In his first executive actions as US president, Bill Clinton has dumped a series of Reagan and Bush era abortion restrictions. He simultaneously ended a five year ban on fetal tissue research, overturn the so called Gag Rule, which restricted abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics and moved to end the prohibition on importing the French abortion pill are you 46 And as this week's edition of this way out, is distributed. Here's what we know about Clinton's elimination of the ban on gays and lesbians in the military. It appears it will be only a matter of days before Clinton fulfills his campaign pledge to remove the ban. But some top military officials have been trying to talk him out of it. The Joint Chiefs of Staff have consistently expressed concerns that repealing the ban could damage morale, hurt recruitment efforts and increase the risk of AIDS for heterosexual troops.

There were reports that General Colin Powell was prepared to quit if the ban were lifted something his spokesman flatly denies But other Joint Chiefs oppose lifting the ban as well. Defense Secretary Les Aspin says military leaders may be forced by the courts to accept it sooner or later killed already the White House.

Openly gay Congress members Barney Frank and Jerry studs were consulted earlier this week by the Clinton administration about lifting the ban. They say the President will first deliver a memorandum of instruction to defense secretary Les Aspin, which directs the military to stop

asking new recruits about their sexual orientation and stop discharging lesbian and gay service personnel within three to six months, Clinton will complete the second step of the process by issuing an executive order formally lifting the ban. Clinton spokesman George Stephanopoulos did not confirm the details. But he did say quote, I think the President intends to end discrimination against homosexuals in the military intends to make an announcement on that policy, probably within the next week and quote, anticipating the policy change. The Navy this week postponed a discharge hearing for a gay sailor until Clinton's decision has been released. Since coming out in September, radio man second class Robert E. Matt has been a scientist supervising parking lot cleanup at the Bangor naval submarine base. Lieutenant Commander Scott Wilson said it made no sense to hold the hearing until Clinton's decision became known. The 50

year old ban on gays and lesbians serving in the US military has been a prime target in recent years for activists seeking to eliminate it. But ironically, some gays and lesbians already in uniform have been using the ban to get out. Veteran gay and lesbian rights activist Frank Kemeny is a paralegal counselor who advises gay and lesbian military personnel. He says that until 1989, the overwhelming majority of his clients were seeking help to stay in uniform. Beginning in 1990, though, he saw an increase in gays and lesbians hoping to leave the service with honorable discharges. Until last year, 90% of his clients hoped their sexual orientation would be a ticket out. A significant factor for some of them is the homophobia of their co workers, particularly since anti gay and lesbian sentiment among service personnel seems to have increased dramatically since Bill Clinton's election. to US National Gay and lesbian rights organizations that have lobbied heavily against the ban. The Human Rights Campaign Fund and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force believe that most lesbians and gays want to remain in the service.

both the public and the military in the Netherlands are probably the world's most tolerant of gays and lesbians. But there are problems even there, according to a new official study of the soldiers interviewed only 1% of the men and three and a half percent of the women acknowledged being gay or lesbian themselves. Some of those even bring their partners to official functions, but the researchers believe there must be many more who remained closeted. While most of the soldiers support equal rights for lesbians and gays. 60% of the men admitted to avoiding their openly gay co workers, while 9% confessed to having felt an urge to physically attack them. The gay and lesbian organization of Bell Canada has filed a complaint against the phone company with the Canadian federal Human Rights Commission, and an employee in Toronto is suing the Royal Bank of Canada. Supporting these cases are two recent decisions in Ontario. The August Ontario Court of Appeal ruling that bans discrimination in federally regulated areas

including telecommunications and banking, and the September Ontario Human Rights Tribunal decision requiring the provincial government to offer benefits to the partners of its gay and lesbian employees. The latest US
