Now the report graded 42 of the nation's largest school districts in six areas, including where the school policies protect students and staff from discrimination, and harassment based on sexual sexual orientation. The voice goes on to say that if staff training includes gay and lesbian issues, if curriculum is inclusive, and whether gay straight alliances are allowed, was another category in which it was judged on Houston join San Antonio, and 40% of the school systems in the survey, and reporting a no to all six areas. More than half of the 42 school districts received a failing grade. Only Dade County, Florida, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego received an A. So obviously we do have a lot of work to do here in the Houston area.

Wait, I literally was booed all across all the way across the stage my graduation. And I have to say it was actually one of the prouder moments. I mean, I was

And the reason I got involved with it, and at all was because because I had had experience in the civil rights movement, and I had experience in the anti war movement, they thought I would be a likely candidate to run the American Civil Liberties Union on the campus of Texas a&m, which is a little bit like putting a bull's eye on your chest saying, please shoot me. And that was essentially what happened at a&m. I also what happened was, the case had been stalled because they didn't have any money, frankly. And so I came to Houston along with Ray Hill, and I hope he's still listening, and several other people. And the Texas Human Rights Foundation came in along with us. And altogether, we raised enough money to get the case back into court. And they didn't know really who to blame for this. But since I was the head of the American Civil Liberties Union, which had Texas a&m was equal to being a member of the Communist Party. It seemed like I was the likely candidates and the next thing I knew I became lightning rod. And I thought, Well, fine. If they're going to play this game Two can play it. So I came up with an idea for a day that was called Blue Jeans day. Now the deal was, we were we went around campus putting up signs all over the place, saying if you're gay, or if you're sympathetic to being gay, or if you have someone in your family who is gay, come to school and such and such a day wearing your blue jeans. Now, come on, everyone comes to school wearing blue jeans. That's the point. Oh, okay. As soon as we would put stuff up people in the Corps Cadets when we're on campus, tearing it down. I did do an interview on the campus radio station, but no one on campus listen to the radio station. So even though we had done our damnedest to publicize this event, this was the most unknown campus event ever to occur on the campus. Until the day it actually happened. Hmm. The next thing you knew people were people to in the Corps of Cadets were stopping said, What are you queer? You're wearing blue jeans? And the other person? What the hell are you talking about?
