Dateline, San Antonio. Levi Strauss gives \$30,000 to the San Antonio Tavern Guild AIDS Foundation. The Levi-Strauss foundation made its first payment of two donations to the San Antonio Tavern AIDS Foundation for an eventual gift of \$30,000. The Tavern Guild will have until next December the first to come up with a matching donation, and was asked by Levi officials for a mid-year progress report on how donations from individuals and businesses were progressing.

Anti-gay Arizona Governor indicted. Dateline, Phoenix, Arizona. The indictment of anti-gay governor, Evan Mecham, on perjury and fraud charges will not stop his recall effort in which gay people in Arizona have played a leading role in getting that man out of office. Meanwhile, the state representatives are considering whether to impeach him or not. The conservative Republican governor has galvanized the people of this sunbelt state.

His sliding remarks about Blacks, Jews, gays, all these people have earned him his national headlines. Words like pickaninnies, queers, are words that have found offensive for the last century for Blacks, for gays. We need to get this man out of office right now.

Joan Kroc, the major stockholder in McDonald's restaurants, has given \$1 million to the American Foundation for AIDS Research, AMFAR, and \$25,000 each to the San Diego AIDS Assistance Fund and the San Diego AIDS Project.

Update. Our gay San Diego weekly reported that checks were drawn from Clark's personal accounts. This is not the first time the wealthy owner of the San Diego Padres baseball team has donated generously to AIDS-related causes. Congratulations to Joan Kroc.

Los Angeles civic leader, Sheldon Anderson, widely regarded as one of the nation's most powerful and influential gay political figures in the nation, died December the 29th of complications due to AIDS. He was 56 years old. Anderson was a lawyer, a banker, an art patron, and a philanthropist.

He gave generously to gay-related causes. In his Bel Air estate, he has entertained the likes of Senator Edward Kennedy, former Vice President, Walter Mondale, presidential candidates, Gary Hart, and other Democratic luminaries. This man came in at the top, was one of our most powerful gay powerful leaders. We will sadly miss him.

When officials from Atlanta's Centers for Disease Control held a secret, two-day conference last week in nearby Grapevine they really got blasted to their feet and kept their feet to the fire. DGA President, William Waybourn, told us, the meeting was at a secret location, so the media couldn't cover it. Well, some local gay participants said, we'll have none of that.

Following the CDC conference, participants there included Jeff Levi from the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, Vic Basile of the Human Rights Campaign Fund in Washington, DC, Kate Bishop of the Fund for Human Dignity, Dr. Ron Sable of the Cook County Hospital in Chicago, and others.

BRIAN KEEVER: Hey.

ROGER KINSER: Everybody, let's countoff. Start with one.

COUNTER 1: One.

COUNTER 2: Two.

BRIAN KEEVER: The phone.

COUNTER 3: Three.

COUNTER 4: Four.

COUNTER 5: Five.

COUNTER 6: Six!

ROGER KINSER: And I'm seven.

MALE JOCKEY Who was that six?

1:

ROGER KINSER: Six? That's a friend of mine from high school.

MALE JOCKEY Are you kidding?

1:

ROGER KINSER: No.

BRIAN KEEVER: You had friends in high school?

ROGER KINSER: He's six.

MALE JOCKEY He say six or seven?

1:

ROGER KINSER: No, he's sick. He's sick. He's sick.

TERRY ATKINS: Sick, sick, sick.

BRIAN KEEVER: You had friends in high school?

MALE JOCKEY You had friends?

1:

ROGER KINSER: Yes, I had friends. I had friends in high school.

MALE JOCKEY Hey, listen.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: All three of them.

MALE JOCKEY The bottom line is--

1:

ROGER KINSER: Brian.

MALE JOCKEY --this is listener-sponsored radio. That means that you, the listener.

1:

ROGER KINSER: Yes, you.

MALE JOCKEY Support programs like this and every other program that you hear on KPFT. We come in every week for 40-some odd weeks out of the year, and we never ask you for anything because we depend on you to pay our bills. And you do. You have for the past 18 years, and we thank you for that.

BRIAN KEEVER: Call us now.

MALE JOCKEY I want to play something for you right now. We're going to dissect it live on the air. You hear this every week.
1: First, we're going to play it just like you hear it. We're going to listen to the very beginning of it.

ELECTION State Senator, John Briggs, has just conceded the election.

ANNOUNCER:

REPORTER: Both Mayor Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk have been shot and killed.

REPORTER: Dan White has been found guilty of one count each of voluntary manslaughter.

CROWD: Fight now! Fight back!

REPORTER: It has now broken loose. Cops are now bashing heads.

REPORTER: And here comes the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights.

REPORTER: Gay power, gay politics. That's what this report is about.

REPORTER: There are gay and lesbian people singing out here. What's your reaction to that?

CITIZEN: I think it's terrible. If I had a rock, I'd throw it at them.

ACTIVIST: The real message of these gay games is that every one of us is a winner.

MALE JOCKEY 1: Let's stop it before Linda starts screaming that she screams at--

ROBIN TYLER: Say it, so they can hear you at the Capitol! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back! For love and for life, we're not going back!

REPORTER: I think that's Robin Tyler on the stage leading the chant. For love or for life, we're not going back.

ROBIN TYLER: Good afternoon, and welcome to the National March on Washington DC for Gay and Lesbian Rights and choral reciting! Let's hear it out there!

MALE JOCKEY 1: Let's hear it out there. 520-5738-520 KPFT.

BRIAN KEEVER: Call us now.

MALE JOCKEY 1: Now then, we're going to take this tape, and we're going to dissect it if I can get it rewound. And we're going to play name that tune.

BRIAN KEEVER: I played that game before.

MALE JOCKEY 1: This is the first-- this is the killer. This is the very first thing you hear, and we're going to listen to this.

REPORTER: The disorders began with a routine--

MALE JOCKEY 1: Now, did you hear what he said, Brian?

BRIAN KEEVER: Yes, I did.

MALE JOCKEY 1: What?

BRIAN KEEVER: Began with a routine raid.

MALE JOCKEY The disorders began with a routine police raid. What does routine mean, ladies and gentlemen, boys and girls?

BRIAN KEEVER: Something that I used to experience a lot during the '60s.

MALE JOCKEY A routine police raid on what?
1:

ROGER KINSER: Every day.

BRIAN KEEVER: Every day bar.

REPORTER: The disorders began with a routine police raid on a homosexual bar, the Stonewall--

MALE JOCKEY The disorders began with a routine police raid on a homosexual bar.
1:

BRIAN KEEVER: And it wasn't even a preppy bar.

MALE JOCKEY The Stonewall in Christopher-- on Christopher Street in New York. And routine, that's what really gets me about
1: that. Because it was routine, and it still is routine. If you want to know when gay pride 1988, lesbian, gay pride 1988 is this year, just watch. You'll see the paddy wagon start pulling up in front of the bars.

ROGER KINSER: Yeah, that's routine. They do it every year Gay Pride Week.

BRIAN KEEVER: That's part of gay pride week.

ROGER KINSER: Yep. We even put it on the program. It's part of the program. It's a kind of a roulette, though, because they've gotten tired of raiding Mary's every year.

BRIAN KEEVER: Well, that's true. Yeah.

ROGER KINSER: So they're playing Russian roulette with which bar they're going to hit. We really ought to pick it for them.

BRIAN KEEVER: Yeah.

ROGER KINSER: Submit names and-- we should have a drawing here.

MALE JOCKEY Like a lotto.
1:

ROGER KINSER: Yeah, a lottery.

BRIAN KEEVER: Well, you know what would-- what would be funny if they pick the bar that has all the BMWs and the condos, and the people that live in those.

MALE JOCKEY Oh yeah.
1:

ROGER KINSER: Somebody's going to be mad, but they won't do it.

MALE JOCKEY Too much insulation.

2:

MALE JOCKEY Too much what?

1:

MALE JOCKEY Insulation.

2:

ROGER KINSER: Say that three times real fast.

MALE JOCKEY No, no, no, no.

2:

MALE JOCKEY So now what do we do next?

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: But that's just it. They never do hit the rich.

MALE JOCKEY So next, we hear--

1:

REPORTER: Christopher Street.

CROWD: Say it loud! Gay and proud!

MALE JOCKEY Say it loud, gay and proud. That's right after the Stonewall riots, right?

1:

ROGER KINSER: That's right.

MALE JOCKEY So we know what that is.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: Three days.

TROY PERRY: --in the gay community--

MALE JOCKEY Wait a minute. Do you know who this is?

1:

TROY PERRY: Gay pride.

ROGER KINSER: I know who that is.

CROWD: Say it loud! Gay and proud!

TROY PERRY: We take great pride in what's happening in the gay community, and what's going to happen.

MALE JOCKEY You know who that is? We take great pride in what's happened and what's happening in the gay community?

1: What's going to happen?

BRIAN KEEVER: Who is that?

MALE JOCKEY Does anybody know Roger don't say? Does everybody know? He gets real mad if you call him the Pope of MCC.
1:

TERRY ATKINS: Troy Perry.

MALE JOCKEY Yeah, that's Troy.

1:

ROGER KINSER: That's right.

BRIAN KEEVER: Big daddy Troy.

MALE JOCKEY The moral majority, they were throwing rocks at him in Los Angeles.

1:

ROGER KINSER: Yes, and you know how many of their churches got burnt down in the early days?

TERRY ATKINS: A lot.

MALE JOCKEY A lot.

1:

ROGER KINSER: And people died.

MALE JOCKEY Do you know how many gay men and women died in their churches? People died.

1:

ROGER KINSER: Because the un-Christian Christians didn't like gay Christians.

TERRY ATKINS: Right here in Houston on 1919 Decatur. MCC had a cross burning in front about four or five years ago.

ROGER KINSER: We all know who burns crosses.

BRIAN KEEVER: Yes.

MALE JOCKEY And then next is my favorite.

1:

ROGER KINSER: But they wear tacky sheets.

MALE JOCKEY My favorite lady is next.

1:

ANITA BRYANT: The people of Dade county have said, enough, enough, enough.

MALE JOCKEY That was, of course--

1:

ROGER KINSER: The orange lady.

MALE JOCKEY The orange juice lady.

1:

ROGER KINSER: No, she's orange. She's from Mars.

MALE JOCKEY You don't remember all that, do you?

1:

ROGER KINSER: She's not from Earth.

MALE JOCKEY I remember faintly echoes of Anita Bryant when I was young.

2:

ROGER KINSER: 520-5738-520 KPFT.

MALE JOCKEY Visa, Mastercard, American Express.

1:

ROGER KINSER: Call collect.

CROWD: Human rights are here to stay! Anita Bryant, go away!

MALE JOCKEY Human rights are here to stay. Anita Bryant, go away.

1:

ROGER KINSER: Not necessarily. They can be voted out.

MALE JOCKEY That's right.

1:

ROGER KINSER: The people have voted many times to take our rights away even here in Houston three years ago this month, I believe it was.

BRIAN KEEVER: Yes, January the 19th. I'll remember it.

MALE JOCKEY We can continue to sit on our butts and not do anything, but--

1:

MALE JOCKEY Don't wait until the big, bad things happen before you stand up.

2:

ROGER KINSER: It's conceivably possible that we could lose our right to vote, and our people that propo-- have proposed that recently.

MALE JOCKEY You know what really killed me? A lot of gay people said, well, I don't work for the city, and I don't know very many people that are gay that work for the city. And I certainly know there are no gay police officers that work for the city. Hey, I'm gay, and I do work for the police department. I do know there are gay police officers down there,

BRIAN KEEVER: I know a couple.

MALE JOCKEY Just like there are gay lawyers, and doctors, and teachers.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: --everywhere.

MALE JOCKEY We are everywhere. So what's next?

1:

JOHN BRIGGS: There's no question in my mind that the people of California don't want homosexuals teaching in the classroom.

MALE JOCKEY That's a good one. That's John Briggs. He had Proposition 6. That was to get rid of all the gay teachers in

1: California.

ROGER KINSER: It wasn't just gay teachers, though. It was people who--

BRIAN KEEVER: Didn't fit his--

ROGER KINSER: --believed that gay people-- that even straight people who believed gay people had rights.

MALE JOCKEY But what happened to that?

1:

ELECTION State Senator, John Briggs, has just conceded the election.

ANNOUNCER:

MALE JOCKEY And that was John Briggs defeating-- he went down to defeat two to one.

1:

ROGER KINSER: It was our first victory after a long string of defeats.

MALE JOCKEY Straight people decided that John Briggs and his Nazism ideas just weren't going to make it.

1:

ROGER KINSER: Fascist.

MALE JOCKEY Yeah. And then, one of the darkest days in our history.

1:

REPORTER: Both Mayor Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk have been shot and killed.

REPORTER: Dan White has been found guilty of one count each of voluntary manslaughter.

CROWD: Fight now! Fight back!

REPORTER: --has now broken loose. Cops are now bashing heads.

MALE JOCKEY It was one of the darkest days I can remember. November the 28th, 19--

1:

ROGER KINSER: 27th.

MALE JOCKEY Excuse me, November 27th, 1978, when a man--

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: I still don't eat Twinkies.

MALE JOCKEY When a man that's a--

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: It must have--

ROGER KINSER: Might kill someone.

BRIAN KEEVER: --to work one morning.

MALE JOCKEY Yeah, man with a gun climbed into a window in the basement of City Hall, killed two people in cold blood, and he
1: got sent to the penitentiary for seven years.

ROGER KINSER: Why did he crawl through the window?

MALE JOCKEY Because he had a gun in his pocket.

1:

ROGER KINSER: What would that matter? Couldn't he walk through the front door with a gun in his pocket?

MALE JOCKEY No, the San Francisco of-- the mayor of San Francisco had metal detectors put in the lobby of City Hall because
1: he had a nut get in his office. And after that happened, they put metal detectors in the lobby.

ROGER KINSER: If someone was really that deranged, why wouldn't they-- it seems to me that they would be too off out of their
senses to realize that. And then to crawl through a basement window.

MALE JOCKEY See, he killed a fag.

1:

MALE JOCKEY Homophobia.

2:

ROGER KINSER: Is that what it is?

MALE JOCKEY Hey, man, he killed a fag, so he was OK.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: Two of them.

MALE JOCKEY We'll just send him to jail for seven years. It's OK.

1:

TERRY ATKINS: Just like slapping his hands. Go on, little boy. Go on.

MALE JOCKEY Those are the kind of things that we're dealing with.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: But the man has gone on to his greater reward, also.

ROGER KINSER: Hopefully.

TERRY ATKINS: Right.

BRIAN KEEVER: He really did, and I-- like I said, to this day, I still don't eat Twinkies. What a defense.

MALE JOCKEY If anyone's heard about the Twinkie defense, that's where it came from.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: If I go out and do away with a bunch of Christian fundamentalist weirdos, I can plead Twinkies?

ROGER KINSER: You don't have to get rid of the Christian fundamentalists anymore because they've teamed up with the Moonies.

MALE JOCKEY We've got tons of poetry, and tons of wonderful music for you, and tons of music here and here. And we haven't

1: heard any of it because--

ROGER KINSER: All of our local gay artists, too.

MALE JOCKEY --it cost money to do it. Although we don't get paid for doing any of this. We're volunteers.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: This is a labor of love.

ROGER KINSER: It costs about \$40 an hour to keep KPFT on the air.

MALE JOCKEY We love coming down here and doing this show for you, but it's going to take financial to support-- financial

1: support to keep us on the air. And we can only do that by asking you to call 520-5738-520 KPFT.

BRIAN KEEVER: Call now.

MALE JOCKEY Roger, how much money have we raised up there this morning?

1:

ROGER KINSER: We've got \$25.

MALE JOCKEY \$25, and we have a goal of what?

1:

MALE JOCKEY Somebody get Jerry Falwell on the line. It's going to be the old-time gospel hour.

ROGER KINSER: \$725.

MALE JOCKEY That's not too bad. How many \$128 pledges would that be? Blue satin jackets on the streets?

BRIAN KEEVER: And we do take plastic.

ROGER KINSER: Yes. Money is plastic. Yes.

MALE JOCKEY I can't imagine--

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: Visa, Mastercard, American Express.

MALE JOCKEY Come up with a great deal for \$128 pledge. Unless let's really kick the bottom out of the sack.

1:

MALE JOCKEY And you can pay little bits at a time, too.

2:

MALE JOCKEY You guys, let's put it together. That After Hours special pledge right now. So what can it be? Roger, you see all

1: the premiums out there. Put something together for us.

ROGER KINSER: Jeez.

MALE JOCKEY We'll do it. I know--

1:

ROGER KINSER: They're so good--

MALE JOCKEY Jen and--

1:

ROGER KINSER: They're so good now. You know what I can do, though?

BRIAN KEEVER: What can you do?

ROGER KINSER: For \$128 pledge, I can give you the program guide for a year. I can give you the blue satin jacket. I can give you two hours of highlights from the March on Washington. And I can give you a nice, big KPFT duffel bag.

TERRY ATKINS: We have a duffel bag, too?

ROGER KINSER: A duffel bag.

MALE JOCKEY You can stuff it all in the duffel bag, and--

1:

1:

ROGER KINSER: All you have to do is answer the question--

TERRY ATKINS: I don't have \$68.

MALE JOCKEY Well, you don't have to pay now. You can pay it out.

1:

ROGER KINSER: You can pay it out.

TERRY ATKINS: Roger. Roger.

MALE JOCKEY Wait a minute. Roger, we're going to take you off for a minute, OK? I took him off. We're going to do something.

1: Terry wants to make a pledge. Punch up the line right there. Now call the number. 520 KPFT.

BRIAN KEEVER: It's ringing.

ROGER (OVER PHONE): Thank you for calling KPFT Winterthon May I take your pledge, please?

TERRY ATKINS: Yes, ma'am. I would like to make a pledge, please, and I also want the t-shirt and the sweatshirt, and the TW-- the TWT this week.

ROGER (OVER PHONE): We can do that for \$128-- \$68 pledge. What your amount is?

MALE JOCKEY 1: Then we'll get-- Ask her the number for the phone. You asked her for the phone number, and then what do you ask her for?

ROGER KINSER: The special for \$128. ROGER KINSER: That's the feed.

MALE JOCKEY Wait a minute.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: That is their theme.

MALE JOCKEY That's it, the Jerry Falwell. They've got it here. It's coming next week.

1:

TERRY ATKINS: That's it.

ROGER KINSER: 520-5738-520 KPFT.

TERRY ATKINS: It's been real.

MALE JOCKEY Yeah, well, give us a call. 520-5738-520 KPFT.

1:

JOE WATTS: *The Seminole Kid* written and read by Joe Watts. There lies somewhere in the west plains of Texas a mysterious force that makes young boys grow so pure and sweet. It's not known if it's in the water, the air, or the earth itself.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: What?

MALE JOCKEY Community.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: We have more expendable income.

MALE JOCKEY And I have been slightly disappointed that our friends--

1:

ROGER KINSER: You can still call.

MALE JOCKEY --forward.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: We still have time. It's 3.50 in the morning.

MALE JOCKEY Sure. 520-5738-520 KPFT. And I can think of a lot better ways that I might be spending my Saturday night, so we

1: may be doing that very shortly. In fact, we may all be doing that very shortly.

BRIAN KEEVER: I could be in bed right now.

MALE JOCKEY If KPFT goes away. If KPFT goes away, you can bet the Jerry Falwell people aren't going to let us in here to do our

1: programming.

ROGER KINSER: No, not after they pay \$500 for this place.

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: Directly here in the Montrose area.

MALE JOCKEY We're getting ready to cut out, and Michael Davis, who we missed last week, is back with Stepchild 213. I can't

1: wait to hear that--

TERRY ATKINS: Yay, Michael.

MALE JOCKEY --funkadelic sound that he's going to bring to you. We want you to support Michael. I know all of Michael's

1: listeners are getting ready to tune in and support his program.

BRIAN KEEVER: We've got five more minutes.

MALE JOCKEY We do?

1:

BRIAN KEEVER: Five more minutes.

MALE JOCKEY Michael, you want to start next week at 2:00? Because we're not coming back.

1:

MICHAEL: At 2:00 in the morning?

MALE JOCKEY From 2:00 to 6:00? Can you go to a--

1:

MICHAEL: There is no way.

BRIAN KEEVER: Why not?

TERRY ATKINS: Well, Michael.

MALE JOCKEY I don't know what to say.

1:

MICHAEL: But you got five minutes. 526-4000, 520-KPFT. 520-57--

TERRY ATKINS: Listen, Michael is lighting it up--

MICHAEL: Oh, yeah! Call it.

BRIAN KEEVER: Call in now.

TERRY ATKINS: Tell them, Michael. Tell them.

MICHAEL: Serious side, folks.

TERRY ATKINS: Tell them.

BRIAN KEEVER: Call in. We need your help.

ADVERT I say, send your cash now, man! Don't take it to the bank! Don't give it no real estate agent, man! Don't give it to

ANNOUNCER: no fools in three-piece suits! Right here at KPFT!

MICHAEL: I'm going to talk about you this morning, but send some anyway.

1: gospel hour is not on next week in our place--

MICHAEL: Falwell is one of my best friends, man. You need to watch your mouth.

MALE JOCKEY They may have more money. They make up more supporters than we got, so we may come in.

1:

MICHAEL: He's one of my friends.

MALE JOCKEY They may have Jerry's name on our box out there. Money.

1:

TERRY ATKINS: Michael and Jerry, funkateers.

MICHAEL: What you got?

ROGER KINSER: I've got a thank you here to Nicholas.

TERRY ATKINS: All right, Nicholas.

ROGER KINSER: This is the first time he's given to KPFT, and he's given \$18. He'll get the program guide for a year. And it says here he works for another station, but he's listening to KPFT.

MALE JOCKEY Did he ask for any special premiums?

1:

ROGER KINSER: No, he didn't ask for any special premiums.

TERRY ATKINS: Yes, Michael!

MICHAEL: --in Houston, Texas, and I am Stepchild 213.
