Well, it's a usual story. Man. The police have got this thing going for good many years now. And the wonderful Avondale association the people that give us police harassment and intimidation are added again. And this week at the Avondale Association meeting. The representative Houston Police Department came and reported that they were going to begin a zero tolerance program in lower Westheimer Montrose within the next two weeks. The last time they did this, if you will recall, they raided the line of sick people standing in line for their groceries at Stone Soup. For people got arrested and carried down. They arrested me and helped me in the back of the squad car for over an hour until Charles Armstrong you've never seen Charles Armstrong on his knees before but he was begging them. Please don't take the governor. My crowd will get a little rowdy tonight if they hear the governor has been arrested. Well, I can assure you that the governor is going to go get arrested. I know for a fact that I will spend next Friday night and possibly Saturday night in jail. But I may get arrested at any point that this thing begins. And I'll tell you how to do that. If you want to be an activist type. Here's your opportunity. It is illegal for the police to arrest someone for not producing identification. If you're going to drive a car you got to have a license and a permit to do that. So don't say if somebody comes up to let me see your driver's license and you're behind we'll whip that sucker out. But if you're in the passenger seat, or if you're in the back seat, and they say, let me see documentation of your identification. You do not have to produce that. How the hell do I know that? There was a little case called he'll vs. Houston. Remember the officer said, let me see your driver's license. And I said, cop. I don't need a driver's license to walk around the basement of this courthouse, up against the wall to jail, ultimately to court and into federal court. And I won big time. I mean, just no question about that case. It's still good law, Hill versus Houston. That case is can still be cited in local courts of metaphysics, the city is enjoined from arresting me for refusing to show my identification. And so what I'm going to do during this zero tolerance campaign is go out and jaywalk a lot. I will refuse to use crossings at intersections, I will cross in the middle of block, hoping that they stopped Batman and the men

they stopped me and say, let me see your driver's license, I'm going to talk about their mothers in the most embarrassing of terms. And if you want to be an activist, get in touch with me, my home number is 5236969. And you can't don't even have to write that sucker down. You can remember 5236969 You don't have to remember 352 is in Montrose than 69 69 comes relatively natural to most people I know. And so right do you still have an email address? Yes, you can email me at Ray hill@iah.com. And even like International Airport, Houston, but what had a real name instead of Bush, Rayhill@ih.com. All letters and all one word, of course. But I am concerned about the zero tolerance. landless the president of caucus is going to talk to the police chief about it. Monday, and I'll be talking to lieutenants and captains and Sergeant. This didn't make any sense. What happens when they have the doctrines, they heard the horse around a little bit, which nobody cares. I mean, people really don't care what they do to the street prostitutes, right? The Trans isn't the straight ones. And the gay one just heard them around. Those people are real slick. They know how to avoid them. They know they win the zero tolerance so they can beat this this system. And then after they do that, then they chase the small 10. Joint dealers around the world guys was two or three joints and selling them for a quarter apiece, or whatever they get from these days. I don't I suspect they get more, but it's been so long, I have no idea. But anyway, they'll hurt them around. Who falls victim of this is like good citizens, because good citizens are not prepared to deal with how to avoid these kinds of police harassment. So ultimately, after the first day, everybody's got it figured out except the innocent citizens who are going to get out of their car and walk across the street and get ticketed for jaywalking, their identification is going to be demanded, and it becomes a mess after that. And then the cops get bored, right. And when they get bored, that's when they start assaulting the line of people in front of Stone Soup and other people with AIDS, who are out for a little exercise in the afternoon. And it gets to be real sick and twisted. We don't need that we don't have that kind of problem. There's not enough problems in this community to justify that kind of crap. And so it's gonna wind up bunch of people going to get tickets for crack taillights, even though their lens is still in good shape. And it's just a harassment thing.

You're going to get out the next morning because judge Hernandez, not integrans. They go throw it out though now that judge is not going to hear a no identification case as an absolutely not. If you're asked a direct question, give a truthful answer. What is your name? Give them your true name. What is your address, give them your true address. But you don't have to prove document your identification. If you go to jail for not documenting your identification, that is a sure win case and we'll put it together and form a class action if necessary. Most of the people that arrested that are probably young Hispanics in other sections of the town, but we

have we have an opportunity to to fight back when it comes in their neighborhood and we've got lawyers to do that. So don't worry about it. If you're willing to go to jail, and hey, we'll have one to full time, I promise you I'll be there Friday night entertaining. Yeah, it'd be entertaining and entertaining and makes them it makes them very nervous when they've got Ray Hill hanging around the jailhouse the last time we went to jail they got a captain to come in and spend the night in the jail next to be you remember Dale, what's his name Dale Brown. A full blown captain came in and I said why don't you spend the night next to me and he said yes Sunday and he was able to freight I was gonna see some nevermind so though it makes them uncovered is that I'm getting too old to sleep on those old steel benches and all that but by God I'm talking to people getting pushed around I'm damn tired of my people getting pushed around and I'm here let me do something about jewel that you didn't maybe didn't know you know when the tornado hit. tornado hit when tornado hit and the apartment complex right down the street where you live in a Crosby where I live was in shambles and all that the lumber had not stopped falling in duel was in there getting her patients gathering up with them and their medicine of arbiters that you can go in there and she said I want to make one more drink.
