White has been found guilty of one count each of voluntary manslaughter.

CROWD: (CROWD CHANTING) Fight now! Fight back!

REPORTER: It has now broken loose. Cops are now bashing heads.

REPORTER: And here comes the National March on Washington For Lesbian and Gay Rights.

REPORTER: Gay power, gay politics. That's what this report is about.

REPORTER: There are gay and lesbian people singing out here. What's your reaction to that?

WOMAN: I think it's terrible. If I had a rock, I'd throw it at them.

LESBIAN The real message of these gay games is it every one of us is a winner.

WOMAN:

GAY MAN: Tonight we are marching as are others across America, and we shouldn't have to be.

LEA DELARIA: Come on, let's say it so they can hear you in the Capitol! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back!

WOMAN: I think that's Robin Tyler on the stage leading the chant, for love or for life, we're not going back.

LEA DELARIA AND BRUCE HOPKINS! Good afternoon, and welcome to the National March on Washington, DC for Gay and Lesbian Rights and choral reciting!

[CHEERING]

LEA DELARIA: Let's hear it out there!

[CHEERING]

I'm Lea Delaria!

BRUCE I'm Bruce Hopkins!

HOPKINS:

LEA DELARIA: I'm dyke!

BRUCE I'm a faggot!

HOPKINS:

LEA DELARIA And we're bestfriends!

AND BRUCE

HOPKINS:

[CHEERING]

SPEAKER: I want you to savor this next moment. I have the proud task of telling you that the official count of the Lesbian and Gay Rights March, the official count is over 500,000 strong! 500,000 strong! Look at you! 500,000 strong!

[CHEERING]

500,000 strong, one of the largest marches in United States history!

[CHEERING]

One the largest marches in United States history! 500,000 strong!

CO-HOST 1: 520-5738, 520-KPFT, call now!

GAY MAN: We must destroy the myths. Once and for all, shatter them. We must continue to speak out. And most importantly, most importantly, every gay person must come out.

[CHEERING]

As difficult as it is, you must tell your immediate family. You must tell your relatives. You must tell your friends if indeed they are your friends. You must tell your neighbors. You must tell the people you work with. You must tell the people in the stores you shop in. You--

[CHEERING]

And once they realize that we are indeed their children, that we are indeed everywhere, every myth, every lie, every innuendo, will be destroyed once and for all. And once you do, you will feel so much better.

[CHEERING]

BUDDY: Well, everybody's mike is hot.

TERRY: Hot.

BUDDY: Hot, hot, hot!

TERRY: Hot, hot, hot, hot, hot.

BUDDY: Are you hot, Matt?

TERRY: Hello, Matt.

BUDDY: Matt's not hot.

TERRY: Matt, Matt.

BUDDY: Matt?

TERRY: Good morning.

BUDDY: Ladies and gentlemen, stand by a second. We will to try to find Matt. Electrical lab room.

TERRY: Paging, one Matt.

BUDDY: Are you there? Hello, hello, hello?

MATT: Am I here?

TERRY: Hello, hello, hello, hello, hello.

BUDDY: Well the music's playing. We must be doing something right.

MATT: Hello? [INAUDIBLE] Am I on?

BUDDY: Oh, yeah, we're all on. We can only hear one thing, *After Hours* on KPFT Houston 90.1 FM. Was that a siren I heard?

TERRY: It was Bryan.

BUDDY: Is that [INAUDIBLE]? What was that? [IMITATING SIREN] Police are in there. The police are going to pull us over because they know this is radio celebrating life from the heart of Montrose. It's this song right here.

It's also KPFT listener-sponsored radio. Listener sponsored means that we're going to ask you to call in and make a pledge of support to this station. We want you to get all excited about that. Right, Terry?

TERRY: Right. It's so exciting.

MATT: Oh!

BUDDY: Oh, what was that, Matt?

TERRY: What are you doing to us, Matt?

BUDDY: Let me let Matt pull this thing down.

TERRY: Bye, Matt.

BUDDY: OK, did you get it?

MATT: Yeah, it's down.

BUDDY: Matt has troubles getting his thing down.

[LAUGHS]

Early in the morning. Well, what we want to tell you is this is *After Hours Radio* on KPFT Houston 90.1 FM.

TERRY: 90.1.

BUDDY: It's a listener sponsored and that means that we depend on you, the listener, to keep us on the air. You've done that for the past 18 years. This year is KPFT's 18th birthday. 1988 and our basic subscription rate is only \$18. And you can make a pledge of support to KPFT right now by calling 520-5738. That's 520-KPFT, and we're going to switch over to Roger.

TERRY: Hello, Roger.

ROGER: Hello.

BUDDY: Give us some words of encouragement, Roger.

ROGER: Words of encouragement.

BUDDY: Yeah.

ROGER: Well, this is a listener-sponsored radio. Hear what you've been missing because you can't hear it anywhere else, but KPFT. And we've got lots of people out here ready to take your phone calls. Call 520-5738, 520-KPFT, and make your pledges.

For \$128 pledge, we have a blue satin jacket with KPFT logo on it with the "Here you've been listening." And for a \$68 pledge, we have a nice white sweatshirt with KPFT logo on it in dark blue and green.

TERRY: What kind of sweatshirt?

ROGER: It's a white sweatshirt.

TERRY: With what lettering?

ROGER: KPFT.

TERRY: Oh, I want this sweatshirt.

MATT: I got one for you.

ROGER: Matt already got yours.

TERRY: OK, Matt. Bring it back.

ROGER: And for a \$38 pledge, you can get a nice KPFT red fire engine t-shirt with the KPFT logo on it. And for \$18, you can get the guide for a year. And with all the other pledges, you can get the guide for a year.

BUDDY: What's the phone number?

ROGER: 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

TERRY: Can they call collect?

ROGER: Yes, they can call collect.

TERRY: Oh, wow!

ROGER: Mm-hmm. We've got four phones.

BUDDY: How many phones?

MATT: 40.

ROGER: Four phones.

TERRY: 40.

ROGER: 40? No, four phones.

BUDDY: We have volunteers everywhere.

ROGER: We have volunteers, volunteers everywhere.

TERRY: Tripping all over themselves.

BUDDY: Well, give us a call.

ROGER: 520-5738, 520-KPFT. Let's hear the phones ring. Keep volunteers busy taking your pledges.

BUDDY: Go ahead, baby. I'm sorry.

ROGER: Just call now. 520-5730 520-KPFT.

BUDDY: Baby, what's the number? [INAUDIBLE]

ROGER: 520-KPFT, 520-5738. In addition to the other premiums we've got, we've got some special premiums here. We've got Pacifica's timeline, which traces the past 20 years or so of gay history.

BUDDY: You mean I can get that by making a pledge?

ROGER: That's right. You can get it for \$38 pledge, and you can also get the KPFT t-shirt, and the program guide. Also for \$38, we have a Harvey Milk special. It's diminished capacity special about the assassination of Harvey Milk and subsequent-- well, riots and the Dan White verdict, and everything. That, in addition to the t-shirt.

BUDDY: That occurred about 10 years ago, right?

ROGER: 10 years ago this year. And for \$68 pledge, you can get a two cassette package. Two one-hour cassettes, so it's two hours of the March on Washington, the five out of-- it's a highlights of the five hours that Pacifica broadcast last October. It's a great fit and it's better than listening to five full hours. And that's for \$68 pledge in addition to the KPFT t-shirt.

BUDDY: Tell us about those special blue satin jackets.

ROGER: The blue satin jackets. You mean the ones that Jean had to order extras of because people have been calling in a lot of \$128 pledges to get those?

BUDDY: Tell us about them.

ROGER: They are fantastic. They are genuine satin. They are lined jackets. They come in small, medium, large, and extra large. Matt just said they have nice pockets in them.

On the back of them, they have a white KPFT logo. "Hear what you've been missing" with green highlights. And they're real nice for a nice night like tonight, because they can keep you warm. 520-5738.

BUDDY: Give us a call 520-5738, 520-KPFT. You can make that pledge of support on your Visa, or your MasterCard, or your American Express. Or you can just bring us cold hard cash right, Bryan?

ROGER: If you're listening now, you should be a listener sponsor to KPFT.

BUDDY: Oh, you got me.

ROGER: And to do that,

BUDDY: Hello?

ROGER: Call 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

BUDDY: Say hello, Bryan.

BRYAN: Hello, Bryan.

BUDDY: Bryan, why should someone call and support KPFT radio?

BRYAN: Because this is the best radio in the city of Houston. It's Pacifica, the one and only.

BUDDY: Well Roger, what are the phones doing, anything?

ROGER: Oh, they're quiet right now.

BUDDY: Well, we're going to make them ring in just a second.

ROGER: That's right. We need you to make them ring.

BRYAN: Who's here?

BUDDY: Somebody is here to tell us about something special that's going on. When, next Saturday night?

ROGER: On January 30th at Shoots, their second anniversary party.

BRYAN: All right!

ROGER: It's going to start-- well, say, early in the evening. 6:00 PM til 2:15. We have a special lineup of DJ's from all over the gay clubs in Houston.

BUDDY: And they're doing a benefit for--

ROGER: --the Montrose Clinic.

BUDDY: Hey.

BRYAN: All right!

ROGER: We'll accept cash donations, and it'll be 45 minute sets of some very extraordinary talent.

BUDDY: That sounds exciting. We just had a benefit down there tonight for Stone Soup, right?

ROGER: That's right.

TERRY: How much money did they raise?

ROGER: A lot.

BUDDY: Buckets and buckets?

ROGER: It was three big barrels of donations we took off the stage.

BUDDY: Now, see?

BRYAN: Were you were you the only man there?

ROGER: No.

BUDDY: At Shoots?

BRYAN: Well, I thought you had just [INAUDIBLE].

BUDDY: I've seen those men down there at Shoots.

BRYAN: Well, no, he said earlier that he was up to his eyeballs and drag queens

ROGER: Well, there-- you get one queen in a room and they all get in drag.

[LAUGHTER]

BUDDY: Give us a call at 520-5738 and let's talk about raising money for KPFT Radio.

BRYAN: 520-KPFT, call us now.

BUDDY: That's going to be a benefit at Shoots.

ROGER: Yes.

BUDDY: And it's next Sunday--

ROGER: Next Saturday.

BUDDY: Next Saturday night, and what time does it start again?

ROGER: It'll start at 6:00 PM in the evening and go till 2:15.

BUDDY: Sounds good. And you've also given us some music to play, right?

ROGER: Yes, I have. I recorded it right there.

BRYAN: It's pretty hot stuff.

BUDDY: Yeah, we're going to listen to some of that here later on.

TERRY: (WHISPERING) 520-5738--

BUDDY: So give us a call at 520-KPFT, 520-5738, and make that pledge of support anonymous. We know you're out there, and you're one of our biggest supporters. Although we're out of the closet. I mean, Bryan, you can't get Bryan much more out of the closet.

ROGER: BRYAN: Well, I know that's right.

[LAUGHTER]

BUDDY: If I can work for the police department and come down here every week and do a gay radio show on the fourth largest city in the United States, so I can't get much more out of the closet.

BRYAN: Well, you can't get much more out of the closet than I was. I was on Phil Donahue two weeks ago. What more do you want?

BUDDY: Give us a call, 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

ROGER: And become a supporter of KPFT.

BUDDY: Yeah. Welcome to KPFT.

BROOKE Thank you, Buddy, for having me.

MACDONALD:

BUDDY: Got a special this week on Marathon 88. We're listening to music written by gay men and women from all over the Houston area. And we're going to hear a song now called Kindred Spirits, right?

BROOKE Yes. Actually, the true title is-- the true title is "We Are All Kindred Spirits."

MACDONALD:

BUDDY: "We Are All Kindred Spirits?"

BROOKE Yes, that is the original title of the song. It was written in 1983.

MACDONALD:

BUDDY: You've written other songs?

BROOKE Long before this. Yes, yes.

MACDONALD:

BUDDY: What can you tell us about the song we're going to hear?

BROOKE It's basically a real humanitarian song. Just the fact that we're all of the same blood, and breathe the same air,

MACDONALD: and all deserve the same respect.

BUDDY: It sounds good.

BROOKE That's what it's about.

MACDONALD:

BUDDY: So as we listen to it, give us a call here at KPFT at 520-5738 and make your pledge of support. That's 520-KPFT.

BROOKE Hi, Joe.

MACDONALD:

BUDDY: It was Brooke MacDonald, song called "We're All Kindred Spirits."

TERRY: It's a nice song.

BUDDY: It really is, isn't it?

TERRY: Yeah.

BUDDY: And you're not going to hear that on any other radio station. I can guarantee you that.

TERRY: You know why?

BRYAN: Why?

TERRY: Because we're listener sponsored. We play what everyone wants to play.

BRYAN: We're what?

BUDDY: We're a bunch of faggots and dykes in here, and you're not going to get those people on another radio station.

BRYAN: I thought-- we never-- I'm gay. I don't know how about you all, but--

[LAUGHTER]

TERRY: Yes, Bryan?

ROGER: Well, I don't know on the other radio stations. They just don't admit it.

BRYAN: Yeah, I know there's going to be a few of those out there up there on Kick. Have you ever heard of gay kickers?

ROGER: Who? No, an Aggie.

BUDDY: Ever heard of who?

BRYAN: Gay kickers.

BUDDY: The gay kickers.

BRYAN: K-I-K-K.

BUDDY: No.

TERRY: K-I-K-K?

BRYAN: You know these gay kickers?

TERRY: Is it really?

BRYAN: Ha ha. I'm one of them.

TERRY: Are you?

BRYAN: I love country and Western music.

TERRY: I know, that's right.

BRYAN: And Cowboys.

TERRY: I was waiting for that. I like the Cowgirls, but my honey said I can only look and not touch.

BRYAN: Oh.

TERRY: She said after you get married, you can't touch anymore.

BUDDY: Well, you're not supposed to.

TERRY: I know. That's what she keeps telling me.

BUDDY: It's 32 minutes after the hour of 2:00 in the morning.

ROGER: Did you know that plastic works just as good after 2:00 in the morning?

TERRY: I know that.

ROGER: Use the MasterCard, American Express.

BUDDY: Well, unless you're Lance Lalor.

TERRY: That's right. Blame it on that woman. It's all her fault.

ROGER: Yeah, would have been mad, too. All he gave her was a \$30 dinner.

TERRY: I know.

BUDDY: And even though I work for the city in the police department, I've never seen Lance Lalor. But now, with his criminal activity, I might even stand a chance to see him going into the city hotel in handcuffs or something.

TERRY: Uh-oh.

BRYAN: We wouldn't want that.

BUDDY: No, you don't want that, for real.

TERRY: Not even for Lance. But if you can call us now, please call us.

ROGER: I want to tell you there's satin jackets really do make an impact when you walk in a club, too.

TERRY: Hey, I like those t-shirts. I like that red. That red's a real nice sharp red. It's a real-- bright red.

BRYAN: 520-KPFT call us now.

TERRY: And I hear the sweatshirts are warm. I saw the weather here earlier and they said we're supposed to be getting real cold. So those would keep you warm. And that's for a pledge of \$68.

BUDDY: Well, how are the pledges coming?

ROGER: We've got one here. It's from Ray, and he pledged \$25. He's going to get the program guide for the next year. And we had one false ring here.

BUDDY: I get those at home all the time. Usually they breathe heavy and then they don't ever say anything.

ROGER: (WHISPERING) 520-5738.

BUDDY: I like that.

BRYAN: Maybe a little more butcher though.

ROGER: Mm-hmm. But KPFT has a lot to offer even if you don't normally listen to *After Hours* or any of the late night programs. If you just happen to be up, we offer programming in eight languages and 20 different music styles from Celtic music to--

BRYAN: Irish.

ROGER: --German, Irish, jazz, folk.

BUDDY: Tell them about that program on Friday afternoons at 1:00.

ROGER: Ah, fresh potpourri. Yes, with Anna and Jackie. They--

BRYAN: [SPEAKING FRENCH]

ROGER: *Oui.* Yes, I speak French. I'm taking French over UVH and I listen to them every week. And I love it. You can also listen to salsa, which comes right up after them. And that's Spanish and with salsa music.

BRYAN: We have a Cajun show.

ROGER: Cajun, we have country. In fact, we have one of the very few actually country music shows with the old cowboy songs. It's actually cowboy music from like the '50s in that. That you can't buy those records anymore.

BRYAN: Gene Autry.

ROGER: Mm-hmm, Gene Autry. Mm-hmm. And my boss at work listens to that, and he said he's so glad that's back. I believe it was off for about a year, and I don't know who exactly who does it-- is back.

BRYAN: Well, if you make an \$18 dollar pledge--

BUDDY: That's [INAUDIBLE] you're talking about.

ROGER: OK, that's-- yes.

BRYAN: If you make an \$18 dollar pledge, you can find out who everybody is.

ROGER: That's right. You can find that. You can find out when all these programs are, what all the programs are about. And for a year, those come out every two months. So you get six of them a year.

And for a \$38 pledge, you get a KPFT red t-shirt. And for a \$68 pledge, you can get a white KPFT sweatshirt. And for \$128 pledge, you can get a blue satin jacket. In addition to any of the other-- any of the other special premiums I mentioned-- the timeline program with about the gay history and the Harvey Milk program. Diminished capacities.

BRYAN: Just think KPFT is 18 years old.

ROGER: That's right. And that's why everything's eight this year. That's right, not old enough to drink though.

BRYAN: Well, hey, this time in the morning?

ROGER: Well, the bar's all close. That's why we're here.

BRYAN: Call us right now --

ROGER: After hours.

BRYAN: 520-5738.

ROGER: 520-KPFT. And pledge now.

BRYAN: You can call us from your favorite club you're having a cocktail at right now.

ROGER: That's right. Just pick up that payphone and call. We'll take a local coin phone collect call here.

BRYAN: We do take collect calls.

ROGER: We take any kind of collect call if you're going to make a pledge.

BUDDY: And one of the best reasons to pledge, if you're a gay man or a gay woman, I shouldn't say woman. I said that last week.

TERRY: I liked it, woman.

BUDDY: That sound-- well, I had just one woman one time, and she said, I'm not a dyke. I'm a woman. And I said, yes ma'am.

[LAUGHS]

ROGER: (WHISPERING) 520-5738.

BUDDY: But this is the only place you're going to get a bunch of dykes and faggots and all these good wonderful gay people that come in and tell you how wonderful it is to be gay. And we're very proud of who we are and what we are, and we think that you should be. We know that 1988 is going to be a very exciting year, and we saw the kickoff of that. Bryan, you were there in Washington in October.

BRYAN: Yes, I was.

BUDDY: And if you couldn't go to Washington, you were able to tune your dial to 90.1 FM Pacifica Radio because we broadcast five hours of the rally live from Washington, DC. And you certainly didn't get that anywhere else. For love and for life.

TERRY: You wouldn't have seen it on any of TV.

BRYAN: I don't care even if *TIME* and *Newsweek* didn't think it was news. We knew we were news.

TERRY: That's right.

BRYAN: We've seen we were news.

KPFT broadcast five hours of it live. We also brought the Bork hearings, too.

BUDDY: That's right, Baby, how many people are in that protest we saw on TV yesterday for abortion or something?

TERRY: 50,000 people.

BUDDY: Can you believe this, Bryan? They have a protest in Washington. 50,000 people show up.

TERRY: And it was all over CNN, and all over the news.

BUDDY: It was all over everything.

TERRY: But when 750,000 people march--

BUDDY: 750,000 people go to Washington, and they--

TERRY: They ignore.

BRYAN: Well, you're never invisible.

BUDDY: Well, we are invisible. We are coming out. This is going to be the year we prove--

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

--that in October.

BRYAN: 1988 is our year.

BUDDY: That's right. And in the Houston metro area, if you just follow the cancer reports and I think these numbers are wrong. That means there are 450,000 of us out there.

TERRY: Well people are-- the experts are saying now is about 50% or 15%--

BRYAN: I like the 50 better.

TERRY: --and that's potentially 40 million people in this country.

BUDDY: And our goal here at KPFT for Winter Marathon this year is \$88,000 because it's 88, our 88th year, 1988. KPFT is 18 years old. Our basic subscription rate is \$18.

BRYAN: \$38--

BUDDY: By the way you can--

BRYAN: \$68--

BUDDY: --pledge and pay on your Visa, MasterCard, American Express. 520-5738.

TERRY: Help us take a bite out of the transmitter that just costs us \$50,000 plus the other work brought it up to \$70,000.

BUDDY: If every gay man and woman listening in Houston right now called in, we'd have \$450,000. And Jean, we'd have to put her in hospital for a couple of days to recuperate.

TERRY: She might even come out of her prayer tower.

BRYAN: Jean would be calling us from her Villa in the South of France.

BUDDY: Yeah, give us a call. If you're a gay man and woman, and you enjoy this kind of radio, and you need this kind of radio, pick up the phone and make that commitment to us. And you become a of the family because this is community radio.

TERRY: Do you know what I was told the other day?

BUDDY: What's that?

BRYAN: Whatever you told?

TERRY: I was told again this year someone has offered about \$5 million for KPFT.

BUDDY: That's right.

TERRY: Probably just like last year, when the right-wing Christians wanted to take over. And I guess Jerry Falwell wanted to be on the air here in Houston or something.

BUDDY: Jerry who?

BRYAN: It's the Brother Jerry Show.

ROGER: Brother Jerry, yeah.

TERRY: Yay!

ROGER: I wish [INAUDIBLE] you're all going to hell.

BRYAN: He can just stay on the East Coast.

BUDDY: Well listen, there was something that happened in Washington that we want to remind you of right now. And we want to do it very solemnly because it was a very solemn event. And that's when they unrolled something called The Quilt from the Names Project. Bryan, you saw it, right?

BRYAN: Yes, I helped. I helped out in that--

BUDDY: What did it look like?

BRYAN: It was the most wonderful-- to coin a phrase, that was our Vietnam Wall, that Quilt. And it's coming back here to Texas. And I'm glad to say that I'm one of the persons that's going to be organizing the area here in Houston. The 1st of May, we're going to have the Quilt back in Texas. And that's something that every gay man, woman, lesbian, everyone needs to see. It's so unbelievable. I can't even tell you about-- it's a religious experience to see the Quilt. That's all you can say.

BUDDY: Well everybody knows what a quilt is. And this quilt was made up of panels. Each panel, three foot by 6 foot representing the human body, a life, of someone--

BRYAN: Who passed away from AIDS.

BUDDY: And it wasn't just gay people. It was young people, children--

BRYAN: Anyone who's passed away from AIDS.

BUDDY: So for all those panels, let's make a donation to Public Radio. And it was very important to one very special person that we lost last April. His name was Mike. Mike Miesch. Mike was very involved here at KPFT.

BRYAN: Waldenstein.

BUDDY: He was very involved in the gay community. And Michael was very special. And he was very special to someone by the name of Hitachi. Hitachi does a program here called Speakeasy. So while you listen to this, give us a call, make that pledge of support. 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

BUDDY: Is that right? Smallville?

TERRY: Some Smallville.

ROGER: Not Smallville.

BUDDY: Is that where he called from?

ROGER: Smallville's where Superman's from.

TERRY: He could have been Superman.

ROGER: Was it Smithville I think?

TERRY: Smithville.

ROGER: Smithville. And if you call right now, you can take up on these premiums. The special premiums, the Harvey Milk tapes, the timeline tapes, the highlights of the March on Washington.

TERRY: That's worth the money.

BRYAN: Oh, I hear some phones ringing.

BUDDY: Is that the phone ringing?

TERRY: Got so excited.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

ROGER: You can get a KPFT red t-shirt. Or for \$68 pledge, you can get a white KPFT sweatshirt.

BRYAN: And it feels real good when it's cold outside.

TERRY: I want one of the sweatshirts.

BRYAN: I'm just dying to get mine.

TERRY: Satin jacket.

BUDDY: Listen guys, I had a call from Dwayne, the program director. And he said that we needed to get some money because if we couldn't, they were going to give the Old Time Gospel Hour with Jerry Falwell our time.

ROGER: Oh, no!

BRYAN: Oh, no.

BUDDY: This could be our last show tonight.

TERRY: Please call us. Please call us. I don't want us to--

BRYAN: The Old Time Gospel Hour will be coming your way live next week on KPFT.

ROGER: Either that or they'll have Pat Robertson on running for president.

TERRY: We could have Tammy Faye on.

BUDDY: 520-5738.

BRYAN: Is that where Jim and Tammy are coming [INAUDIBLE].

ROGER: No, someone spilled water on Tammy as she melted away.

TERRY: Tammy and Jim, right here.

BUDDY: It wouldn't be from Montrose.

BRYAN: You'd be from Deer Park.

TERRY: You don't with Jim. I shouldn't say that. Excuse me, Jim.

TERRY: Oh, no!

ROGER: This is an emergency!

TERRY: (WHISPERING) Call us.

BRYAN: This is live. This is live! We-- I've lost it.

TERRY: [INAUDIBLE] come down from that ceiling, Buddy. They're going to call, Buddy. They're going to call.

BRYAN: I'm going to pack everything up and go home. Don't fall along the phone. Call them up.

TERRY: Please, please.

BRYAN: Let's turn up what you're hearing there so the boys and girls can hear what you're doing.

BUDDY: We don't know what we're doing. We're getting ready to leave. Let's pack everything up. Here's music to load your crates by.

BRYAN: Then work your whatever is by.

ROGER: --a couple weeks ago when we went off the air.

TERRY: Up, down, up, down, up, down.

ROGER: This is the Terry Adkins Workout Show.

BUDDY: Three o'clock in the morning on KPFT *Pacifica* Radio 90.1 FM.

TERRY: Houston [INAUDIBLE].

ROGER: Ladies and gentlemen, we're out of control. What can I say.

TERRY: This is *After Hours* out of control, right here, live in Montrose [INAUDIBLE] say right here. If you've never heard anything like this, that is great because you're listening to sponsor-listening station right here.

ROGER: This is what happens--

TERRY: I think the police are on to it.

ROGER: --listen, listen, listen.

BRYAN: What? What? What?

TERRY: What, what, what?

ROGER: This is what happens when you get a bunch of queers in here and dykes. They just take over, and they go crazy.

TERRY: Crazy.

BRYAN: Call us now.

BUDDY: If someone will call us, we might stop this craziness.

ROGER: Uh-oh. They're calling in the reinforcements.

TERRY: All right.

ROGER: They're going to take us away.

TERRY: [INAUDIBLE] right now!

ROGER: They're coming to take us away.

BUDDY: If somebody calls in with a pledge right now, we could shut up and everybody can hear music.

TERRY: Yeah.

ROGER: That's right. 520-5738, 520-KPFT and become a listener sponsor of KPFT.

TERRY: Roger, did we get that \$68 pledge yet?

ROGER: No, haven't got a \$68 pledge. Nobody's taking us up on that offer.

TERRY: No, Buddy, nope. Come on, we are serious here folks. And we talk serious here. I mean, [INAUDIBLE] down here. Let's talk serious.

ROGER: I like the t-shirt, and I like the sweatshirt.

TERRY: Call this folks. Please.

BUDDY: All right, somebody just [INAUDIBLE].

ROGER: 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

BRYAN: Call collect if you need to.

ROGER: Call now, become a listener sponsor.

TERRY: Is that our queue [INAUDIBLE]?

BUDDY: What's going to happen if people--

ROGER: On the average, takes about two to three years for someone to listen to KPFT to become a sponsor.

TERRY: Two to three years?

ROGER: Two or three years. And a lot of people go through that process even faster. We've had calls where people have just found us and call in and pledge because they love what Pacific is all about, what KPFT is all about.

BUDDY: Well, it's 3:01. 3:01, this is KPFT Houston, and we're completely out of control. I don't know what we're doing.

TERRY: Wait a minute, wait a minute. I hear-- I hear Jim-Bob coming in.

BUDDY: Jim-Bob

TERRY: Jim-Bob. Yo, Jim-Bob!

JIM-BOB: Hey, dude.

TERRY: Hey, Jim-Bob. You in?

JIM-BOB: Yeah.

TERRY: Hey, Jim-Bob. What's going on?

JIM-BOB: Oh, nothing, not much.

TERRY: Not much? Well--

JIM-BOB: Oh, just listening to *After Hours*.

TERRY: Listening to *After Hours*?

JIM-BOB: Yeah.

TERRY: Hey, all right. All right.

JIM-BOB: I tell you, I got to get some of my brothers and sisters to call in down here.

TERRY: Yeah, JIM-BOB.

ROGER: (WHISPERING) 520-KPFT, call now.

TERRY: Jim-Bob?

JIM-BOB: Yeah?

TERRY: How's the farm?

JIM-BOB: Oh, I'll tell you the pigs are driving me crazy.

TERRY: I bet they are. I bet they are.

JIM-BOB: I got some good crop corn.

TERRY: You got some corn down there too?

JIM-BOB: Yeah. [INAUDIBLE]

BUDDY: Somebody get Jim and Tammy on the phone and tell them they're going to get our time slot.

TERRY: Take over. I hear take over.

BUDDY: Nobody wants homosexual radio at 2:00 in the morning.

TERRY: I do. I do. I do.

BRYAN: It's time for some hot party disco music!

TERRY: Hot party disco music right here in KPFT.

BUDDY: We got it right here and we're not going to play it until somebody calls us. There you go. How do you like that? What will happen if they don't call?

TERRY: If you spoke-- if you're bilingual at all, even if you've learned that language, you should listen to KPFT. And you should sponsor KPFT because you probably have a program on--

TERRY (ON We're taking off here we go.

BACKGROUND):

TERRY: --with that language.

TERRY (ON Here we go. Hold on, guys. Where we're going-- oh!

BACKGROUND):

BUDDY: OK, let's do a trivia question.

TERRY: OK, a trivia.

BUDDY: Bryan, you're good at this.

BRYAN: What? What? What? What?

BUDDY: Here's the question.

BRYAN: Gay trivia.

BUDDY: Let's get serious. Let's get serious.

BRYAN: Hey.

TERRY: (SINGING) Let's get serious.

BUDDY: Give us a question and we'll give away--

BRYAN: I'll tell you what, I know what we can do. If anyone can call up and tell me who the very first GPC president was--

BUDDY: The very first GPC president.

BRYAN: The very first. I will personally donate six months of free subscription to TWT magazine, plus they have to make a \$38 pledge to the station.

BUDDY: Uh-oh. You mean you get the program guide, and a t-shirt, and we'll even throw in those March tapes, and a six months subscription of TWT delivered to your house!

BRYAN: Every week.

BUDDY: OK, and what was the question? What was the question?

ROGER: Jerry's coming.

BRYAN: Besides, I thought that music sounded strangely familiar.

[LAUGHTER]

TERRY: You heard that sometime in your past.

ROGER: (WHISPERING) 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

TERRY: Buddy's hanging himself.

ROGER: (WHISPERING) Call now.

TERRY: Buddy-- Buddy-- they will call, Buddy. Don't hang yourself, OK?

ROGER: (WHISPERING) 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

TERRY: Yay! Call us please.

ROGER: Bryan, you got the news?

BRYAN: Have I got some news. Boy--

ROGER: Are you ready to do the news?

BRYAN: Why don't we do some news?

TERRY: OK, ready?

ROGER: (WHISPERING) 520-5738.

TERRY: Live from our News Broadcast Center in downtown Montrose is Bryan! Yay!

BRYAN: Uptown, downtown Montrose?

ROGER: No, wait a minute. Let me find the news.

TERRY: Wait a minute.

BRYAN: Oh, we got to find the news.

TERRY: We got to find the news.

BRYAN: Oh, no.

TERRY: Find the news.

BRYAN: Someone hid the news.

TERRY: You see the news?

BRYAN: 520-5738

TERRY: Oh, we got it. Here we go.

BUDDY: Who got the news?

TERRY: That was Jim-Bob did.

ROGER: Standby, we're getting it.

TERRY: Jim-Bob hid it.

ROGER: In the meantime, call. 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

BUDDY: Just call 520-5738, 520-KPFT.

ROGER: Become a listener sponsor.

TERRY: 520-KPFT, call us, please. Right now.

ROGER: We bought a very expensive new transmitter last month for you.

TERRY: It was really expensive.

ROGER: We bought it for you. We didn't buy it for us.

TERRY: Preach it to them, Roger.

ROGER: We didn't buy it for us.

BUDDY: That's right.

ROGER: I mean, we can come down here. We can run this radio station without a transmitter. I mean, we can all listen to it here in the station. That's for us. But for you, we bought a transmitter--

TERRY: Just for you.

ROGER: --100,000 watt transmitter for you, so you could hear this station.

BUDDY: You bought it and you paid for it. You've put us on here for the last--

ROGER: You kept KPFT--

BUDDY: --two years.

ROGER: --on the air for 18 years.

BRYAN: (WHISPERING) Yes, 18 years.

ROGER: 18 years.

BRYAN: (WHISPERING) 520-5378, call now. 520-KPFT.

BUDDY: Bryan, you ready to do the news?

TERRY: Did you find the news?

BRYAN: Oh, yes.

TERRY: You found the news?

BRYAN: We found some news.

TERRY: OK.

BUDDY: Did you?

ROGER: We found some news.

TERRY: Here's some news.

BUDDY: OK, Bryan's going to get read you the news. It's KPFT Houston *After Hours Radio* celebrating live from the heart of the Montrose. And Mr. Bryan Keever is coming in to do the news so stay with us.
