The library also has somefeatures that might remind you of your local public library or high school media center: fiction books on displays near the checkout counter and workshops and events with social or learning functions.

Libraries on college or university campuses, also known as academic libraries, have their own specific features that are important to keep in mind during your time as a student at a university.

The library provides access to information and resources that facilitate the research and learning done by students, faculty, and staff at the university.
