He also mentions that he still listens to us regularly. call em is nothing near one of those texts his worst or most violent. He was ostracized by a system that seeks to break the wills of the strong and rules through the failures and insecurities of the weak. And is the type of person who always tried to uplift the weak with the knowledge that it was all going to be okay. As you may be able to see this was a conflict. And the real reason for his being at Estelle M is a person who cares about the people around him. For that he is being punished. He is in a place where he's in a cell by himself for 23 hours a day, with little or no contact, a hug from his mother and father. Not even that. When he says that his radio is to sanity I believe him and it is it and it shows with real life people like you that contribute. In my last letter I told you to be listening to Peter show and Gigi show told him to be listening to Peter share with JJ show, which are his favorites.
